I am directed by Major Gen Wallace to say that he has information that two ~~persons~~ ~~had~~ ~~been~~ ~~sent~~ ~~to~~ ~~the~~ ~~Eastern~~ ~~on~~ ~~the~~ ~~Eastern~~ ~~Shore~~ having proper furloughs. While there they were seized by certain Petzels who tore up their furloughs, and committed one of them to jail; and sent the other to work. A Mr Goldsborough is said to have had some connection with the affair.

The Gen Comd directs that you investigate the circumstances, recover the negroes, and arrest all parties engaged in the business.

The annexed order was received on the day of its date 14<sup>th</sup> inst.

You will find also copy of pass the negro man David Johnson had -

I feel it due to myself that a true statement of facts should be given you, from which you will see if the course pursued by me in restoring my property was sufficient to require so peremptory an order.

The negro had attempted to return to Baltimore on the Steamer Champion, and had been put on shore as the officers of the boat did not consider his pass properly authenticated, not having an official signature -

It was on the following day that I saw him for the first time, and again was he refused passage on the same Steamer -

This was on Tuesday, the boy I directed on the following day to go work, and told him

at the time as his pass would not take  
him to Baltimore, he could look for no  
one else than myself in the County -  
and said further to him, that when Col  
Leonard who was expected in Easton should  
arrive the matter would be laid before him.  
Mr Hollyday did consult Col Leonard  
in the case of his negro man, who was  
embraced in same pass - Col Leonard  
replied his duties did not cover the case -  
The negro professed willingness to return  
and promised to do so, not coming and hearing  
nothing of him for two days, I then directed  
an officer to arrest him -  
He had not been in the Army & was 49 years old -  
I have been very careful not to interfere in any  
way with those negroes of mine who have been  
placed in the Army -

A number of them have gone off and returned  
who were unfit for the Army, and in those  
instances I have endeavored to have them  
returned to their homes -

Lloyd respectively, arrived at Easton with a pass, <sup>for ten days</sup> from the superintendants of the public stables at Gibbons' Point. (It appears that these men had gone off with a recruiting party but having been rejected by the examining Surgeon were employed by the Quartermaster's Dep't. at Gibbons' Pt.) At the expiration of their time they went aboard the steamer and started on their return but were put off at the first stopping place by the steamer officials for the reason - as they allege - that the steamer company might be liable to action in civil court for taking on board slaves - they not being in the military service and their pass not being signed by a military officer. Sept. 3<sup>rd</sup> they again went to the boat, but not being allowed to go aboard they were arrested by the constable and lodged in jail. The reason he assigns for this step is, that by the laws of the State he is compelled to take up all slaves found lurking about doing no work. They were, on the 5<sup>th</sup> inst. released by their former owners.

At the expiration of their time, they went aboard the steamer and started on their return, but were put off at the first stopping place by the Steamboat Officials for the reason, - as they alledge -, that the Steamboat Company might be liable to action in civil court for taking on board slaves - they not being in the military service and their pass not being signed by a military officer. - September 3<sup>rd</sup> they again went to the boat, but not being allowed to go aboard, they were arrested by the Constable and lodged in Jail.

The reason he assigns for this step is, that by the laws of the state he is compelled to take up all slaves found lurking about doing no work. They were, on the 8<sup>th</sup> inst. released by their former owners and taken and put to work on their respective farms, where they still were on the 14<sup>th</sup> inst. I took charge of them and brought them to this City and turned them over to John Woolley Iron Master to be returned to Siskere Point.

I did not arrest any of the parties concerned in this transaction for the reason, that they can all be obtained at any time, if the Brig. Genl. Comd<sup>g</sup> desire it.

I beg  
leave to submit the following as  
the result of my enquiries in the  
matter of Ishmael Day's Property  
in Ballinon County.

Since the fire  
Mr Day has sold absolutely his entire  
property there for \$2000 and changed  
his residence to Ballinon City.

Before the  
fire the highest estimate placed  
upon the Land & Buildings by  
persons in the neighborhood was  
\$5000. Also that Mr Day had been  
endeavouring to sell, for some time  
previous to the destruction of his dwelling.

The present owner of the Land  
has solicited estimates from Builders  
for rebuilding the property, and a  
competent Carpenter of the neigh

plans to rebuild all the destroyed Buildings, in a better Condition than when destroyed, for \$4000. The owner is satisfied he can replace them for \$2500.

These figures refer to putting <sup>up</sup> New Buildings of the Character & dimensions, and on the sites of the old ones, what the Character of these new may be inferred from the following.

The Barn was built in 1827 or 1828 and the Roof having never been repaired was in very bad Condition.

The main part of the Dwelling House was built in the year 1831 at an entire cost of \$800. subsequently an addition of about half the dimensions of the main part was built, and the Character of this addition may be judged by the stairway

Which a Carpenter who inspected  
It at Mr. Day's solicitation, after  
the work was done, informs me he  
could readily construct in a day.

The Hay Barnard which in the  
Appraisalment is valued at \$1000,  
a Carpenter of the Neighborhood now  
offers to put up for \$400.

The Barn Appraised at \$1000.  
This Carpenter offers to put up for  
\$350.

The Wagon House appraised at  
\$800, was an old Structure of Logs  
very rotten, and as estimated by  
one Carpenter "possibly worth \$50,"  
by another "certainly not worth \$100."

The Calculations of the Officers  
who made the Appraisalment seem  
to be for first Class Buildings, and  
as that would not be far from  
Garnet; But They certainly could

not have been informed of the true  
character of the buildings destroyed,  
or they would not propose to com-  
pensate Mr Day by damages so far  
beyond what was actually lost.

In regard to persons classed as  
Rebels, to be levied upon, I will  
state that Mr A. W. Brown, my  
neighbor, utterly disclaims & repudiates  
any claim to be classed as a Rebel  
and I heartily endorse him, and  
he further denies that he is possessed  
of a single dollar of assessable property  
in Baltimore or Harford Counties, &  
this fact must have been known  
to some of the parties assembling  
the officers to make out the list.

My next neighbor, Mr Hugh Linnus  
likewise disclaims the character  
of Rebel attributed to him  
and refers to his past acts

and Conduct as his Arbiters in this  
suspect; I can add as a fact,  
I personally know that Hugh Simon  
was an ardent defender of the  
Union at a time (about the 19<sup>th</sup> Apr)  
when it was not quite so much  
the Fashion to be a Union man,  
scarcely that he has lost heavily  
by the destruction of his property  
by the Rebels, and in his interests  
by the rebellious.

→ Very many others  
on the list cannot, by fair  
means, be classed with Rebels,  
so that both as to Property & Men  
the informants of your officers  
are justly chargeable with either  
gross error or palpable wrongs.

In Conclusion I say that the  
controlling motive in submitting this  
Statement, is to prevent the perpetration  
of a wrong in the name of the Union.

Lockwood, which comprised statements affecting the valuation of the property of Ishmael Day by Lieut. N. Clayton A.D.C., the officer detailed by Brig Gen. Statement of Ishmael Day

I have sold my farm whereon were the buildings burned by Gilman's band, for \$2000. - the neighbors say it was worth \$3000. Before the war I did offer this property for sale at \$5000. but, to replace the buildings regard must be paid to the present very high price of building material and labor.

One part of my dwelling was built in 1831 and cost then \$800 to \$1000, exclusive of the value of material of an old house which was used in the construction of the new one and of timber from my woods.

The addition to the dwelling cost about the same as the main building viz. \$800 to \$1000, much timber in it from my woods not counted in this valuation.

My barn was built in 1827 or 1828, it cost then 600 to \$800. The roof when burned was sound and did

not leak.

My barrack or hay-house <sup>from recollection</sup> was 48 feet long, 28 feet wide and 14 feet to the roof, covered with shingles and weather-boarded all round, it would certainly cost now \$1000.

One part of my dwelling was built in 1831 and cost then \$800 to \$1000, exclusive of the value of material of an old house, which was used in the construction of the new one and timber from my woods - The addition to the dwelling cost about the same as the main building, viz. \$500 to \$1000, much timber in it from my woods not counted in this valuation.

My barn was built in 1827 or 1828, it cost then \$600 to \$800, the roof, when burned was sound and

The burning of my property put me to the immediate expense of bringing my family to Baltimore, where I did for a time board at \$5.00 per week and since at a house kept at a high rent.

