Racing to Read to Go Workshops, Webinars and Grant Opportunity

During the weeks of September 2nd and September 9th, the Missouri State Library will provide five workshops across the state focusing on the outreach and partnership components of Racing to Read called Racing to Read to Go. Topics include: 1) the background of Racing to Read to Go; 2) tips for connecting with agencies in the community, particularly those that work with families considered to be high risk; 3) how to successfully incorporate partnerships into early literacy program efforts; and 4) provide ideas for programming outside the library.

Three webinars focusing on different parts of the live workshop will be held on September 24, 25 and 30 from 2 p.m.–3:30 p.m.

The trainers for the sessions will be Nancee Dahms-Stinson and Stephanie Smallwood from Springfield-Greene County Library. They were both instrumental in creating the Racing to Read early literacy model and the Racing to Read to Go component. Registration for the workshop is required and can be completed [online](#). Registration for the workshop closes August 22, 2014. Registration for the webinars will also be required, with the link available at a later date.

Public libraries that are certified to receive state aid and have a staff member attend the Racing to Read to Go workshop or all three webinars will be eligible for a grant to help implement or enhance early literacy programs and services, particularly outreach services. The [Racing to Read application](#) is available online and has a call deadline of November 7, 2014. The grant period will be February 1 through August 15, 2015.

New Digital Collection in Missouri Digital Heritage

The [Edgar Maclay Glass Negatives Collection](#), contributed by the Maclay Home, is now available on Missouri Digital Heritage. Maclay Home was built in 1858 by Wallace and Mariah Williams as a school for girls. After Wallace left to fight for the Confederacy, the building was used as Union headquarters for the area. Following the War, the building was purchased by the Gleim and Maclay families to serve as a family home.

The 243 photographs in this collection were taken largely by Edgar Gleim Maclay, the oldest son of Cyrus and Laura Miller Maclay. Edgar's photographs document his family, the Maclay Home, camping trips, and ferry rides. Also included are photographs of campus buildings, dormitory interiors, football games and other events on the campus of the University of Missouri.

People interested in the above, may also wish to view the [Harrison Gleim Civil War Papers, 1860-1891](#), contributed by the Maclay Home. Harrison Gleim, a relative of Edgar Maclay, served in the Civil War as lieutenant and quartermaster in the Missouri Light Artillery, and later as major and *aide-de-camp* in the 2nd Missouri Cavalry. This collection includes personal and official correspondence, military orders and quartermaster records.
