for sale to loyal citizens, and soldiers in the service of the United States, at
Weyert Meister in said State of Missouri; now if he the said
Weyert Meister will not sell fire arms or ammunition except to
loyal purchasers from New Mexico, Utah, and other loyal sections of the country west of
Missouri, pursuing a legitimate trade with those regions, or to persons having written
permission from the Provost Marshal General of the Department of the Missouri, to pur-
chase, the permit to be authenticated by the signatures of the Provost Marshal General and
the District Commander, then this obligation to be void, otherwise to be in full force.

And it is hereby Understood and Agreed, that in case said Weyert Meister
shall be found guilty of violating, wilfully or negligently, the conditions of this obligation,
then, in addition to the remedy hereon by civil law, upon conviction of the said
Weyert Meister by any tribunal, military or civil, duly constituted, any officer
in the military service, acting under orders from the Department or District Headquarters,
may seize and sell, or otherwise dispose of, any property of the above named obligors to an
amount sufficient to satisfy the penalty of this obligation.

Mayer & Meister, a citizen of the County of St. Louis and State of Missouri, doing business at the City of St. Louis in said County, as a Merchant, having made application at these Headquarters to keep for sale, and to sell FIRE ARMS AND AMMUNITION, in conformity with the provision of General Order No. 32, Department of the Missouri, series of 1864, and having filed his bond in the sum of TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS, and made satisfactory proof of loyalty and reliability, HE IS HEREBY AUTHORIZED to keep for sale at his place of business, and to sell to LOYAL CITIZENS, AND SOLDIERS in the service of the UNITED STATES, and to no others, fire arms and ammunition: PROVIDED, that he will make no sale, except in legitimate trade with loyal purchasers from sections of country west of the State of Missouri, until the purchaser shall exhibit a written permit, authorizing him to make such purchase, signed by the Provost Marshal General of the Department, and approved by the Commanding Officer of this District.

the stock which is very small - until
the case is disposed of by you -

General

Enclosed I send you a petition signed by the Union men residing in the vicinity of Knob Noster Johnson Conn. praying for the release of John Maddox Wm C. Chester Wm A. Fisher and others who are now confined in the Military Prison at St Louis for having belonged to an Independent Company known in that region as Company "D" and for taking a gun from a well known Rebel sympathizer named Barnes C. Rathweel. There being the only offense of which they were found guilty it became relevant to inquire into the condition of the County at the time this Company was organized and during the time of its existence. But all the evidence asked for by the defendants in that behalf was excluded by the Commission before which they were tried. They asked for witnesses to prove that they organized the Company under the direction of Military Officers whom they supposed to have competent authority in the premises. They asked

for witnesses to prove that after their organization they cooperated with the Military authorities in suspending Guerrilla warfare in that portion of the State as required by Gen Order No 86 Adm Is Dept Mo Aug 25th 1863. They asked for witnesses to show that they placed themselves under the command of the Commander of the Post at Knob Noster and that they acted under his orders and performed the same duty as the Company which was regularly in the service. They asked for evidence to show that the Commander of the Post at Warrensburg directed them to make frequent scouts through the County in search of Bushwhackers and not upon an account to disband their Company. They asked for witnesses to prove that they had orders to disarm all disloyal persons whom they found with arms in their possession. They asked for witnesses to prove that they had a particular order from Capt Fullerton to take a gun from James C. Kochweil which he had in his possession contrary to orders, it being a gun for which he had no permit to keep. They asked for witnesses to prove that certain depredations with which they were charged were in fact committed by soldiers in the U.S. Service and with whom they were co-operating at the time instead of the men of the independent

Company. They asked for witnesses to prove their general good character - that they had always been good and loyal Citizens and that they had at different times and places disapproved and discontinued all kinds of lawlessness and that John Maddox had given orders for his men to arrest the names of all those who engaged in any kind of plundering so that they might be reported to the Military authorities for punishment. They also asked for witnesses to prove a number of other things relevant to the issue all of which was excluded and denied them by the Commission as will be seen by referring to the Records in the Case of John Maddox & Wm C. Chester.

After such an arbitrary and unlawful course had been pursued in the Case of Maddox and Chester (they being tried first) the others who were charged with the same offense became disengaged and being without Counsel, they did not ask for their witnesses to show - matter of justification or mitigation of the Offenses charged against them, and thinking from the course pursued by the Commission in the first case that it was of no use to make any attempt to make a defense, they submitted their Cases and consequently the record does not show the same Errors in the Cases of the Others &

the Mulky which it exhibits in the Case of John Maddox Itzby Maddox and Wm E. Chester the proceeding in which have been disapproved.

I wish to call your attention briefly to two points in these Cases which show them to be Cases of peculiar hardness, and illustrate the spirit of the Court towards these men. The first is the Case of John W. Mulky whom they found guilty of the 4th Specification preferred against him and which charged him with the robbery of Lewis Garrison. Now there is not one word or syllable of testimony upon the record which proves that Lewis Garrison was ever robbed of any article of property of any one at any time, much less of John W. Mulky, but for some unaccountable reason which does not appear upon the record they found him guilty of Robbing Lewis Garrison and upon such a verdict doth the sentence him to imprisonment during the war and to pay a fine of two hundred Dollars. Since that time however John W. Mulky has died in the prison, and now often he has been over robbed of the Robbles in his lifetime, the Provoit Marshall

has ordered the seizure of his personal property to pay the fine imposed and which leaves his wife and family in an utterly helpless and destitute condition.

Again in the Case of William A. Fisher, the Commission found him guilty of the 3rd Specification preferred against him, which charges him with taking up arms as an outlaw and public robber, and with force of Arms Arising upon the premises of James C. Rothwell and feloniously stealing taking and carrying away one revolving pistol and one gun. Such is the charge but the evidence of James C. Rothwell is that he gave Fisher the revolver and that Fisher gave him a receipt for it and that no force or threats or intimidation of any kind were used by Fisher, but that on the contrary Fisher told him that it was for his (Rothwell) own good that he took the revolver away. For all of these facts I most respectfully refer you to the records in the Cases.

Again I would call your attention to the record in the Case of Henry W. Mulky who was not even with the Independent Company except upon one occasion and then it was not shown that he ever took or that he was present when any other person took

the worth of a pin from any person or
citizen at any time to place, but still they
found him guilty of being a member of the
Independent Company and sentenced him
to imprisonment during the War, but
being unable to endure the confinement
and feeling the wrong that had been done
him by the Commission, he too has died.
~~Under other Circumstances~~, the people of
Johnson Count knowing the facts in their
Case and having long known the parties
imprisoned, and thinking that the cause
of their imprisonment is owing to the manner
in which their independent Company was treated
and Encouraged by the Military Authorities and
the Union Citizens of the Count, they desire to
have something done in their behalf. They
are willing to be responsible for their
future good behavior if the orders in
their Cases can be so modified as to
admit of their release upon a Bond.
There is not one of them but what are ready
give a Bond of ten thousand Dollars, if required
of them. To show you to some Extent the
manner in which they Co-operated with the
Military Authorities I most Respectfully
refer you to the Enclosed letter from
Collyton Bondman who was at that time a

Sent and in Command of the Post at
Knot Muster and also to the latter of
Ld. Fulk who was ^{a Captain} in Command of
the Post a short time before.



it is alleged existed without proper Civil or
Military Authority, but which we nevertheless
believe was justified, by the circumstances
surrounding them, and the condition of the
County at the time of its organization and
during the time of its existence and further
knowing and believing that the men who
belonged to the said Company were from the
beginning of the War among the most
reliable Union men of our County and further
that they did during their existence as an
Independent Company receive encouragement
and support from the different Military
commanders stationed in this County, and
that the said Independent Company did
co-operate with the Military Authorities in the
suppression of bushwhacking and Guerrilla

welfare in this portion of the State as required
of them as Citizens by Gen. Order No. 86. N. C.
2d Dept. of the Mo. 1863. And also believing that
the said Company did render much valuable
assistance to the Military Authorities in that
behalf. And whereas the said men have been
in confinement in the Military Prison for six
months, and whereas they have only been found
Guilty of belonging to the said Independent
Company and of taking the arms from one
James C. Rothwell, which act we believe they
were justified in doing (as will be seen by refer-
ence to the letter of Capt. S. R. Fulls, hereto-
attached marked A) And in consideration of
the above facts set forth, we would most
respectfully request that the said men be
released from their confinement and that if
there be any doubt in regard to them that
the orders in their case be so modified as to permit
them to be released upon them giving bonds
with approved security for their future good
behavior, with which turned we believe from their
previous character and standing they can
readily comply.