Lieutenant: I obedience to instructions from Head Quarters, 3<sup>d</sup> Separate Brigade, 8<sup>th</sup> A. C. I proceeded, in Company with Lt. H. Clayton A. S. C. to the place of the late residence of Schmael Day Esq, and carefully examined the premises. I found all the buildings destroyed, except two small tenements. I went from Mr. Day's place, to a church near by, at which place the disloyal citizens of the vicinity had met for the purpose of hearing the report of a Committee that had been to see the President, relative to the matter.

I exhibited the estimate of damage, made by Lt. Clayton to a number of them, and asked their opinions concerning it, but none of them would say that it was too high. They said that the aggregate was heavy, but the property could not be replaced for less than the amount named. A certain Mr. Chatterton, who has the name of being a loyal man, is the leading spirit

in filing objections to the Estimate. From the best information I could obtain, Mr. Chatter Tom, is employed and paid by the disloyal men upon whom the damage is likely to be assessed. I am of opinion he is a dangerous man, for I think him unscrupulous.

My own opinion, relative to damage sustained by Mr. Day, is, that the amount estimated by St. Clayton, is not sufficient to replace the property, at the present time.

time came near me to offer me any part of his wages or to recognize his indentures to me. Under these circumstances a few days ago he being in town I had him carried to jail to await the next meeting of the Orphan Court so that he might be returned to me with his lost time added in a proceeding entirely in accordance with our State Law & frequently performed. As the Judges of the Orphan Court were about to proceed in the performance of this customary duty the Sheriff entered the room and handed them a letter directed to him & just received from <sup>the</sup> Lieut. commanding his forbidding the boy being returned to me against his will on the ground that he was entitled to Military Protection. The Boy has never been in the Military service of the United States as before stated & being exempted from Military

and came home as many others  
did from here among whom are a  
number of slaves who have returned to their former  
masters & are now with them labor-  
ing as slaves of their own accord

This boy is still mine the term  
for which he was formerly bound  
to me not having yet expired. He also

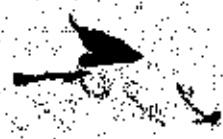

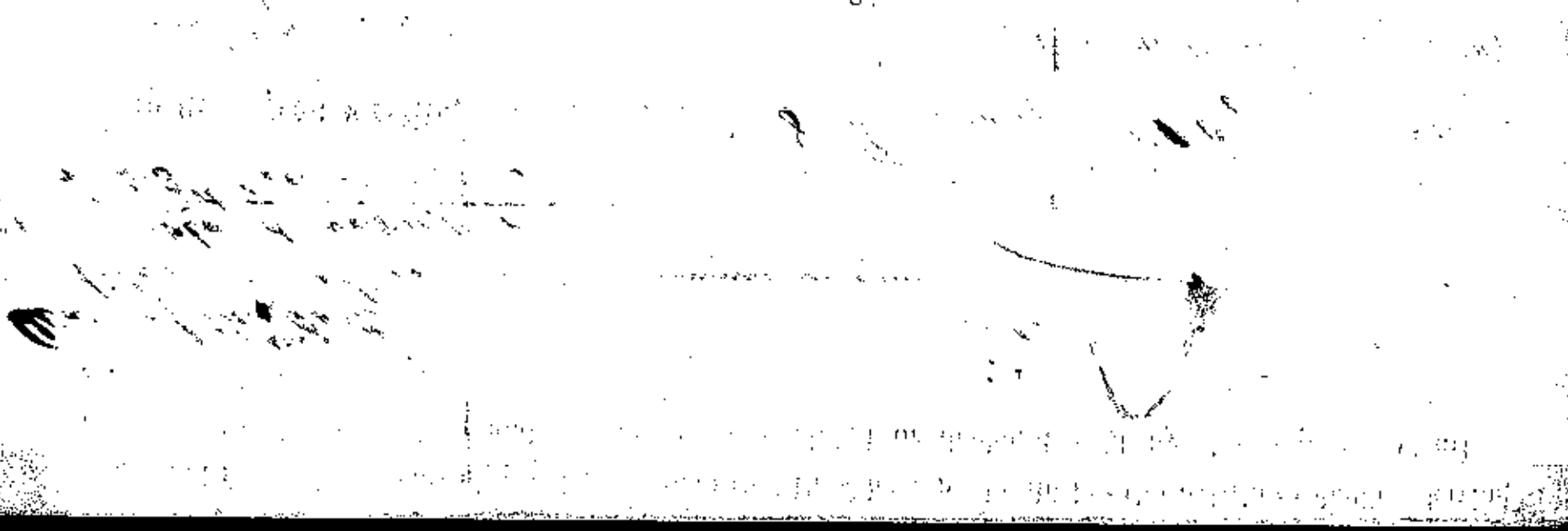

Robert then drew a pistol. Robert was on horse back with a bag before him I do not know what kind of a pistol it was. At the same time that Robert drew his pistol the other man drew a pistol. Robert said that the plantation was free and that he could pass as he went. I then told him he could not.

Robert then said that before he would pay he would blow my brains out.

I then left the gate and went to Mr. Edward Le Blanc. to get a pass. to send to Mr. Ernest Pedesclaus to tell him of the cause that the folks made with me at the gate.

On Sunday I went to Donaldsonville to see the place where the boys stayed so that I could inform of them and found out that they were in a Carpenter shop on the Green.

J. W. Bailey says being informed by  
Mr Pedesclaux of this affair I came to  
the Provost Marshals office and entered  
a complaint. bringing the man Edmond  
with me as evidence (open which Gen  
Amit then Acting as Provost Marshal  
acted, and caused the arrest of the

I find that Mr. Godchaux took the oath of Allegiance to the U. S. Government on the 29<sup>th</sup> day of April 1863 at Franklin La, that he remained in said place up to March 1864 at which time the U. S. Government seized his store for an Ordnance Depot, he was by that means thrown out of business and moved to New Orleans. Before moving from Franklin, Captain Inwood 165<sup>th</sup> U. S. Vols. then Pro. Marshal of Franklin" was allowed by Mr. Godchaux to occupy his house (Godchaux) on condition that he would take care of the furniture. In April Captain Inwood removed from said house one large looking glass and two large pictures and sent them to Captain Sheldon through a Captain Smith a. L. Pm." stating that the Glass and Pictures were a present from Captain Inwood to Captain Sheldon. Captain Sheldon now has this property in his possession but says

says he will not give them up with-  
out an order from Captain Inwood  
he says he received them from him  
as a present and he will not give  
them up until he is compelled to.

Smith in Charleston Mo and told him that I see some things at Paces Landing marked for him he asked me what they were I told him I see two trunks he said he had no trunks or anything at Paces Landing there was some other conversation amounting to nothing some jokes as we both expected the goods were for some one else. we both stayed at Mr. Bridges on the night of the day that we had the conversation. I have not been at Paces Landing since, the day I see the goods at the Landing my business at the landing was to purchase some furniture I was told that there was a store at Paces Landing and one on Good Island and I contemplated that I could get some furniture at one or the other places, when I got to the Landing, Price told me that he had a table for sale and I bargained for it but do not know what I was to pay as Mr. Price said he had not got the bill of the table, he had ordered it for

Personally appeared before the undersigned, Asst. Provost Marshal at Charleston Mo. Norman Gale, and after being duly sworn, says I reside in Charleston Mo. by occupation a clerk in the employ of Keenan Gorman a Merchant in the place. I was in the store on the 12<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup> of Sept 1864, on the 12<sup>th</sup> Thomas Davis, George Jorden, and a strange man I did not know, but since learned that his name was Kiser, came into the store, Mr. Gorman waited on Mr. Davis and when I got leave, I made out a bill for the goods purchased by Davis, Mr. Gorman giving pieces, I do not know of Mr. Jorden purchasing any goods on that day, as to whether Mr. Kiser purchased any goods or not I am unable to state as the store was very throng with customers on that day and some of them strangers. On the 13<sup>th</sup> Davis and the man whose name I learned since was Kiser came into the store. Davis purchased a few more articles on that day and Mr. Gorman attached them on the bottom of the bill that I made out the day before, if the other man purchased any goods I have no knowledge of it, On the night of the 13<sup>th</sup> inst. Supt Vandiver, and Corporal Brown, of Co. 2<sup>nd</sup> Cav. Mo. M, came to the store and asked me for the goods that Mr. Davis had purchased