Dear Sir,

I beg leave to submit to you the following statement in relation to what I know of the organization and existence of an Independent Company known in this country as the Clear Fork Rangers or Company 2. I have seen by Gen Order No 24. Feb the 10th and General Order No 28. of Feb 23 Head 3d Dept of Mo that a number of citizens of this county among which are William A Fisher and others have been tried by a Military Commission at Jefferson City and sentenced to undergo imprisonment at hard labor during the war on the charge of a "violation of the laws and customs of War." The first specification under the above charge and of which they have been found guilty sets forth that the said men took up arms as outlaws and military Insurgents and that they joined belonged to Consortium and acted in consort with a band of outlaws and military Insurgents known as Clear Fork Rangers or company 2 without being ordered so to do by any competent civil or military authority whatever and justice to those men I have thought it my duty to state what I know in relation to the said company and the manner and circumstances under which it was organized. In the month of May 1863 I was 1st Lieut. of Company B 5 Provisional Reg. Enrolled Mo Militia and my company was stationed at Knobnoster. The company remained here for about three weeks when it was ordered by Col Neel to Lexington I immediately upon the receipt of the order for the company to leave this Post and go to Lexington the citizens appealed to Col Neel to revoke the order sending the company to Lexington.

as it would leave this Post entirely unprotected but Col Neil replied to them that he could not leave a company at Knobnoster and that the People must organize a company and protect themselves

The county was at that time in a very bad state Bands of Guerrillas and Bushwhackers were lurking about in the immediate vicinity of the town robbing murdering and burning houses frequently only three or four miles of the Post such being the actual state of the country a meeting of the citizens was called for the purpose of organizing a company as directed by Col Neil who was then in command at Lexington. I was present at the meeting and made some remarks advising the citizens generally to go into the organization and they did so. The company was made up by electing John Maddox Captain and W^m E. Chester Lieutenant, I being present and presiding at the election, on the next morning I left the post and proceeded to Lexington this was on or about the 1st of June

In the month of July I was ordered to Knobnoster with forty men to take command of the Post and I was at that time informed by Col Neil that the Independent Company (then known as company "D") would cooperate with me at the Post in guarding the Town and Scouting for bushwhackers. and on my arrival at Knobnoster John Maddox and the Independent Company placed themselves under my command and during the rest of the month of July and the month of August they cooperated with the men of my company standing guard and going upon scouts under my direction just the same in all respects as the men of my own company who were in the service

I furnished them with ammunition and detailing them for duty the same as that of the men of my own company. During this time the Independent Company went upon scouts through the country at different times by my orders, generally with a portion of my own company.

I can further state that I never heard any officer in the Military service make any objections to the continuance of the Independent Companies in Johnson County. (There being at least four others of the same kind to my knowledge) but on the contrary such organizations were encouraged and strengthened until this county was added to the central Dist when Co. "D" was arrested, which was about the 1st of Sept 1868 and since which time these men have been confined in the military Prison.

I do not know whether the company was organized with proper authority or not, but I do know that it was recognized by the military authorities as a loyal organization composed mostly of men who have been in the union Army and not one of them so far as I know ever had any particle of sympathy with the rebellion in any shape and this much I thought it my duty to make known to you so that you could judge of the circumstance under which the company was organized as well those under which it existed that you might determine whether they were deserving of the punishment inflicted by the Commission before whom they were tried.

My attention being directed to Genl orders No 24 Feb^r
10th, and No 28th Feby 28th 1864 from Head Quartermaster Department
of Mo. I find that several citizens of this County (Johnson) who
were tried by a Military Commission at Jefferson City - have been found
guilty of the charge of "violation of the laws and customs of war" - and
that under the above charge - the 3^d specification (and of which they have
been found guilty) it is alledged that the said men (members of Comp'y 2d)
"did with force of arms enter upon the premises of one James B. Rothwell
and feloniously steal, take and carry away, from the said premises the
following personal property, to wit one revolving pistol, and one gun
this at Johnson County Mo on or about the 30th day of August 1863

Now I wish to state in regard to this transaction what I know
concerning it. being in command of Co. G, 40th Reg't E.A.M. Col Spodden
I was ordered to occupy Knob Noster - with my Company - Nov 28th 1862 this
was in compliance with the request of very near every citizen of that place
and vicinity as expressed thru petition. I propose here to briefly state why it
was deemed necessary to have some Military protection at said point of Knob
Noster - being ten miles from Warrensburg and some twenty miles from
Sedalia - the nearest Military posts or stations there being none others within
some 35 miles on three sides of said village there is quite a dense -

Rebel population, within sight of the notorious Whealy settlement which sent forth its robber bands continually for many miles round the village and villagers were repeatedly robbed. the stream known as Clear fork to a distance of 15 miles from the village south was settled by Rebels who fed and sheltered guerrillas. Companies of these under different leaders such as Nichols - Gallaher - Pigg - Kirkpatrick - Smelling - Jeff Young &c each of these at times had a gang of robbers - most of those holding considerable property - north south and west - Robinson, Craig, Neil, Walls, Coopers Wuffs, Rothwell, Hocker, Carpenter, Thorntons, Ogleby & - from the beginning encouraged by all manner of means, the rebellion - many of the citizens of the village - had served in Home Guard and other Military organizations were conspicuous at Lexington and other places in defense of the Union - thus incurring the malignity of the rebels - had strong reason to ask for protection neither the persons nor property of Union men was safe at that point I occupied the place till the E.M.M. were generally furloughed out of service on the 31st of March 1863. from information derived through men rendering me secret service and personal observation - it was clearly satisfied that the place was ⁱⁿ imminent danger - after my company went out of service the citizens organized a company - I recommended the course - it was generally approved of - it was known to the military authorities at Sedalia and Warrensburg - and indeed generally through this part of the country - Madison and Chester their officers were introduced by myself to the other Commandant here (Capt Burris) at other times they requested me by letter to inform the Commandant here of their movements which I did

other Companies were similarly formed with the full knowledge and approbation of the Commandant one under Capt Day - one do Capt Leggatt one do Capt Guthrie and one or two others - that Company I was frequently called on by the organized military officers to act as guides and scouts. and that they so acted and done duty as guard at their own town with the militia and volunteers as escort &c &c
I am personally known to - as County assessor and Enrolling officer I procured escort from them. when I could not from the militia or volunteer force - I had fair opportunity for knowing and judging of their actions and their generally conduct - I know all the men (save two) personally - have seen Maddon promptly correct that which might seem a departure from correct deportment - Some time in the Spring of 1863, after I was relieved from service. I was informed Jas L Rothwell had a gun and claimed that ^{he} had given a permit for him to keep it. I told - Maddon Chester and others that he had no permit from ^{me} and advised them to take it - Rothwell is a rebel - always was from the beginning of the trouble - of strong prejudices - surrounded by Huzz Hockett Thorne ton and other rebels of influence and under Genl order 19 of July 1862 he ought not ^{to} keep a gun - it was believed by many that a load of powder was secreted about or near him - and then hauled to Lexington to supply Genl Price in ^{the} capture of that place. bushwhackers it is believed were fed there - I learned from the officers of Company I. that they got the gun away from Rothwell - when the provisional Militia were removed from Rock Nestor - I am satisfied Company I (as it was called) again

protection to the place - without them I believe the place
was unsafe - I was often there and heard no complaint till fall
The first complaints I heard and all I did hear came
through men who were not true Union men, and mainly from
those who had personal difficulties with some of the Company
before the war - I will only add, I have a very fair chance
of knowing - something of the accusing parties who manage
the affair - the arrest and prosecution, and probable mistakes
of the character & conduct of a large portion of the witnesses - and
of their efforts - policy - Conduct Standing & L and also of the course
persecuted by the same parties on former occasions - Somewhat similar
and conclude that Justice to all concerned would ^{be} best secured
by either discharging the accused or turning them over to Civil
Power in their own Committee when all other facts are well known.

Genl.

Being a citizen
of Johnson County I address you on behalf
of a number of the citizens of my County who
have been convicted before a military com-
mission at Jefferson City Mo. of belonging -
to and operating with an independent com-
pany. All among them were ~~John~~
~~Mattox~~ - William E. Chester, the two
Fishes and the two Neal Ross

I have known them men for a number of
years - some personally and all of them
by reputation and I have known them as
men of unblameable character before the
war and as unflinching Union Men since
the war commenced.

John Mattox and William E. Chester
and others of Company "D" belonged
to the Home Guards organization of Johnson
County - were captured at Lexington -
and sworn. which according to a de-
cussion from the War department - preventing

them from enlisting in the U.S. Army.

I have been for nearly a year on duty near Johnson County, and have talked with men almost every day from there (besides having been through the County several times,) and I know that at the time Co "I" was operating - there were five or six other similar organizations in the County - authorized by the Military authorities of that Sub district. I went ~~to~~ to Waukesha in Johnson County, in September last - and he at that time spoke of the matter - several men who had been in command of these independent companies reported to him for instructions. He told them to keep up the organization of their companies until he could make some better arrangement. I have no doubt that some irregularities were committed by some parties, but I do not believe that any of the parties now in command are ~~the~~ guilty parties -

From my knowledge of the whole matter I do not believe that Co "I" acted ~~as~~ worse than the generality of its troops -

I know that this thing has grown out of party animosity -

And as far as I know there is not
a single unconvinced Union man in
Johnson County who does not desire
the release of their prisoners.

It has been the general rule
in this department that Military
power has been used as a means of
political power, And it is not
untrue to say that the loyal men
(Union loyal men) of Johnson County so
regard this whole question.

They at least hope that those men
who have been true to the government
will under your Administration
receive the justice that has been
before denied them.

In obedience to an order received from you. I proceeded without delay to investigate the matters contained in the affidavit of Wiley Walker of this County. I immediately placed under arrest the following persons named in said affidavit. viz Joseph Timberlake Gramville & Brightwell Edward Gaines James S. Duncan John Hale James A. Martin and Ben Moore. Joseph Hulet one of the persons named in the affidavit is now in Nebraska having gone there sometime since and Dr H. McCallum does not belong to the Militia Consequently has not been arrested. Some of the persons named in the affidavit are now in active Service (except Gramville & Brightwell) they having been relieved I took steps to have brought before me each and every person from whom I could procure any evidence or as many as I could conveniently and have examined all persons named to me by Wiley Walker as knowing anything whatever touching the subject matter. A great mass of evidence has been taken much more than can be conveniently read and much more than is or may be considered relevant to the subject of enquiry. Yet feeling desirous to investigate fully I have been careful to take the statements of persons who were mentioned to me as being in possession of any knowledge whatever in order to fully carry out my orders and give perfect and complete satisfaction

So that now might feel themselves aggrieved by
my action in the premises

The affidavit of Walker.

You will perceive not only implicates the accused
but also the entire militia of this County.
(See original affidavit before (Long) It took
his own evidence in support of his affidavit
in which he relieves the militia of the charge in his
original affidavit. (See Walker's Statement in
support of affidavit.) also the Testimony of John
Patterson, Archies G. Brown & others as to the conduct
and deportment of the militia of this County - and
also as to the security afforded Union Citizen
as well as all persons residing in this County.

There were persons who testified in opposition
to the militia but their statements show prejudice on
its face and really amount to nothing as against
the militia or in support of the latter portion of the
affidavit of Walker. (See statements of Mrs
Smith Miss Sarah Babcock). I am forced to
conclude that the latter portion of Mr. Walker's
affidavit so far as it applies to the militia of this
County is groundless and I so report.

As to the arrest of Walker and the quiet of
the accused as charged in the affidavit.

I find, that Walker was arrested by the
persons named in his affidavit. You will
perceive from the evidence of Supt Stokes
& Hatfield and Sergeant Porell that the
accused were sent in on Detent & in order to
preserve the public peace from an anticipated
interruption. You will perceive that the evidence
of these persons show the standing orders governing
the Scouting parties sent from the Rest at Farley

and the manner of making up the Scuts - the
object to be affected by Scouting a person
subject to arrest & being reported to the post
You will see from the evidence of John Parton
Preston Simpson Mr Hindst. Mr Stoddard
Mr Johnston Miss Higgins that Mr Haesler
fell within the orders & can be well arrested
and I so report although there may be some
irregularity in the manner of sending and placing
the same on duty

As to the hanging of Mr Haesler am abusing him
& otherwise mistreating him as stated in the
Affidavit.

You are referred to the evidence of Aly Brown
Miss Hattie Brown Enoch Peter & Sam W. McCormick
& I find that the charge of abusing & abusing
contained in said affidavit to be unfounded

I may in Conclusion be permitted to state
that in this Case when there is such a mass of
evidence I may have overlooked many things stated
of importance showing the state of feeling of the
victimes but have endeavored to look at the
evidence in this Case free from any excitement or
prejudice of any character whatsoever
Against one of the accused (Timberlow) personal
enemies have testified & due allowance should be
made on account of hostile feelings. his character
as a soldier being good as given by his officers
and others

I learn through letter just received that the people of my church (Presbyterian at Palmyra) are much exercised on account of a real or supposed movement on the part of the Rev: Jacob Robert Winters, late occupant of our pulpit, to induce you by Military authority to turn us out of our house of worship and逐出 him and his in. So anxious are they on the subject that they are importuning me immediately to leave my post of duty here, and visit you and beg in person lay our case before you - I cannot leave, and if I could I cannot conceive the necessity of going - I will however, with your indulgence, more out of deference to the wishes of my affrighted brethren than from any sense of the necessity for doing it, give you a brief statement of the

material facts involved in this unhappy controversy.—

The Church for many years has been and still is in ecclesiastical communion with that body of Christians known as Old School Presbyterians.— About July last the Church with great unanimity employed the Revⁿ? Gentleman, then belonging to the same Connexion, to preach to us for a year.— The relation of minister and people continued until Monday the 1st ^{July}— just when he voluntarily applied to Presbytery there holding a regular meeting in Palmyria, to be dismissed from the Presbytery, and accordingly Presbytery then & there dismissed him.— Thus it is seen that he by his own voluntary act deprived himself of the right and power any longer to preach to us or in our Church.— Of this no word of complaint has ever been uttered.— His departure was an occasion of heartfelt rejoicing by most of the church.— He had remained until all hope of his usefulness was at an end.— Since his resignation the pulpit has been regularly supplied by a minister of our own choice.— I understand he and his few followers

are now attempting to create the impression that he was turned out of the house and is wrongfully deprived of the possession of it—an assumption without the shadow of truth for its support—If as I suppose he has appealed to you for the redress of his pretended grievances, I take it you will be governed by the wise principle recently enunciated by Mr. Lincoln, that it is not the business of the government "to own the Churches," and refuse to interfere.