I told them I knew nothing of the goods, and that Mr. Gorman was at his Dwelling House. Mr. Brown went to the house for Mr. Gorman and they came to the store together, Mr. Gorman told them he would go with them to the Provost Marshal, and explain the matter to his satisfaction, when they came back from the Provost Marshals office Mr. Gorman looked around in the store a while, and I found the box of Flannel and the box of linen in a Bbl. sitting under the shelf with loose paper in it and I supposed was overlooked when putting the other things in a sack, Mr. Gorman told me to go down to his house and in the yard and bring up the sack, I went but did not find it and came or started back to the store and met Mr. Gorman and Seryt W and driver Mr. Gorman then told me it was under a bush I went back into the yard and found the sack and brought it to the store. I think it contained shoes and boots from the screaming noise made in handling it. I do not know of any boots or shoes belonging to any person being in the room of Mr. Gorman's house on the night or day in question. We frequently have good of different kinds at the house since the threatened Raid; as to the 4 pieces of Points, Boots & shoes shown me I cannot say whether they came from Mr. Gorman's Store or not we have

Three years old, right eye out, one of the saddles  
belongs to Mr. Fry my neighbor the other is mine.  
on the morning of the 15<sup>th</sup> inst. Mr. Rice came to my

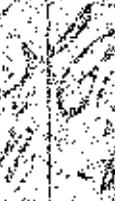

## Statement

Abraham Scagg, a citizen of Jefferson County, on his oath states that in the fall of 1861 meetings were held in the vicinity of Hurree Springs Jefferson Co. for the purpose of raising men whose object was to make an attack on the Pacific Railroad and to tear up the track of the same at or near the town of Qurekka; and that reinforcements could not be sent to the Union army, and that the principal instigators of this movement were a person commonly called Do Moore, and Isaac Newton Burns also Mr Noah Wise, George Tibbs and A. C. North all of whom were citizens of Jefferson County at the time.

Affiant also states that near the town of Hurree Springs in the County of Jefferson meetings of a secret order (commonly called Knights of the Golden Circle) were regularly held, and the object of these meetings were opposition to the United States government and that Mr A. J. Moore, Isaac Newton Burns, Noah Wise, George Tibbs, A. C. North, Simeon Kyle, John Johnson, Richard

Lloyd: Christian Tibbs: John Durringer  
John Davis, Henry Heldebrand: and Jose  
Wilson were present at them also state  
that these meetings were held frequently,  
as often as once a week that he  
himself (Affiant) was present at  
three or four of these meetings: that  
the matters of discussion when he was  
present was chiefly as to how to procure  
arms for the south states that  
he saw an auth. administered by  
J N Burns to several who were  
bound to assist in this object—  
said Burns giving out that he was  
a commissioned Officer in the service  
of the Southern Confederacy  
Also states that he saw one load  
of arms buried just his residence  
but does not know who buried  
them or where they were taken  
to, but ~~he~~ he saw four muskets  
in a fence corner on the farm of  
The Widow Wolkers and states  
that J N Burns told him there  
was a load buried near the stable  
on the same place. Also states that

Widow Wodkins and A. J. Moore fed the men  
who went south towards and carried food  
to their camp for them; was in the  
himself and saw it - Also states there  
were prisoners who were taken at  
Arkansas just escaped from a steamboat  
carrying up the Mississippi and passed  
through the neighborhood of Haines Springs  
that they were harbored and fed by  
Spencer Kyle & J. L. Berrington that  
this passed under his own observation  
and that he saw these escaped prisoners  
in Kyles house he (Kyle) knowing  
them to be such.

Colonel,

I have the honor to inform you that, as I was sitting with Colonel Thickett in the St. Charles Hotel, on the 26<sup>th</sup> August last, a detective named Price (who was introduced to me by Captain Page Assist. Prov. Marsh. Genl. about 4 months since) called me aside, and asked me to lend him \$150. for two days to pay a man to whom he owed this sum and who was troubling him for the same.

My answer was that he should call at my office the next day.

At about 12 o'clock, on the 27<sup>th</sup> Aug. Mr. Price with another man called upon me at my office 40 Camp Street.

Mr. Price then renewed his application for the loan, saying it was to pay

the gentleman who accompanied him.

I asked the latter if such were the case, and he replied in the affirmative, upon which I handed him a check in his name of 'Brookman'. This entire transaction occurred in the presence of a Mr. Dreggs, and also of a French Gentleman.

On Monday 29<sup>th</sup> August I was arrested by order of Provost Marshal Robinson, and taken to the Parish Prison, where I was kept until 31<sup>st</sup> August when I was taken before the Provost Judge Warrmoth, who after hearing the case released me on 1000<sup>£</sup> Bail.

On September 1<sup>st</sup> I was again arrested by order of the same Provost Marshal, for the same cause.

Being taken before him I stated that I was released on Bail, and at the same time requested permission to state the whole of the case, but he refused to listen to me, and ordered me to be confined in the 1<sup>st</sup> Dist. Police Station, where I was kept in close

confinement until Sept. 2,<sup>nd</sup> when I was again  
liberated by order of Judge Warmoth.

Having learnt that an order is again  
issued for my arrest, and that the house in  
which I have resided has been searched by  
3 detectives since my last release, I most  
respectfully request I be permitted to give  
my own as Bail for my appearance in  
Court when required - in order that I may  
have my liberty to attend to business.

I have stated the whole transaction so far  
as I know it; I am perfectly ignorant of what  
Messrs Price and Brookerman may be engaged  
or inculpedated in; and I ask the right of  
liberty on bail, as I most respectfully  
submit it is great injustice to hunt  
down a gentleman as I have been, when  
my only fault has been to lend \$150  
in good faith for two days.

Sergt. Robert Meyers, was directed by Capt. Warren, to  
arrest a deserter by the name of Clinton Meelers, on Sun-  
day Sept. 5<sup>th</sup> 1864.

The Sergt. with two soldiers went to Meelers house, but did  
not find him at home, the Sergt. then commenced to search  
the house, for the purpose of finding Government property.  
He broke open a chest and found in it, a lot of  
cassimerette and flannels, taking some of the goods with  
him to Mc. Connellsburg, and turned them over to Capt.  
Warren, who allowed him to keep the flannel for the  
purpose of having some shirts made.

The Sergt. took the flannel to a lady in Town for the  
purpose of having it made up, but found he did not have  
enough to make two shirts, she directed him to go to Pur

Hokes, a store keeper in Town, and see if he could get the goods matched.

Mr. Hokes when he saw the goods told the Sergt. that some of the same kind of goods had been stolen from him, and asked the Sergt. where he obtained the goods. the Sergt. replied that he bought it at Green Castle. Mr Hokes remarked that for the recovery of the goods he had lost and finding the thief, he would pay the sum of \$50.00. as a reward. The Sergt. replied he could find the goods and the thief, this on Monday morning Sept. 5th 1864.

Mr Hokes at once procured a search warrant and proceeded with a civil officer - the Sergt. with a detail of men ordered by Capt. Warren, accompanying him to Inceless house arresting Inceless, and found most of the goods. The Sergt. when on the way to Inceless house admitted to Mr Hokes, that the flannel he had tried to get matches at his store, he took from Inceless house, on the 4th inst. And also told Mr Hokes that he had some blue cassimere at the Hotel in W. Conrallsburg, taken at the same time which - he would return to him. The Sergt. received from Mr,

Hookes the sum of \$22.00 and a few yds. of flannel. Mr Hookes afterward examined Philip Shoop Barnett, a citizen, who was with the Sergt. on Sunday, the 4<sup>th</sup> inst. at Preeless house, and states that the Sergt. took 4 pieces of goods, 2 pieces of blue casmerett, one of white flannel, and one of striped flannel. The Sergt. admits that he took 3 pieces, 2 of blue casmerett, and one of ~~blue~~<sup>striped</sup> flannel, but denies taking the piece of white flannel. The flannel and one piece of blue <sup>casmerette</sup> was returned to Mr. Hookes, by the Sergt. the other piece of blue casmerett was retained by Capt. Warren.

When the party had returned from Preeless house Monday night (the 5<sup>th</sup> inst.) Mr Hookes told Capt. Warren, that there was some of the goods missing, and describing them to Capt. Warren, among which was the piece of goods that the Capt. had received from Sergt. Myers. Capt Warren told Mr Hookes he would try and help him find the goods and at once ordered a detachment of men to search Preeless fathers house which was but a short distance from the town.

The party did so, but did not find any of the goods. The next morning Capt. Warren, left Th<sup>c</sup> Counellsburg.

taking with him some of the stolen casmerett, he was accompanied by Lt. Fullweiler and 7 men. Lt. Fullweiler went to Mercersburg, and was then ordered by the Capt. to return at once to M<sup>o</sup>. Connelburg, with two men, the Capt. going on to Gettysburg, taking with him 5 men, and the stolen casmerett. The Lt. did not return to M<sup>o</sup>. Connelburg until Thursday the 8<sup>th</sup> inst.