If the controversy must be disposed of by public authority, it is better to be left to the Courts of the Country, now happily once more open, to whom the decision of all such disputes of right belongs. But in case you should differ from me in the view I have expressed, and feel it your duty to sustain the proposition, I beg that no definitive step be taken in the case until a fair opportunity is first given us to be heard; in that event I have no fear of the result.

The Undesignated Loyal
Citizens of Schuyler Union Co. Inc. respectfully lay bare
to present the following statement, and petition for the re-
lief of a great wrong, under which the loyal people
of this place have suffered, and which they now endure.

At the outbreak of the
rebellion, all of the churches here, with one exception,
were so utterly destroyed, that the few loyal people
in them, were constrained to forsake them.

In the Presbyterian
church, above, was then a sufficient element of loyalty
& meritizing any visible existence, even with the
protection of the military stationed here.

For three years of bitter
Oppression, they endured the contempt and unmitigated
hatred of Rebels and sympathizers, and throughout that
entire period, the Loyal Presbyterian church and
congregation, enjoyed the entire approbation and
cordial support of all the loyalty in Schuyler.

It was the sole
light in this community, when all around was
Rebel, and only Rebel. Our宗民們
were all uniformly loyal; and those who

had their country made their home really
point, in the trials that tried man's soul.

Men are Soldiers even to their lips -

Bible and Babel, Sympathizers had left the church,
and took no part in its management or control,
but stood apart to serve our cause.

We took it for granted that this church was
the property and was to continue under the control
of loyal Christians, which we assumed.

It was originally built for such, and it was
never contemplated that Rebels and Traitors should con-
trol it at any time.

Six months ago, under the management of
rebel sympathizers and pro-slavery leaders, the Rebels rallied
in force, for the purpose of insulting and overrunning the
loyal portion of the church.

In this infamy, by the power of numbers they
of course succeeded, for the reason that conservatism
prevailed then in the accident, and the traitors were
in the community. They espoused from the
record, some worthy members of the church; chose their
own officers, and assumed the entire control of the
pulpit and church property.

Under the circumstances
we have met, as we best could, and have patiently
endured the outrage, fearing that an appeal for
justice might involve those who would inform
us in trouble, without benefit to us.

At present, however, our beloved the
circumstances which breed such conduct prevail,
no longer exist.

This wrong can now be corrected, in the
shortest and most decisive manner, without
regarding any interest of the good cause, which we
all have at heart.

We therefore pray you
General, to grant an order to the Loyal
Presbyterian of Palmyra, to resume the possession
and control of their church, and we further
desire that you order Messrs. Roger, Chapman, Miller
and Dyer, - elders of the Rebels and Rebel Sympa-
thizers who now hold the church - to deliver over the
Keys, Books, and possessions, to the Loyal Elders
Deacons for the use and benefit of the Loyal Pres-
byterian Church and Congregation of Palmyra,
under the ministrations of Rev Jacob H. Webster,
and their successors.

We would only state in
conclusion, that in the opinion of the Circuit Justices
of Union County, that there is hardly a loyal person
in that church, which Rebels and Sympathizers
abound, from Thomas J. Anderson, an early leader
down to Tally, who has been imprisoned as a
Known Disobedient, and yet more than three years
permitted to walk at the last election, and then
only by an oversight.

And now, hoping that

our Request and Petition may receive your
Early and favorable Consideration in
mine. General, with great Respect from

Colonel.

Majos. W^m Phipard, Geo. E. Warren, J. H. Gould
and others, a committee on behalf of the citizens of
Jersey Co. Ill, have represented to me that said County
is infested with a gang of horse thieves and robbers, that
some of the persons charged with committing these crimes
have recently been arrested and placed in the Common
Jail of said County, to await their trial for said
offenses. They further represent that they have fears
that an attempt will be made by the accomplices of
the prisoners, to liberate them, and that they think
the jail of Jersey County not secure enough for

their detention. They have therefore requested me to authorize and request you, to take charge of said prisoners and any others who may from time to time be committed for trial for the above named and other crimes, and to keep them in confinement until after their trial by the proper tribunal.

This is therefore to request and authorize you to take charge of the following persons committed by the Examining Magistrate for Horse-stealing viz.

In. B. Scott, Mac Lafount, Edward C. Moore, Mahlon Bright, Lewis Churchill and William Munson and any other persons who may be committed for this or like crime, and keep them confined in the Military Prison at Alton Illⁿ until they have been either acquitted or convicted before the proper tribunal or until they have complied with the laws of the State of Illinois by furnishing bail for their appearance, or until the authorities of Jersey County want to take charge of them again.

The Expenses for keeping said prisoners while
they are confined in the Military Prison at
Alton are to be borne by the County from
which they are committed

at the dismounted Camp in the Valley is getting
up a petition signed by some Union men to try to
make it appear that he is a good loyal man.

The Gentleman named D. G. Potter, appears to be
the most active in the matter, I do not doubt his
loyalty but he has been employed by Mr. Poffen-
barger in business and it might seem to be
self interest with him, Mr. Gideon Thomas, a
good loyal man, but a brotherinlaw, Mr. E. C.
Rohrer, a very respectable citizen, &c. these
gentlemen are such as have a good deal of
sympathy for (Rebel sympathizers) or very good
natured men.

Now I have no doubt that it will be repres-
ented to you that on the last Election day, Mr
Poffenbarger, had to attend a funeral of one
of his grand children, this is true, but it is

said that he returned home in time to come to the poll as one of his sons did who I have already stated in my former letter voted a disloyal ticket.

There were a large number of Circulars sent me by the Chairman of the Washington County Central Committee for distribution among the voters urging every loyal man to come to the poll & distributed the Circulars to his sons, but they could not do any thing for the Cause that is so dear to all loyal men,

Dear Sir I hope you will excuse me for taking the liberty to ask you a few questions, knowing you are deeply interested in the welfare of our State. I wish to know if there can't be some mode adopted by which to stop certain disloyal men from peddling or trading in the Camps of the Union Soldiers. There are a number of them engaged in that business from our vicinity to the Camps around Harper's Ferry and Md. Heights. We had a test election on the 6th inst. which showed up everyone of the Copperheads, they profess to be Union with their tongues but their hearts are in the Rebel cause. I think if an order could be issued to prevent their trading with the Union Soldiers it would be a severe punishment to them, they have carried it on very extensively for the last year or more, and it is the wish of every Union

man in our vicinity that they
should be stopped, I will give you
the names of the parties, Thomas
Poffenbarger, John Poffenbarger and
Josiah Poffenbarger, the latter voted
the Copperhead ticket the two former
did not come to the polls their votes being
challenged and they could not take the oath
to the vote last fall because there was
but the one ticket (viz, the unconditional
union). The nextt individual is Josiah
Buck, has two sons in the Union army
but not by his consent, by their own

with him for which I gave my note for one
hundred dollars On or about the first
or second week of November 1862 a command
of men said to be Genl Bend Lour's home
through Lexington down the Dover road
and passed Mr Slushers except four
soldiers who stopped at Mr Slushers and
Mrs Slusher had just got home from a
visit to Lexington and I came to unhitch
the horses from the carriage when the
soldiers took the horses I told them
that one was an old horse and belonged
to Mr Slusher and was not worth much
and that the other horse belonged to
a black man belonging to Mr Slusher
they after a while gave the black man
back his horse and then went to the
horse lot and took my ^{Bay} mare stating
that I should come the next morning