Sworn to before me on 19 1864

Q. Where do you live.?

A. I live in Shelby Co. Mo.

Q. What is your age?

A. Forty three years.

Q. What is your occupation.

A. I am appointed a special agent of the Secret Police & ordered to report to Genl McNeil at Rolla, a few weeks ago on special service. I reported to him on the 5<sup>th</sup> & went to work immediately in his District. I examined a good many persons & obtained a good deal of information.

There was a woman, ~~born~~ from Arkansas, living within 12 miles of Batesville, who arrived at Rolla with a team from that place. She came up to get some goods, ostensibly & made her purchases. She got her bills properly permitted at the Prov Marshal's office & ~~then started back~~. I followed

her outside of the town & overhauled her, made an examination of her load & her bills, which were all correct. I found another bill on her, which was not permitted. It was concealed in her bosom & the medicines inventoried in the bill - three bottles of Quinine, a large jar of Blue mass and some other little packages of medicine were fastened to her boots underneath her dress. She obtained these drugs of Faulkner & Graves, a firm doing an extensive business at Rolla.

I gathered from a number of sources there, information showing to a moral certainty that this firm was engaged in selling an undue quantity of powder, that would go out in that direction, altho I have made no detection of that sort of thing. They are under arrest & their store locked up and under guard. I wanted to know if they had not better be sent up here for trial. I have the woman there under guard, as witness. The clerk acknowledged that the bill of those goods was made out at their store & she bought the medicines there. That bill & the medicines are deposited with the Prov Marshal down there.

A very considerable amount of salt has been shipped from St James a station on the railroad in that vicinity, that has gone down into Arkansas.

I also have information of a couple of women, who will be there in a few days, loaded down with Greenbacks & specie, to lay in a supply of contraband articles. They have been in the habit of doing that business. The father of one of these women is at Rolla & acting the part of a refugee.

This firm of Faulkner & Graves is immensely wealthy.

Graves is about to be commissioned Major in the 48th Regiment, 12 months service.

The U.S. Marshal for this District has referred to me your letter to him of this date enclosing extract of the civil order No 264, paragraph 5, in relation to the case of Mrs Harriet Brown & others, and has sought my advice about taking charge of the property referred to in the inclosed request, -

I am given to understand that the parties violated the Revenue laws by transshipping or attempting to transship into inclosure any District goods in excess of their permits. If this be so their goods are liable to seizure and condemnation by proceedings in the U.S. District Court, and the usual and proper course of proceedings in such case is for the Revenue officers to seize and report the seizure to the Dist Atty who files the necessary libel of information in Court upon which a warrant is issued by the Court to the U.S. Marshal, who then, and not till then, takes the custody of the property to abide the

judgment of the Court. -

In these cases of revenue seizure any one who will take the responsibility of doing so may seize in the first instance, without warrant, and it is the official duty of the collector to do so, if he is satisfied the law has been violated. The seizure must be made by, or reported to and adopted by the collector before the law officers of the government can fairly act upon the case, and the Marshal has no more right to the property than any private person until he is served by a warrant from the Court.

With Mr. Howard, the collector, it is different. It is not only his right, but his duty to seize without a warrant, and to demand and hold the property for the purpose of being produced against in Court.

I have therefore felt it my duty to advise the U.S. Marshal not to receive the property under the circumstances stated, and take the liberty of suggesting that the business which the Commanding General seems to have in view of placing the whole business in the hands of the civil authorities, may be readily accomplished by



It is with the deepest emotions of heart-felt gratitude that while terror and death reign over our land, — we are permitted to respond to your very kind letter under date 5<sup>th</sup> Inst. imparting to us the glad intelligence of the early arrival of a Regiment of Troops for our protection.

We rejoice this day that we have friends that they will not only hear our complaint, but that they are willing to redress our grievances.

Yours imparted to us a joy that started the willing flow of long restrained tears from our mournful eyes, Yes, eyes that mourn over losses of loyal friends & a distracted and down trodden Country.

A click has long reigned here detrimental to every manly citizen who were loyal to our beloved Government and brought us who are survivors of time into the greatest dilemma almost inextricable.

We are refugees at this Post having been robbed and spoiled of all we had that was valuable and driven from our abodes leaving our families that are dear to us unprotected to the tender mercies of the Savage Barbarity of the heartless Bushwhackers whose deeds are deeds of cruelty.

For nearly 4 months we lay on rude couches just at the opening of our doors that we might easily awake upon the first approach of the enemy and effect our escape by flying ~~to~~ to the thick wood and deep ravines for personal safety.

But Southern Sympathizers can stay at their homes in perfect security with their families equally protected with us by our own Troops. Genl. How long shall this be? — Banishment and every reasonable means of punishment should be levied upon them till they are willing to cease giving aid and comfort and information of a Munde Character for the destruction of loyalists.

We can not live with them either the one or the other party have to leave the country.

When the Arms were promiscuously returned to the people we opposed it and when the Troops were withdrawn from us we warmly protested against it till we were no longer consulted in regard to any matter but when the Country was veiled in danger & distress we were the best of fellows.

Now they that were instrumental in the experiment that has armed and given authority to Savage brutality have fled the Country and gone to St Louis and other places for personal security whom the Mildness of our Government by its patronage furnished means in abundance to carry them away while through poverty we are compelled to stand here in hazard and protect their property and families and board ourselves. When shall the government care of its true friends and care for them in their

privations and distresses. We have been afraid, to open up our true convictions to higher authority, fearful that we should incur the displeasure of those having rule over us. But we have often met together and spoken of our griefs in private for nearly 4. months.

Genl. While we deplore rashness as much as any sane minds could as Christian followers of our Lord Jesus we conclude it is all that will now save our <sup>hastden</sup> Country.

———— We are very desirous to impress your mind with the importance of the influence that Slavery has had upon this people here, biasing Union men into a sympathy with Southern friends here, who have, and have lost Slaves. If you will keep this in mind you will find it the turning key to all the mysterious revelations among this people.

Genl. — If you please accept our warmest thanks, for your kind letter of comfort to us, and meditate on the points set forth in this, in all honesty of conscience, and inform our department Commander of that which is useful and oblige us and our Country.

In conclusion as we think the cause of our Country the cause of our God, we beseech, that he may impart to you wisdom, discretion, and power, to judge correctly so great a people and to maintain our Government and annos every where is our unworthy but unfeigned prayer for Christ's sake. Amen.

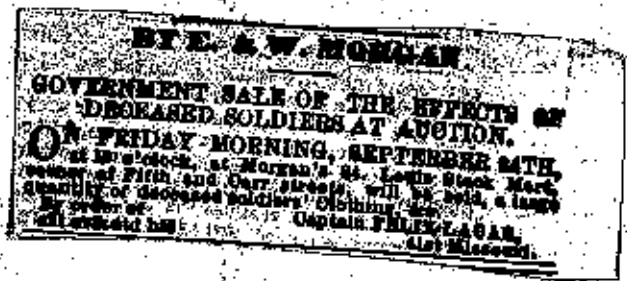

William Anderson being sworn on his oath says & deposes in the City of St. Louis Mo. I am watchman on the (Memphis) St. Louis Wharf Boat in the Harbor of St. Louis Mo. On the morning of the 13th inst about 5 o'clock A.M. I found three men (one of whom I recognize as a prisoner here present and whose name I have learned is Thomas McDonough, they were coming across a barge from the St. Boat S. W. Graham towards the levee. They had three sacks and one bed tick full of cotton which they were carrying away with them. I caught McDonough and one of the others, (the third one escaped) and turned them over to the Provost Guard on the levee. About 6 o'clock A.M. of the same day I saw a man whom I recognize as a prisoner here present and whose name I have since learned is Michael Kennedy, he was coming off said St. Boat, S. W. Graham, he had in his hands and was carrying away a bed tick filled with cotton. I took the cotton from him and put it into the office on the wharf boat and told Kennedy to call at 9 o'clock and prove that the cotton was his and he would get it. Before 9 o'clock

A. M. The Cotton aforesaid found in  
possession of Kennedy was missing off  
the wharf boat and Capt S. H. Wood  
took me to arrest Kennedy and deliver  
him to the Provost Marshal which I  
accordingly did. The three whom  
I first found carrying away cotton as

 will be all that is necessary, but  
 in the Winter, when the River is  
 frozen over, it may require 50.  
 I think, therefore, it is stated, that that  
 part of our County will require  
 a force for Police purposes, and  
 I trust you will order things  
 accordingly.