1862. I bought a bay horse of Mr Joseph

Wisc for which I gave my note for one hundred

and took my horse and about four months
after he came home and seemed to have
broken loose somewhere I had heard
some of the soldiers belonging to Capt
Meredith's company stationed at Dover

I forward to you in charge of Capt. F. J. Sutton & Guard Duncan Ellis and John two citizens of this County. The charge against them is that of preventing a Negro from coming here to enlist - The circumstances are, the Negro was on the way with some others intending to volunteer - Duncan Ellis and John Ellis overtook them and ordered the Negro out of the ranks - John Ellis had a double barrel shot gun and cocked it at the time - The boy was forced to go back - I raised a volunteer squad and arrested the two men - Brought the negro in and enlisted him - I have not had time to obtain the written evidence in the case but will do so if necessary - The men do not deny the facts of the case - I would state here that so far as I can learn these men are good citizens but rebel sympathizers. There has been a great deal of influence used in this County to prevent Negroes from enlisting - It is very difficult to obtain evidence in cases of this kind - At the same time it is very necessary that something should be done to prevent such influences being used - I would suggest that these men be held as prisoners for

two or three weeks as a warning to others.

Duncan Ellis a citizen of Lincoln County and about sixty and his son John P. Ellis - have been arrested by the Prov. Marshal March - appointed to enlist negroes for that county.

The charge against the parties is that they have interfered with the enrollment of negroes - they have been brought down to St. Louis and are now in prison - we the undersigned their neighbors knowing the helpless condition in which the family has been left, and believing that a just wrong has been done in their arrest - ask that they may be released -

The facts of the case are that ^{young} old man Ellis owned a negro man who was a cripple - he had previously had his arm & leg broken - he had been rejected by the enlisting officer as unfit for service - but on Tuesday last with the consent of his master he went to Auburn a village in the neighborhood to see some negroes who were about to start for Troy the County seat to enlist - Some time after but on the same day old man Ellis and his son went into Auburn - whilst there the other negroes started for Troy and this lame negro named Wesley started with them -

M^r Ellis learning the fact - consulted with some untroubled Union men in Auburn as to whether he should go after him and bring him back - they advised him to go and bring him back - he started after him overtook him, he simply told him to come back which he did - no white man was with the negroes - nor did any enrolling officer have them in charge - no resistance was made by any one or by the negro himself - This was all the opposition - on the next day the Provost Marshal from Troy came and arrested Ellis & his son -

This is the whole case - we claim to be unconditional Union men and to have been so from the beginning - we respectfully ask that you will over the discharge of these men - we admit that Ellis and his son have been considered by some as Southern sympathizers - but we have never heard of any declarations or acts of either of them against the Government or in favor of its enemies - but we think they have done nothing in this case to justify their arrest -

The witness Wesley Ellis,
(Colored) of Lincoln Co. Mo. of lawful
age, being duly sworn deposes and
says: - I am 18 years old - I enlisted
in the U. S. service on or about March
6th 1864.

On or about March 14. 64. I
left my masters house in Lincoln
Co. in Company with some 15 others,
all Colored, intending to come to St.
Louis and enlist. - At about one
mile from the house we were overtaken
by my master "Duncaw Ellis" and
his son "John Ellis": -

The young man "Ellis" was armed
with a gun - the old man ordered me
to stop and to return - I told him that
I should not have left, but that his
son "John" had told me to go if I wanted
to - I returned with them and on
the way the "old man Ellis" told "John"
to give him the gun, get off his horse
get a "Brush" and flog me - "John" told
him that he would do that when he
got me home & he did not do it, however.

I was taken back and the next day some soldiers from "Foy" came to the house and took me with them to "Foy" where I enlisted.

- When the old man Ellis and his son overtook us I was not threatened except with whipping.

I have heard the Blacks say that my master and his son "John" were both Rebels, that they had often made such remarks as that "the Lincoln" should have died long ago, that they would kill him if they had an opportunity to - I never heard this myself.

I do not want to go back. I intended to leave last Christmas but something prevented. I came into my master's possession by his marrying my former master's daughter.

nearly a year. They are not soldiers.

A few days previous to their arrest they were

this neighborhood in the absence of the Federal Army, and
we feel satisfied that whatever could be communicated
to the Majorie, or disadvantage of the Union Army ^{by them} could
be freely furnished.—

They are all people of general bad character, a great
nuisance to the neighborhood, have no ~~means of subsisting~~
property, that could not be readily taken with them, and
it would be a great relief to all good people ^{hereabouts} in the neighbor
hood if they could be sent back into the interior
of the United States, at least as far as Alexandria;—
they are all able to earn a livelihood if they were ~~here~~
located where work could be had; ^{which} ~~here~~, they have nothing

For obvious reasons, of course we do not wish our names to be known in this matter, unless it should become absolutely necessary — as it might subject our property to destruction in more ways than one —

Dear Theophile.

It is with a sorrowful heart and in great humiliation that I write to you. Our quiet and hitherto peaceable village has been the scene of some disgraceful proceedings on the part of men wearing the garb of Union Soldiers - men, bearing about them the insignia of loyalty such as every true lover of his Country delights to honor - but, who, with arms in their hands suddenly burst in upon us and with violence and outrage have disgraced alike their calling and the Country that they profess to serve.

About noon, yesterday, I was surprised to hear the rattling discharge of firearms and looking from the door of the Mill I saw a number of soldiers on horseback rushing through the street - firing with revolvers and Carbines - not then at any particular object, but in every direction - pointing their arms upward - to the right to the left and even toward the ground - their object being apparently, to produce terror and frighten the women and children whom they met on their way. Presently, however, I saw a man trying to climb the Bluff and toward him the soldiers now paid their attention and although there must have been over fifty shots fired at him at fair range they failed to bring him down and he succeeded in climbing the Bluff - disappearing behind its summit. Some three or four of the soldiers followed on horseback while the others - perhaps twenty in number kept

up a continual fusilade of small arms from the street below. In the course of a few minutes the soldiers who had gone on the Bluff returned bringing with them as trophies the Boots, hats, watches and other personal effects of two men whom they had killed while on top of the Bluff.

It seems that four men, in all, had fled to the Bluff when the soldiers appeared in the village - an old man and his son - noted Bushwhackers and murderers - and two others - doubtless their Companions - but all unknown to us in the village, had left Missouri and had come to our village where they could remain unknown and unnoticed, for reasons best known to themselves - probably to have a resting spell - perhaps to concoct some scheme of robbery and pillage here - at any rate they were guilty and fled at sight of the soldiers.

The old man was killed also a young man in his company - the two others escaped. Now comes the disgraceful part of the proceedings - the soldiers entered the store of A. Blais - and Ambrose Kir - burst open drawers, boxes, trunks and threw the goods about the floor - professedly looking for concealed arms - they carried off several shot guns and revolvers and destroyed others - then helped themselves to such articles of Merchandise as suited them - mostly Boots, Hats, Caps, Socks and other wearing apparel - then adjourned to the door where quite a multitude had gathered, and the officer proclaimed that then and there, the whole crowd should shout "hurrah for Lincoln" as a test of their loyalty - the soldiers cocked their arms and stood ready to fire which they declared with the most fearful oaths, they would do when the cheer was

finally given - a cheer for the man who sent his agents to outrage and rob them. I cannot express to you the deep humiliation I suffer on account of this outrage - it has come upon me so suddenly - even when I was contradicting the rumors of such things having been done elsewhere - stories passing from hand to hand - newspaper paragraphs relating like seems to this, I have always disbelieved and have treated as efforts of persons enemies to the Cause of the Union that I so dearly love - but here before me right at my door palpable, undeniable damning proof presents itself and makes me tremble with apprehension for the future.

The village of Rain du Roche, as you well know, has until within a few weeks past, enjoyed unparalleled immunity from all disorderly scenes - but it seems, that, our isolated position - or - comparatively unknown locality has attracted the attention of bad men - such as were destroyed yesterday by the soldiers - and by being treated hospitably by the primitive minded inhabitants have produced these acts of kindness and hospitality as marks of friendship thereby inducing others to come over when danger presses them and in this manner have brought trouble on innocent and unoffending persons.

The soldiers that were here yesterday belong to the 3d Cavalry Regiment Enrolled Mo. Militia - they have promised another raid soon and threaten destruction to the village and all therein.

Now, as to the Bushwhackers and other rogues from Missouri - I cannot tell you how glad we are to give them up - to lend a helping hand to effect that object - whenever they make their appearance to any authority Civil or Military - we are anxious to be rid of them and no fear need be entertained of any resistance from the inhabitants - but on the contrary - a che ful acquiescence in any requirement

Regiment or company.

will be gilded by one and all, when that authority is
by an officer who is a gentleman and commanding soldier
who are not themselves robbers and promoters of violence and
confusion. We will do the duty of good citizens and loyal
lovers of our Common Country with pleasure and alacrity.

I have been told this evening that another raid will be made
upon us on Sunday next for what purpose I cannot ascertain, but
I hope the report will prove a false one. Should the same people
~~Come the second time~~ ~~the same band will be shamed~~ - on the other hand
if we are visited by a command who seek for enemies of the
Government only - they will have a friendly greeting and such treatment
as is the ~~universal~~ custom of our people to bestow on those who are
entitled to respect and confidence.

I beg you will do me the kindness to inform our
Commander in Chief Rosecrans - we must be protected against the
outrage of yesterday - the good that was done does not, by any means,
rester our confidence - for, if we must be robbed and outraged we
pray that it may be done by enemies outright rather than by
~~professed friends~~ ~~making the habiliments of our protectors but~~
~~prostituting their arms to the cause of our destruction.~~





I live in Lowell St Louis County my business is in the Soap Grease trade. Have been in this business some thirty years. Have lived in St Louis that length of time. I am 55 years old, have never been trading with Soldiers for Government Clothing. I did have at my house all kinds of Government Clothing both old and new, something like one hundred pieces, most of them were old clothes: I did not get them my wife brought them home, said she got them in the Camp at the Barracks where the Soldiers are, to whom she carried milk and washed for. most of the clothing she picked up and washed. the balance was given her by Regiments when they went away, of different Regiments and ^{at} different times, and brought it home and we kept it for our own use. did not sell or dispose of any of it nor did not intend to, my wife remarked that we would keep it and it would last us all our life time. I never wore any of it ~~afterward~~ I was told that I would be arrested for so doing, and intended to have it colored before wearing it. — I was arrested April 27, 64.

In obedience to special orders No. 91, P.M.G.'s Office I went to Liberty Mo. to enquire into the case of George Wibz and Andy Poe, who were confined in jail.

I found Anderson Poe in jail there but no man by the name of George Wibz was there or had ever been according to all I could find out about it. I enquired of Col. Wopf, of his Adjutant, of the Provost Marshal, of the Sheriff, of the County Attorney, in fact of every one there, that could by any possibility know anything about such a matter.

Anderson Poe is 34 years old, Kentucky born by birth, has, lived in Clay County nearly five years, volunteered at Pickfield Mo. in the Southern Army about the time of the battle of Shingler, belonged to C. Thompson's Regiment, State Guards, got a

discharge after his term of ~~soldier~~ days out at Van
Buren, Arkansas - immediately after the battle of
Pea Ridge. He was arrested Dec. 6th '63 by the Mil-
itia. - There are no Military Charges against him, and
I could find no evidence in Liberty that he has
committed any Military offense; but there are three
separate indictments against him for robbery on
which he will be tried.

Mr. Gatzweiler, Sheriff of the County, as a public officer inferior to none, straight-forward, honest & liberal, Radical, not interfering much with politics. P. O. St. Charles.

Robert Bailey senr., Judge of the County Court, an amiable & generally esteemed old man,

uncompromisingly Union, patriotic & liberal. P.O. St. Charles.

Robert Bailey Jr., the former's son, one of the Representatives of St. Charles Co., now in the U.S. service as a captain in a black regiment, - much like his father.

Paul Schmidt, Sheriff of the county, a very efficient officer, a man of very sound judgment & large experience, having seen much of the world & knowing how to manage affairs, obliging & yet, perfectly gentlemanlike, thoroughly Union, but not indulging extreme views. P.O. Holstein.

Dr. Hutton, a man of good education & abilities, aspiring, but seeking popularity in a wrong way; very doubtful Union-man at the beginning of the rebellion & still inclining to southern sympathy, though professing union sentiments; was appointed Colonel of the C.M.R. but not confirmed, & is now acting as examining U.S. Surgeon to the great regret of the truly loyal population of the county. P.O. Warrenton.

Dr. Charles Brue, Radical, impulsive, active, truly patriotic & honest, generally esteemed even by his political antagonists, a man of great learning & skill. P.O. Marthasville.

Frederick Morsey, a tolerably good lawyer, has within a short period metamorphosed himself from an old-line Whig into a Democrat, then into a Union man & is now considered somewhat progressive, arriving perhaps at radicalism by the time of the next election. He has also rendered military service. P.O. Warrenton.

Dr. Wright, my predecessor as State Senator, a man of great energy & no amiability, a rabid proslavery man; would now like to pass for a Union man, since it appears unlikely that Missouri can be transferred to Jeff Davis' dominion. P.O. Wright City.

Augustus Gratz, Justice of the peace, postmaster & Notary public, a man of considerable business capacities, able & punctual, professes to be still an old-line Whig; at the outbreak of the rebellion his loyalty was rather doubtful, but he may be considered as a Union man now. P.O. Marthaville.

Tom Marshall, Clerk of the County & Circuit Court, much like the former, would have liked Jeff Davis better than Lincoln, but acted cautiously & committed ^{no} rash or impudent deeds. P.O. Warrenton.

Albert Frowein, Postmaster, effective, trustworthy, firmly Union. P.O. Warrenton.

Montgomery County.

Hon. Lovelace, Representative of Montgomery County, a very prominent man & highly respected by the progressive party, feared by the Copperheads; firmly Union & latterly Radical. P.O. Danville.

Dr. Robinson, a man of rare literary endowments, highly esteemed & firmly Union. P.O. Danville.

Dr. Bass, member of the late convention, Rebel sympathizer. P.O. Danville.

That they are citizens of Griffin Spaulding Co. Ga. left that place on Sunday March 27. There are 5 Bros of us one is now in New York City, one is still in Griffin in the Drug Business. All of my Bros are union men and none of them have ever been in the Rebel Service. - fear of Conscription forced us to leave. We left Griffin on Sunday and passed through Atlanta to Kingston from there to Rome was in Rome on 29th March, obtained a pass there for the County for 10 days, from Rome crossed the mountains near Head of McLamores Cove just below Shinbone Valley came to upper Chickamauga Bridge. At Rome there was a Provost Guard of about 50 or 60 guarding Bridges &c. Two Trains run in each day from Kingston one baggage and two Passenger Cars. Freight trains are attached to them when necessary - from Rome to this place we met but two Soldiers. The Confederate Army is considered in better condition now than ever before. The army and people feel more

confident than ever before that ultimately they will be successful. This accounted for by the recent success of their arms. From our understanding Lee is being reinforced from the Lower Country and Johnson from the Army of the West.