Sir:

We regard it not only our privilege but duty to vindicate ourselves against the shafts of malice which first found utterance at the hands of blind partizans zeal, and finally resulted in the wrong and outrage done us by the publication of Special Order No 50 issued by Genl Pleasanton, late in Command of the District of Central Missouri. We do not simply claim to be loyal men to the Government of the United States. We are, and ever since the commencement of the unhappy troubles in our country, have been more; we have been openly and actively loyal. We have not simply refrained from acts of disloyalty, but when the Governor of Missouri called upon the people to

enter into military organizations for the defence of the State against rebels we personally and with alacrity responded to the call, and have perilled our lives and our property in the cause, and we are ready to do so again. Having done all this, it is with deep humiliation we feel compelled to enter a defence of our loyalty and of our conduct as citizens. But the malevolence of party spirit developed in the tricks and chicanery of party organization, compels us to do so.

We have been Union men from the start and in evidence of the fact we beg to submit the accompanying letters of Colonel W. W. Flesch, commanding the 42<sup>d</sup> Regiment E. M. M., in whose regiment we have served either as commissioned officers or as private soldiers; also the accompanying letters of Major N. M. Smallwood, A. A. G. 1<sup>st</sup> Brig. M. S. M. (formerly A. A. G. of the 2<sup>d</sup> Mil. Div. E. M. M.) and of Colonel Heiskox, now commanding

said Second Meib District.

But it is proper for us to state how the misrepresentations against <sup>us</sup> came to be made. It was done through what purports to be the Committee of Safety for Meiller County. Who compose that pretended Committee, and how were they appointed? We assert they were not appointed at any such meeting as was contemplated by General Order 107. There was no general call for a meeting of the citizens for that purpose. There was a County Convention of a political party to nominate candidates for political and County offices, and the Convention notice for that Convention was the only one published except so far as may possibly have been given in the town of Tuscumbea on the day the meeting was held. We are creditably informed that after the adjournment of the political Convention, called Radical, proclamation was made that a meeting would then be held under Order 107

nobody being present but the adherents of a given party organization. It was at such a meeting that a committee was appointed; a meeting of a party faction who, <sup>falsely</sup> claim that they alone are loyal and that all others are rebels.

As you are doubtless aware, General, we each organized a company of Citizen Guards, and tendered their services to the Major General then commanding at Warrersburg, for the protection of the lives and property of the Citizens of Miller County against Bushwhackers. While we sincerely believe the men composing our Companies would have done good service against the Bushwhackers, still it is due to ourselves, and to you, to account for the presence in our Commands of men who have been known as Southern sympathizers. We had before us Gen. Pleasant's special Order No 42 which, as we interpreted it, required all citizens to declare at once and for all time, whether they were for <sup>or</sup> against the Government, that but two classes of citizens would be recognized, the loyal and the disloyal, and all who refused to go into

Some military organizations for the defence of the Country against the Common enemy, should be regarded as disloyal and sent out of the Country. This left the sympathisers (and Union men, too) the alternatives of joining some military Company, or of banishment by Gen. Pleasanton, or going to the Bush. It was under these circumstances these men came forward and asked to be permitted to join our Companies. The terms of Order #2 implied that all citizens might make their election which alternative they would accept; nay more, not that they might make such election, but they were absolutely required to do so. These men chose to place themselves in the ranks as soldiers, claiming that General Pleasanton's order required them to do so.

Owing to obey the orders of the General Commanding, we permitted them

to enroll in our companies.

Such, General, is the history of this matter, and thus it happened there were some sympathizers in our Commands.

But, General, we chiefly aim at a vindication of ourselves, and believing that you will not allow us to rest under the foul calumny of disloyalty, we remain,

I regret not having  
seen you at Waverly. You had  
left before I heard of your being there.  
There are two cases to which I wished to  
call your attention.

Doct. Hort is a very respectable citizen of this  
county about 70 years of age, in times  
past he has been a leading man, having  
been frequently our representative.

Some of his negroes went to Mason City taking  
with them his wagon & two valuable  
mules. He sent his grand son a lad of  
sixteen after his wagon & mules and  
they arrested him in Mason City keeping  
his horse or mule. He has now been a  
prisoner four or five weeks. The pretext  
for keeping this property & the boy a prisoner  
is that Doct. Hort hauled provisions to  
a rebel camp with this team & that the  
boy drove them. Two years ago under  
duress he did haul provisions to Poin-  
sletter. But since that time there  
has been no rebel camp in that vicin-  
ity. About 12 months ago six bush-  
whackers with Doct. Hort's negroes were  
near there. But certainly a wagon would not  
be required for that number and no one  
believes at the time that they were there  
through Doct. Hort's connivance.

But in these times there is necessarily much to forget & forgive and if no offense has been committed within twelve months it may well be overlooked. One of the mules belongs to Henry Holt who was a Lieut. Col. early in the war under Price. He was pardoned by the President more than two years ago, and all admit his conduct has been since that time unexceptionable.

I believe you will do good by ordering the return of the property and the release of J. Sefour this grand son.

The other case is this. The soldiers from Allen about 20 in number were ordered to go six miles beyond Huntsville and take from an old man near 40 years of age his negro woman & her children. The old man is a very inoffensive citizen, and has a large collection of good citizens.

The pretext is that the woman's husband is in the service. There is no law authorizing the act. It is cruel to the negroes who live as comfortably as any people in this county, and alienates our people. The soldiers were sent on a very hazardous expedition



to do an act of great wrong, I under-  
stand the order emanated from  
the Pro. War at Mexico City.  
If the seal of the Pro War at Mexico  
City & Mexico could be controlled  
the interests of the Government would  
be promoted. They do far more  
harm than good I fear.



Sir, I am engaged in manufact-  
uring Lumber in Washington County - We have been much annoyed  
of late by threats and unfriendly demonstrations on the part of men  
belonging to the 3d Mo. Cav. - My partner writes me that on  
Sunday last 12 men from the post at Fronton came to our mill  
Went into the houses of the families of men in our employ - took  
their provisions from them - Caused much terror among  
the women and children and then went off shouting for Jeff  
Davis - On Monday two of the same gang came across  
Mr Patterson one of our teamsters who was out hunting his  
oxen - they derided him and told him they intended to kill  
him. One drew his revolver and as he presented it - Patterson  
caught hold of it - It fired but missed him - he then  
dodged behind the horses and managed to escape into the  
bushes under a fire of ten more shots - Mr P. made his  
way into Potosi and reported the case to the officer there  
who I learn sent after & captured them - On the same day  
Eight of this Band captured another of our hands by the  
name of Anderson - took what he had - Abused him and

Let him go. I need hardly say to you - General - that if this thing continues we shall have to stop our business because we shall not be able to get hands to work - Most of our outside hands are refugees who have fled from the Rebels of Arkansas and come in here perfectly destitute - some have large families and are now in a position to support them - But if we are obliged to shutdown on account of the actions of men who we suppose are paid to protect and not injure us - these families will suffer as well as ourselves.

I felt it my duty to apprise you of this matter and leave the remedy to your superior judgement.

were Guerrillas and Mr Becket when he came home  
learning this came directly to this place and reported  
as related above Mr Becket states that he wrote a  
private letter to Mr Brolosky stated the circumstances  
as above he also mentioned the circumstances of  
Patterson being shot at by a party of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Mass  
it appears that Mr Brolosky took this to be the same  
party that was at the mill and represented it at 46<sup>th</sup>  
St as the same party perhaps as one of his teamsters when  
Patterson was assaulted within 2 1/2 miles of town had  
nothing to do with the mill and by a different party  
who have been arrested and forwarded to your 86<sup>th</sup> St

My opinion is that it all amounts to  
nothing except the shooting at Patterson of  
which you are advised Mr Becket says  
he is very sorry his partner mentioned it at  
H<sup>d</sup> - Is as he did not intend in his letter  
to make a report against Soldiers but was  
fearful they were guerrillas such is his statement  
to me I have inquired carefully and find that  
both Becket and Broloski are both Rebel  
sympathizers and the loyalty of the men they have  
employed as minor Refugees is to say the least  
not well established enclosed send you the  
depositions of two loyal citizens of this town  
as to the character of Broloski I would like to  
see the letter Becket sent to Broloski I remain