The lower and middle classes live about as well as they ever did - the latter are drawing Rations from the Govt. In our section of Country and South of there corn is plenty and sells for \$3 @ 4 pr bushel. Bacon is worth from \$ 2 1/2 @ 3.00 pr. lb. The supply is sufficient. All able Bodied men from 17 to 18 years old are conscripted for Police duty, from 19 to 45 for field duty, from 45 to 55 for light duty.

Private Thomas R. Wilson Co. A 2nd Regt. Cavalry was caught in the act of cutting up one of the stills about noon the 21st by Mr. [unclear] he wanted it - the copper - for burdens for a team. Asserts that he knows of no one else being engaged or interested in it.

The night of the 21st the other still & pipe were cut up and carried off. Wilson claims by other parties besides himself. As he had nothing to do with the last act.

That there are others engaged I am well informed as there are tracks of at least three to be seen when they crossed freshly ploughed ground in the vicinity of the District. Am satisfied they do not use the copper for "burdens" but think it is to be sold in Kansas City.

Would it not be well for the Patrol to examine Wagons in from here with a view to discovering the other parties?

I have not yet arrested Wilson, had I not better send him into Kansas City for safe keeping as there is no very safe place for him here?

by reason of his minority, never having been married, and hence in no way liable to military duty. Whereupon, said Henry Piper, who is of the age of 55 yrs and has always been a resident of Shadyside and vicinity, during his entire lifetime, and is and always has been, a truly loyal citizen of the state of Maryland, and U.S., after the advice of said Jonathan Summers proceeded to said Church the place aforesaid, to order his said servant to return into his lawful custody this order being complied with said Piper and his servant returned peaceably to his residence. Thereupon, the Officer in command ordered a guard to retake the said Summers, but prior thereto sent a guard, and ordered said Piper promptly to appear before him at the Church and quarters said Piper proceeded to comply with that order and whilst on his way to report to the Officer met him that is to say Captn Fletcher who in the meantime assumed command, on the street and in the square of said town, and whilst reporting to said Captn Fletcher 19 Regt U.S. Colored Troops, and informing him in reply to his demand that the (Piper) directed his servant to return to his house aforesaid said Piper's immediate arrest. \$1200 & \$1300 in the hands
of Mr Simon C. Adler, to purchase
cotton with for our firm.

I think the money was in green
backs and Southern money (not Con-
federate money).

Three or four weeks ago our book-keeper
Mr Hellman, said he suspected that
Adler was going to make his way
North. Under instructions from
me, Mr Hellman went to Capt
Williams and I believe ~~for~~ to Capt
Frank Off. W.S. Detectives, and obtained
authority to arrest Adler and take
possession of the property in his
possession. Our firm has ~~never~~
furnished money to Adler for any
other purpose, since the above trans-
action, or before.

Q. Where was Adler at the time you paid him this money, and who paid it to him?

A. I do not know. Our book keeper can give all necessary information. I was sick at the time.

Q. Where was the cotton to be bought when delivered and how was it to be delivered.

A. I do not know how

Q. Do you or do you not know that the cotton was bought?

A. I do not know whether it was bought or not.

McKauffman

Leon Hellmann being duly sworn deposes and saith:

I am book keeper and financial agent of M. Kaufmann & Co, of Memphis, Tenn.

Last Sept. Mr. Frelich and Simon Adler stopping there at my private house made a proposition to purchase cotton in Cohomo Co., Miss. for our firm, at so much per bale. We gave Mr. Mr. Frelich about \$6000 in green backs and \$10000 in Southern bank bills. Frelich and Adler were to act as partners. Adler went off. Frelich remained. Since Adler stayed three months he then returned and said, he had bought 375 bales of cotton, which was then in a shed, some four miles from the river near Sunflower Landing Cohomo Co., Miss. Although distrustful of his acts, we gave him at his request \$6000 more in Southern bank bills. He then promised faithfully to Mr. Frelich to bring forward the cotton in three weeks. We heard nothing from him in two months, except by some refugees from Mobile,

From the information we received, we were induced to believe that a false appropriation was being made of the money we had advanced him. I got letters of introduction from Capt. Williams, Pro. Mar., Memphis Tenn. and from Capt. Frank Chas. W. D. Det. to the Pro. Mar. at Cairo, who telegraphed to Maj. Gibson Pro. Mar. at Paducah Ky, with the concurrence of the Commander of the Post at Cairo, to arrest Simon C. Adler and his associates.

I went myself to Paducah, and on the second night of my arrival ~~so~~, (see Adler) he was arrested.

The Pro. Mar., Chief of Detectives and two men arrested, and searched him about 11 o'clock at night. They took all of his effects from him.

He was put in the Guard House.

In the morning, the Pro. Mar. together with the Capt. of Detectives took an inventory of all he had on his person, such as, money, drafts &c and sealed it up. Adler then requested an interview with me, and I told

5

that he would give up all he had
if we would let him go.

I got then a copy of the inventory
from the Pro. Mar. and putting every
thing at a fair value, there was still
a deficit of \$5 3 os. for which he
was willing and ~~did~~ did give me, in
presence of Chf. of Detectives a due
bill of Five Thousand Three hundred
dollars.

I went back to the Provost Marshals
office, who sent for him (Adler).
I told him (Pro. Mar.) that I had
settled with Adler, upon which
Mr. Adler signed an order au-
thorizing Maj. Gibson to hand over
to me all monies, drafts & property, &c.
which had been taken from him,
and that I should keep the Pro. Mar. Marshalls
receipt for the property.
I having no further desired prose-
cute him, the Pro. Mar. discharged
Adler asked me for Two hundred
dollars, for his expenses, which I gave
him. I brought with me to Memphis
all the effects the inventory called
for, except the horses and carriage.

A. It was about the 25th, 26th of Sept, at my private house. I don't think there was any one present, but myself and Freibich. The reason it was paid at my house was, that Mr. Kaufman and Co., had not yet taken possession of the store they had rented.

Q. Where was Kaufman and his partner at the time you paid the money over to Mr. Freibich?

A. The partnership was not exactly formed yet, but arrangements had been made for a co-partnership between Kaufman

and Karsman, and our purchaser
was in Cincinnati buying goods.

D. Had they at the time you paid
this money to Melch, entered into any
written partnership, or have they
since entered into a written, partner-
ship?

C. At that time they had not, but
since that time they have had an
agreement in writing.

Lived in Allegany Co. Md. was arrested on the 24th March, at the mouth of the Bay near Leonardtown. Went over to Virginia at the commencement of the rebellion three years ago.

Have been in Maryland once since, was in the army as private first then Major Ma. Cav. reorganization of the army left me out.

My wife has been with me all the time. Had \$100 in confederate money and other money amounting to \$5 or \$6. My object in coming was to communicate with Mrs. Maddon wife of Jos. R. Maddon a paroled prisoner now in Richmond, come at the request of her husband to advise her not to sell her farm. Brought over one letter to Provost Marshal Gen. Mc Phail, Baltimore Md. Robert Clark and two negroes come with me. Clark brought package of letters think he come for the purpose of running the blockade, intended to have returned the second night after my arrival in Maryland, had designed to take such white sugar, vanilla,

and whiskey, I had no other purpose of coming over here
than above stated, with the exception of personal clothing

Mr. Maddox was arrested as a blockade runner by
the Richmond authorities and paroled. Have known
Maddox 18 months is a very cautious man. Think he had
no connection with the Rebel Government. Think he has
run the blockade. Has or had tobacco on the Virginia shore,
under a guard. Was in Richmond about the first of this
month, obtained a pass from Gen. Winder to visit the south-
ern ports. Never knew Rob. Clarke till two or three months
ago. have seen ⁱⁿ him in Richmond, Don't know what he has done
or not in Richmond, Decline to answer how many trips
there was in Richmond at the time of Kilpatrick's raid, was at
Warsaw at the time, was doing nothing in particular there. Come
out from Richmond in charge of a portion of the tobacco about
80 boxes or 10,000 lbs. do not know the owners of the tobacco
but judge that Mr. Maddox was largely interested.
I never intended to go to Baltimore, being poor and
a family to support I accepted the agency to bring

the tobacco to the Indians and that my connection with
it was at an end. I had no interest in the tobacco.
I was merely a paid agent at a fixed salary.