On a recent scout, which I made, from Wellsville, into Callaway County, I came upon a store, situated about  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles south of Martinsburg, kept by one Peter Kemp. Previous to my coming to the store, I had learned that there had been for several days past, squads of Bushwhackers, or Confederate Soldiers, as they claim to be, stopping at and around this store, when I arrived there, I searched the house, expecting to find some person concealed there, but found no one, but did find a Revolver, concealed in a Bed - This store is carried on by Mrs Kemp, her husband being away most of the time, he claims not to know, or be responsible for, anything, that takes place at his house, ~~and~~ ~~the~~ Kemp ~~where~~ showed me a permit from Col Racecrane to him, permitting him to carry arms, knowing him to be a notorious Rebel I asked him how he managed to get this permit, he replied that a friend got it for him, I asked the name of his friend, which he gave me to wit - Geo Sexton a Hardware Merchant



on Main Street St Louis. No believing  
that the said Permit was obtained by  
fraud I took the Pistol and brought it  
away with me and have it at my  
Company Dead Quarters at Wellsville, Mo.  
Mrs Kemp spoke up in <sup>the presence of</sup> ~~the~~ presence and  
said that ~~she~~ <sup>her</sup> ~~husband~~ <sup>husband</sup> had bought it for  
her - I asked her what she wanted for  
she said that she wanted it to shoot some  
of those fellows with, speaking of Buckwhackers.  
I told her that they had been around her  
for several days and that as yet, she had  
not shot any of them - she replied, O I  
don't want to shoot any of them, she then  
said that they wanted it, but that she ~~was~~ <sup>would</sup>  
not give it to them, but if she had have  
known that we were coming, she would  
have given it to them, saying that she had  
a great deal rather they would have it than  
us - she claimed that these men that had  
been at her store, were not Buckwhackers  
but regular Confederate Soldiers and that  
their <sup>meaning her store</sup> place was a second Petersburg and would  
be no hard to take as it; she said further,  
that "We have fear them and not reported on  
them; come shall do it again, and I would  
rather be a thief than to report on them."  
She admitted that they had been there three or  
four times a day for the last eight days.

In addition to the above I desire to report that after I left Kemp store I went to Mr Caleb Berrie about 4 miles South East of Kemp store then I learned that 40 of these Bushmen had just left about 4 hours previous. in Mr Berrie's Barn, was a Bay Stallion which one of my men ~~traded~~ traded for, with Mr Berrie giving in exchange a five year old Mare, Berrie claimed that he had got the Stallion some weeks previous in trade from some maveros. I inquired of Berrie's Daughters and Niece Miss Rust, in regard to the stallion and they said that one of the men who was there in the morning had given it to Miss Rust (Berrie's Niece) when I told the old man what they had said, finding that he was caught in a lie - he turned it off with "Well Well I suppose it just as they say", I took the stallion, with out the trade, Berrie folks, all acknowledged that the Rebels had been there most of the time for three or four days. I submit the case of these Loyal People to your consideration.

Sammy Mitchel, Morrison and the Groveses were sympathizers in 1861 but since that time have done no disloyal act that we know of and have manifested a desire to have the Union restored. The remaining four Blackman, Col Fox, Briggs & Dr Ellis have been unflinching Union men from the commencement of our political troubles.

With regard to myself I mustered the first company that was mustered in N.W. Mo. for the Union service and have been an officer in that service <sup>up to the fall of</sup> since 1863.

My son is also in the service of the U.S. in the 25<sup>th</sup> Regt Mo Volt.

St. Louis, Sept. 15, 1864.

Q. Where do you reside?

A. My home is in Peoria County Illinois.

Q. How old are you?

Ans. I am over 40 years.

Q. Do you know a Mr. Bateman?

Ans. Yes I saw Bateman first in July 1864, On the little steamer Gray Eagle bound from Memphis to his place above Island #1. I was then Aid on the Gray Eagle and he was a passenger on her going home with some goods from Memphis, we landed near his place to put off his goods. Next I saw him on the Steamer Graham bound for St. Louis, he had been to Memphis on business. I was Government Aid on her, he had a permit for coming up that time. He told me he had been to Memphis and got a permit for some goods in St. Louis but was not ready then to come and get them. I came on to St. Louis and returned on the same boat to Memphis. I think I lay off one week and I think I saw him ~~about~~ ~~the~~ ~~time~~ ~~he~~ ~~was~~ ~~to~~ ~~come~~ ~~up~~ ~~in~~

Memphis. He spoke to me and said he had  
been to St Louis with his permit left it here  
and for some reason his goods were not sent  
down. He wish me to see about the goods  
and offered to pay me if there was any out-  
side trouble to me in looking after the permit  
or goods then while laying in Memphis I was  
not on duty. I went to General Washburnes  
Head Quarters and saw the Adjutant General<sup>rd</sup>  
asked him in regard to this permit. Mr Bates  
-man went along. I asked him if it was  
proper when his signature was to the permit  
or Capt Williams Provost Marshal at Memphis  
to have the goods shipped down the river<sup>nd</sup>  
he said if Capt Williams signature was to  
the paper it was just as good as Genl Wash-  
burnes. Then to make myself secure, thinking  
there might be some trouble<sup>nd</sup> I didn't wish  
it. I went Capt Williams and asked him  
in regard to this permit. Says he I gave  
a permit about three weeks ago for such  
goods. I says would it be safe for those  
goods to be shipped down from St Louis.  
The remark he made was I would like to  
see any man deny my signature I said those  
goods could be shipped. He says yes Sir. I  
came down to the office. I was then conveyed  
to the boat and came down to St Louis. I  
had a letter from Putman who came up on

The same boat to Island 40 and got off. She wrote a letter, sealed it and sent to the firm that had the goods.

Q. What was in that letter?

Ans. I never knew. I presented the letter to the man of the firm, and says he the goods have been cut down so that the amount of the goods would throw off the Buggy—that was in the lot. I think there was \$1000<sup>00</sup> worth of goods including a Buggy. He cut that off because he thought Pateman would want the other household stock and then he spoke about the Buggy. In coming says I could not pay how it is about the Buggy. I can't tell you how that can get down. Says he I will send the Buggy down but he would rather I would take it if I could. I went aboard the boat and saw a Buggy on the Deck. I looked at the Permit but found no Buggy on it. I turn and goes to the Custom House and asked the proper officer in regard to that Permit. He said it could not go. Says I all right I will not take it. But if it does come I will take it as seized property. I left and went down aboard the boat. When I got down there they had run the Buggy on through a mistake. I do not know how it came there. I spoke to the Captain and says that Buggy can not go—it is not on the Permit, and what he records. Mr. Jones the

Detectives came down there and saw the Buggy. No, I am mistaken, the Buggy was on the Surge. Mr. Jones came on the Boat and spoke about the Buggy. He said he should seize the Buggy & comes not go. Capt. Welf the clearance officer of the Custom House said that Jones could not take it. Well says he I shall take the Buggy. Jones went off but came back and said we could ship that Buggy, and if any thing was wrong he would let me know in Cairn. When they started out I made a remark to the Clerk of the Boat, that that Buggy was on Surge I, I cannot receive that Buggy - it can't be sent - I shall take the Buggy to Memphis. These were words passed and refused but nothing in particular and when we got to Cairn. I saw Mr. Jones there. Mr. Jones says he came down to seize the Buggy. He says he never would have troubled me only Mr. Welf gave him such a short answer. <sup>He said</sup> Of course he could not seize the Buggy alone but would have to take the rest of the Goods. So he took the things off and the Boat proceeded on to Memphis and I was on board. I made a proper report of that in writing to Col. Carl - the Surveyor of Customs in Memphis. He read my Report and said it was proper, and I had done my duty. Then I was sent back on the same Boat as there was no other aids in port.

When I got to this City I made my report to Captain Welf. I remained there till the next day this was three weeks ago last Sunday - and then I



was arrested, by an Officer belonging to this office, and brought here no charge being given. I had some conversation with Jones - just asked him if what I had done was proper. Says he I think it. There is nothing that you have violated. I told him I did not intend to do any thing that was out of the way.

I applied to Genl. Gordon whether it would be lawful or not for me to do any thing of this kind and he said that any outside work of that kind was lawful - it was optional whether I did it or not. Capt. Clapp, the chief clerk of the Department made the same statement to me.

Genl. Ballston after I had made my report to him on this subject said it was all right.

The firm said the permit I had was properly signed and was all right. and says I if it is so the Goods can go down the River. Capt. Williams said it was proper and right. Capt. Meff looked at the permit when I was on the Boat and he ~~it~~ was three marks all and ought to be stamped over and a Gentlemen Fork it and was stamped over with the date the Goods were shipped.

Q What authority did Mr. Bateman give you to receive these Goods?

A The only authority I had was this letter to Freeman. I think his name is. At the same time he told me to see that they were shipped on that Boat.

Q Where was the permit for these Goods?

A I cannot say whether it was in the  
Custom House or <sup>whether</sup> Mr Freeman had it. I did not see it  
Till it came aboard the Boat, and then found it not  
right.

Q Did you receive these Goods into your  
possession at all?

A Never.

Q Who receives the Permits?

A The clerk on the Barge first and then it is  
passed into the office and then I inspect them and  
they are kept in the office.

I am credibly informed she was  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile above the town at the time the accursed deed was committed, opposite the County of Howard.

I would respectfully suggest that the assessment be made upon the disloyal citizens of Missouri townships, (including Rochepost) in Boone County and Morriteau townships in Howard County,

The townships are adjoining in the two counties  
and lying on the M<sup>o</sup>. River.

Genl. the reason I make this suggestion, is, the  
disloyal citizens of these two sections are equally  
culpable with the residents of Rockport.

Widow Vinson who lives sixteen Miles south of this Post, and who is reported to hold a regular Head

the foot of West Av. and levee. and went  
out by way of the Halway House to  
the pond on East Av. this side of the  
Park. We stopped at the Halway House  
and drank some beer. We asked <sup>of</sup> the  
Negro Soldier to get into the wagon  
and ride a piece of the way to  
Benton Barracks. He was going on  
~~the~~ to Passengers care before going to  
bath. The negro was sober and we  
both under the influence of Liquor.

The negro tried to get out of the  
wagon. I put my hand on him  
and tried to have him stay. I told



him he could get out at the cave as we were going there. The negro had a stick in his hand. when I tried to detain him he pushed me with the stick and I fell in the mud.

He went off by himself, and I got into the wagon. I dont think Charley got off the wagon. There were two others in the wagon beside me and Charley Bill Volk and Johnny Mc Colgan.

Johnny Mc Colgan drives wagon no 5 for me. Stops on ~~Franklin Ave~~ <sup>Wash Street</sup> between 21<sup>st</sup> & 22<sup>nd</sup> Sts. Bill Volk's stops at cor 23<sup>rd</sup> & Carr Streets. Work's in Brick yard (dont know which one) I dont know whether anyone followed the negro or not. I think Charley and I were the most drunk of all. Never saw the negro before and dont know what he had any money about him, dont recollect of seeing any stones thrown at the negro. Dont be sure there was a whip in the wagon.

We did not go out to the cave. I think Bill and Johnny know more about the affair than I do. They were not so drunk as I was. I think the only



reason the negro had for getting out was  
that he was afraid to ride with us.

I have lived in St Louis about two years I served three months under Seigel and also belonged 5<sup>th</sup> Mo. Cav. On or about the 28<sup>th</sup> June 1864 I in company with J. Clancy J. McClogan and Bill Bolk. were going out to a pond on Cass Avenue. when we came to the Half-way House, there was a negro there who wanted to go out to the Barracks. We got into the wagon and we took him about a square. He asked Johnny McClogan how much he was going to charge him, some one said 50 cents. The negro said he could go for 5 cents on the cars. I told him ~~to~~ <sup>to come</sup> ahead we would not charge anything. He then jumped out the wagon. Johnny McClogan jumped out the wagon and went after the negro to get him in again. The negro struck at him Johnny then threw something at the negro. I dont think he caught the negro. I did not have any whip along with the wagon that day Clancy tried to help John and

helped chase the negro. John - Called  
the negro a damned nigger son of  
a bitch. Will not see them get the  
negro down or hit him with stones  
they had no whip. I dont think  
there are any stones on that street

I have the honor to report that last night at about dark while awaiting for the car at the half way house for the Barracks I saw a colored Soldier come up & take a seat, also awaiting the car, after sitting awhile an Express Wagon came up containing two men beside the driver and stopped in front of him (the Soldier) asking if he was going out to the Beks. and if so to jump in & ride out as they were going out there,

After some little hesitation on the Soldiers part he got in and they started in the direction of the Beks: they had

proceeded but a short distance before I saw them begin to fight with the soldier who after a short struggle succeeded in jumping out of the wagon followed by two of the men who ran after him throwing stones at him and calling him a d—d nigger son of a b—ch. They ran but a short distance when they overtook the soldier and pitched into him with stones and a heavy whip. Upon seeing that they were watched they got into their wagon & drove off before I could see their number but from a boy whom I saw at the half way house I learned that the drivers name was Tim Blaney and that the other mans name was John or Jim.

The Boy said that Tim Blaney was slightly scratched in the engagement.

The soldier says that they wanted to extort  
money from him and he objected and  
wanted to get out when they tried to  
overpower him and take it from him.

I have the honor to forward the following statement concerning two men who frequent Jacksonville. It is made by a man of my Company, (B) in whose truthfulness I have full confidence. He has always lived in this part of Florida.

1<sup>st</sup> William Christopher. He lives on the east side of the S<sup>th</sup> Johns river, about five (5) miles from the ferry at Jacksonville. He owned, before the war, some eighty (80) or ninety (90) slaves. He ran them off, at the taking of S<sup>th</sup> Johns Bluff, to Lake City or thereabout. They have been there ever since. He was a noted rebel. After and during the occupation of Jacksonville by our forces, he used to carry information of all our movements to the rebels; crossing the river, and going by the way of Black Creek and

Middleburg to Baldwin, and continued to do so until the river was so effectually patrolled by the Navy that he could not cross. In other ways, and to his full ability, he always helped the enemy. He is now frequently in Jacksonville trading.

2<sup>d</sup> John Brewer. He also lives on the east bank of the St Johns, at the mouth of Goodby's Lake. He owned about forty (40) slaves. He ran them off at the same time with Christopher. He engaged also in carrying news to the rebels. There is nothing in his case materially different from that of Christopher. The two were associated together in treason. He is also frequently in Jacksonville, Fla.,

St. Louis Sept 26<sup>th</sup> 1864

Ques. Were you down stairs between 7 and 8 o'clock on Sunday morning, when the prisoners escaped?

Ans. I was not up when they first discovered the prisoners had gone away. I heard Father ask about them, and it struck me that they had gone. I then got up immediately.

Ques. What did you first hear about it?

Ans. I first heard Father enquire where they were, and then I thought they were gone.

Ques. Will you state what happened when you came down stairs?

Ans. Mother says to the ed-  
-ned girl, "Mary, see if the Gate is open." I followed her, and Mother followed me at a distance behind. Mary went out to the Gate, and handed me the key. I handed it to Mother.

Ques. What kind of a key was it?

Ans. Black Iron Key - looked as if it had been filed.



Ques.

Did you ever see it before?

Ans. I never did,

We have no such Key in the house.

Ques.

Do you think that Key was furnished by parties outside?

Ans. Yes, sir, I do, certainly, It might have been brought in when they had papers. But my idea is that it was put through the fence the same as the letters.

Ques. Do you know,

or have you any idea, who furnished it to them?

Ans.

Oh, no, indeed I do not.

Ques. Now, might not

they have found that Key in the house, and filed it themselves?

Ans. I dont think there is any probability, because there is nothing in the world could file a Key with.

Ques. Are there no Files

lying about the house?

Ans. I dont think there is a File in the house. Pa. may have one, but I never saw any.

Ques. Do you remember Mr.

Weaver coming there one day last week and leaving a message for his daughter?

Ans. Yes.

Ques. You met him at the door?

Ans. Yes, it was Saturday, and he brought a parcel in, and he said it loud enough for his daughter to hear.

Ques. Where was she when he came?

Ans. In the dining-room, at dinner, and he said he was going away on Monday - to tell her that he could not get to see her, and there was no use of his staying at all.

Ques. What was in the package?

Ans. Two Skirts

Ques. Anything else?

Ans. No, sir; there was a paper from Mr Keyser to admit it. I examined the package, and gave it to her.

Ques. Do you think the Key could have come in that package?

Ans. Oh, no. I am positive it was not in that package.

St. Louis, Sept. 26<sup>th</sup> 1864.

Q. Do you suppose the prisoners escaped through the door, leading to St. Charles St?  
A. I am perfectly satisfied they did, because the other way is safe, & I went there, & examined it myself.

Q. You stated when you first communicated the fact to this office, that they went over the fence?  
A. That is what I supposed then, because I had the key in my pocket.