Capt. Leonard kindly forwarded to me your letter relating to the case of Henry Paulding. I at once set on foot inquiries relating to the point to which you directed attention, & I enclose you the result in the shape of an afft of Mrs. Bradley with a letter from her son annexed.

The mistake in the name to be made by the son in his letter, is I trust, sufficiently explained in the afft. Should his afft be considered essential, we could doubtless procure it, had we time to do so. But I apprehend it will not be required.

Paulding said he told Gen. Dix that Bone & Simpkins who made the affidavits I sent by the officer who arrested Paulding, were persons

of bad character. I have known them both for several years & would give them full credit as witnesses. They are entirely disinterested in this matter - except perhaps in so far as they may feel an interest in seeing the guilty punished & a poor, destitute woman righted. And this feeling is common to our whole community.

Permit me, Captain, to thank you for your courtesy to me in our interview relating to this matter, & for the prompt attention given by you to the case.

I am sure Gen. Dix will do an acceptable service to the people of our village by properly punishing Paulding, should he deem the evidence sufficient to warrant it.



In answer to a writ of Habeas
Corpus dated directed to and commanding myself
and others to bring before your Honor, the bodies of Orville
Shout and Bedford Evans, I beg leave respectfully
to state that I am a Military Officer of the
United States of America, duly commissioned

acting under orders as Provost Marshal General
of the Military District of Kentucky, and as such,
I have the custody of the above named parties, and as
such military officer, I am only amenable to the judi-
cial officers of the Government of said U.S. and not
to those of the State of Ky., and must therefore decline
to obey the writ. This I do with no contempt for your
Honorable Court, but from my sense of duty as an
Officer.

They went to St. Louis and Mr. Murphy concluded to sell them or at least Ann & George and bring Scott and Hannah home if they were willing to come which he did not (would) owing to his age & feebleness I have been in the habit of transacting ^{all} his business that required my

absence from home he (Murphy) employed me to go to St. Louis and attend to it for him. I there learned that one of his negroes was at Mr. Shout's, and the balance in the neighborhood. I then according to Murphy's instruction pointing sold Ann & George and Conditionally Bett & Hannah to Mr. Shout, the conditions were that of Mr. (Shout) Should put George in the service & it was out of our power to come back we take them off again which Murphy was to be the judge, he (Shout) was to inform Bett & Hannah to turn or make other arrangements as they saw fit open with a distinct understanding that at any time Mr. Murphy could accept Shout's previous offer to buy back the slaves by making him a bill of sale of them. I made the Bill of Sale for Hannah and not recollecting the date of the same action nor the previous Bill of Sale I left the date of the Bill of Sale blank supposing Shout could fill it up without deteriorating the instrument itself. Mr. Shout saw Mr. Lindsay a few days before he went to Ky. and asked him as a mutual friend if he thought

knowing the condition of the trade if he thought Murphy would have any objection to his taking Hannah with him to Kentucky & he (Lindsay) told him he thought not (which was a fact). Mr Chiffelle reluctantly took the oath, and expressed a desire to conform to army rules and regulations that should be required of him for the government of his school; he was directed to teach the "American Colors" on his school building, and keep them flying between school and church daily. This Henry Bush was handed over on certain conditions by Mrs. Spence to her nephew Kennedy O'Norris, who when he went South, entered the Rebel service, placed in Campbell's jail from whence she was taken by Mr. W. H. Farnam for his own benefit, without any word from Mr. Norris relating to her.

She now Henry Bush is on a visit to Mrs. Spence & does not wish to return to servitude, notwithstanding her kind treat-
ment by said Farnam.

My dear Madam
Yours of March 31st is this
moment recd. in which you
inform me that Henry Bush
a girl who has been in my
service is now with you;
and also that you let Owen
Morris have this girl on
certain terms, which terms
have not been complied
with, and therefore he has
forfeited all claim to her.
But if by his conduct in
relation to her he had not
forfeited this right his
having joined the Rebel Mil-
itary service would forfeit

all his claim to her as
property; you say you can-
not believe me ignorant
of his being in the Rebel Army
and cannot presume to pre-
sume I have a right to hold her
as the property and for
the benefit of one so em-
ployed. When I got
this girl she came to me
directly from Campbell's
jail where I understand
she had been placed by
Mr Morris for misconduct.
I have never in my life
seen Mr Morris or Mr Owen
Morris; I had supposed
Mr Owen Morris was a boy.
I had no knowledge of
any rights they possessed in
any property and received
the girl but for the purpose

of any benefit to them but
solely for my own use and
benefit. It is a matter of
indifference to me to whom
I pray the wages I intend
to pray for this girl; but
my rights are not matters
of indifference to me, and
I hold the right to her
service for the year 1864.
You say in your letter
you shall communicate
to General Wallace, the
Military Commandant
the facts you have written
to me in regard to
the girl. If this be for
the purpose of establishing
your right to her, as
between yourself and Mr
Morris, I have nothing
to do with it. I certainly

lay no claim to her except
for ~~the~~ service for the bal-
ance of the year, - If it
be to contest that claim
and General Wallace will
decide such a matter, you
could select no one I would
prefer to him. As to Morris' ^{service in}
ⁱⁿ the Rebel Army,
if he is in that service I have
no knowledge of it, never
even having heard it ~~sostated~~
until I received your letter
to day. I had on several occasions
heard of his being in the South,
but as I have stated I never
saw or exchanged a word
with him, or any member of
his family, or had any written
connection with them; -
and as you presume in your
letter, I held this girl for my
own use and benefit, and

not because she was his
property or for his benefit.
I have always felt a pride
in the proper treatment
of those in my employ.
And am glad this girl
has acknowledged to
you that my wife and
myself have so treated
her.

I shall be glad to
hear from you more fully
as to this matter at your

I address you as
the Commandant of
this Military Department.
Some years since I gave
upon certain terms to
my nephew Kennedy Owen
Norris the son of my brother
William Henry Norris of
the City of Baltimore a
negro girl named Henry
Bush. Both Kennedy Owen
& William Henry Norris
shortly after the breaking out
of this rebellion joined the

Rebel Army or entered
into the service of the
rebel government. Before
leaving the City of Baltimore
they placed this negro girl
in the slave jail of the
Majors Campbell from
whence she was taken
after a confinement of
several weeks by Mr.
William H. Gorman of
Greenbrier County of
this State, with whom she
has been living up to the
present time. A few days
since she arrived here on
a visit to her mother who
is in my service. Henry does
not wish to return to Mr.
Gorman, but desires her
freedom under the Proclama-
tion of the President.

Of all those facts I wrote to
Mr William H. Gorman
and informed him. His
reply I enclose to you in
the accompanying copy,
in which you will see that
he claims title to the service
of the negro for this current
year, but in what manner
or under what authority
he does not state in his
letter nor can I imagine.
It appears in his letter
to studiously avoid any
disclosure of that authority,
but explicitly to state that
he has no connection or
knowledge of those who
owned her and are now
in the rebel service, I
presume to avoid any
suspicion of sympathy

with or giving them aid
and comfort. It is proper
that I should inform you
who I am. I am the wife of
Judge T. C. Spence of
this Judicial Circuit,
but held this ~~property~~ serv-
vant as my separate
property in which and
as such I now write of
it. In this connection
I refer you to Mr Thomas