Q. I understood you to say, at that time, that you saw them going over the fence?  
A. Oh, no! I saw them coming into the yard. ~~They~~ ~~came~~ ~~first~~, & about 2 1/2 or 3 minutes after Mrs. Wood came down. At the time they came down, Mrs. Dr. Lodge was in the privy. She left till Mrs. Woods came out, & then went back again. That was the first time, Mrs. Woods came. The only one that saw them in the yard, was this Dr's wife, with her children. Mrs. Woods

had been complaining for two or three days before.

Q. Did you receive any intimation from the prisoners, or their friends of any character, within the last week, or at any other time, that these prisoners, or any other prisoners, under your charge, would be likely to make an attempt to escape.

A. Not the slightest.

Q. From your knowledge of the prisoners, who do you think planned, & had the leading part in this escape?

A. My opinion is, that it was Miss Weaver that got up the plans, & the other woman merely followed. The other is a woman, that could be led anywhere - she is an easy-going, simple woman, & has no mind at all, as far as I could judge.

Q. Have you any direct information, & any idea, as to who furnished the key, or how it was smuggled into the Prison?

A. My opinion would be, as far as it goes, that it was Mr. Weaver, or some one for him.

Q. Do you think there is anybody in your

house, servants or others, or any person, who come there, that would be likely to assist them in this?

A. No sir, there was no one that came to my house, that ever saw the prisoners. This servant woman, I would trust with anything. She has been with me two years. She was with me, in the South West, & had sometimes a \$1000 of the company money. Weaver is the only man. I saw him twice Saturday - the day before the escape - & each time he saw me, he bowed me, by having his head down, & his hands in his pockets. He just walked leisurely along the way.

Q. Is there any way by which they could communicate with prisoners, without coming inside the Prison?

A. No sir, there is no way they could do that. They could slip something in through the fence, when the women were in the yard. It might have been during the time their friends were in to see them. There were two passes issued one day for parties to come & see different parties, who both came at the same time. When I would be opening the door - with my back turned to let the other party in - the key might have been slipped to her, & he might give her

watch-word, & say if I can't get you out - I will send you word, & then do the best I can. Weaver sent word to his daughter, "I am going home on Monday." Tell her I cannot do anything more for her. Gen. Crook has the case in hand & will see that it is all right. I heard him say that. After Weaver came to St. Louis first, he had a pass to see her, every other day. I think Weaver gave the key a week ago, & that the word he sent was a signal - & another thing she prompted Mrs. Wood against Mollie, saying that she, Mollie had sworn her life away, by saying that she was a Rebel spy &c. I think she was figuring to frighten Mrs. Woods, & get her to go with her then. That was almost a week or ten days, before they left.

Q. Do you recollect of having received a pass, purporting to come from this Office, & directing you to permit Weaver to see Miss Weaver, or any other prisoners, in private?

A. Yes, I do.

Q. Who was the pass signed by?

A. Capt. Kaiser's name was on it.

Q. Where is that pass? Can you produce it?



et. I brought it back to Capt. Kaiser—  
immediately after receiving it.

Q. What did he say about it?

A. I told him that it was against Col. Sanderson's orders, for any prisoners to be seen privately. He said he knew nothing of the pass going—it was his clerk gave it. He told me to give it up to him, & he took it up, as he said it might make trouble.

Q. Did you allow these persons to see the prisoners in private?

A. Yes, I took the pass.

Q. Who brought it?

A. It was Mr. Burr, & the same day Burr brought the pass—he had two other passes, one for himself in the morning, & one for himself & Broadhead. I would not let him see her in private, & he got the third one. Here are some of the passes.

[ Mr. Dickson produced 4 lots of Passes. One lot of which (6) was to admit Mr. Weaver! One lot of (5) to admit Mr. Burr & some friends! One lot of (4) to various parties & families to see Mrs. Hough! one lot of (5) admitting certain parties to see



Miss F. & C. Little. They are hereto attached.

Q. Was there any other person, at any other time, who saw Miss Weaver alone?

A. Yes sir.

Q. Did the persons you speak of, have passes from this Office?

A. No sir.

Q. Who was it that saw Miss Weaver in private, without a pass from this Office?

A. It was Capt. Kaiser himself.

Q. How many times did he see her, in all?

A. Twice.

Q. Where did he see her alone?

A. In my parlor.

Q. How long was he with her?

A. About 3 hours, I should think one time, & about two hours another time.

Q. What time of day did he come, the first time?

A. He came at night, both times.

Q. About how late?

at. Well, he came about 7 o'clock one night, I think, or half past 7 - & stopped till nearly 10. Between 9 & 10 he left.

Q. How was it the other time?

A. Well, it was about the same time. He asked me one question, which I peremptorily refused. The question was, did I think it would be any harm to take her to the Theatre, if she went with him, & would I have any objection. I told him I would not let her go out with a General, without the order of Col. Sanderson. I thought at the time, he asked me casually.

Q. Do you think now, that he intended to take her, if you had allowed her to go?

A. It is my opinion, that he would have taken her, - that is my opinion.

Q. Did you mention this to anybody?

A. Yes, I told Dodge.

Q. How long ago?

A. Right after it. It was shortly after she was put in first. She might have been in ten days. Keyser has not been there ever since.

Q. Has she ever received any letters from him?

A. She has often sent him letters?

Q. Without going through the hands of the Inspector?

A. Never after I told Thomas. I delivered Capt. Keyser, one or two. Then I told Thomas about it, & he told me never to allow any to go without being inspected.

Q. Did you ever speak to anybody, except Lieut Dodge about this?

A. Nobody outside of my own family - to my knowledge. I may have, but, I don't recollect.

St. Louis Sept. 25, 1864

About 6 o'clock this morning Emma Marx came down stairs in her night dress. I sleep in the room adjoining hers and was just getting dressed at the time. She went out to the back yard and told the colored woman that she was sick. She then went up stairs back again, and came down about 20 minutes to eight, with her dress on and with Mrs. Wozz. I was then in the dining room reading the news paper. The supposition by Mrs. Wozz was, that they were going again to the Prison, I saw them pass out. The breakfast was then being got ready, and I took no further notice of them as I thought they had passed back to their room again. Breakfast was ready in about 20 minutes after. After they came down and went to the Prison I went to the stable to feed my horses, about a block from the Prison. When I came back they were still in the Prison I then took up the paper again in the dining room.

After the breakfast was laid on the table I sent my son up to tell the ladies to come to breakfast this was 10 or 15 minutes

after 8, O'clock. The ladies all came down  
with the exceptions of Mrs Wood (A) Miss Wearn  
I then called my son again and asked him  
if he had told Mrs Wood and Miss Wearn to  
come down, He said yes he had — That is  
he had knocked on the door to tell them to  
come down to Breakfast. One of the Ladies then  
at Breakfast Miss Fannie Emery said that Mrs  
Wood and Miss Wearn were in the yard and  
had not gone up. I went out in the yard  
there was no person there, then I went up stairs —  
thought they might have went up and got into  
some of the rooms up stairs. They were not  
in any place to be found. I went into the back  
yard to see if they had jumped over the fence.  
I tried to track them as it was soft on  
the outside. There was no visible appearance  
of their going over the fence.

I then proceeded to the Provost Marshal

from Seymour brought me about fifteen hundred  
dollars, for which I was to pay him notes on the  
Dollar, on or about the 5th of Sept 1864. I have  
not seen him here but instructions to have him



arrested when he calls for his pay.

Ques. How much have you purchased of this money from George McCarter?

Ans. Not to exceed \$2000.

Ques. Who manufactures this money?

Ans. Clarinda Wilson of Cincinnati Ohio. George McCarter is her selling agent or broker.

Ques. Where is the currency manufactured that you obtained from the man from Dupont, Indiana?

Ans. He told me that it was made in Indiana and that some of the party had recently been arrested and sent to Washington D.C.

Ques. What parties in Greenville are engaged in circulating this fraudulent currency?

Ans. Samuel Gordon and John Purdy.

Ques. What is the address of Clarinda Wilson the manufacturer of this money?

Ans. 1111 Plum Street Cincinnati Ohio. George McCarter is either a Parrot Broker or a Jeweler in the City of Cincinnati. My Bro. Suit Racine gave me Clarinda Wilsons address and informed me that I could get all I wanted of this money of her.

Ques. How much of this currency have you sold for your own profit here?

Ans. Between Three and four Hundred Dollars.

Ques. How much did you send here by John Rice recently?

Ans. Fifteen Hundred Dollars.

Ques. How much money has your son committed you engaged in the sale of this currency as pay for it?

Ques. About \$500 #  
 Mes. To whom was the Fifteen Hundred Dollars brought.  
 here sent to.  
 Ans. I sent it to my son Guit David Casse, of the

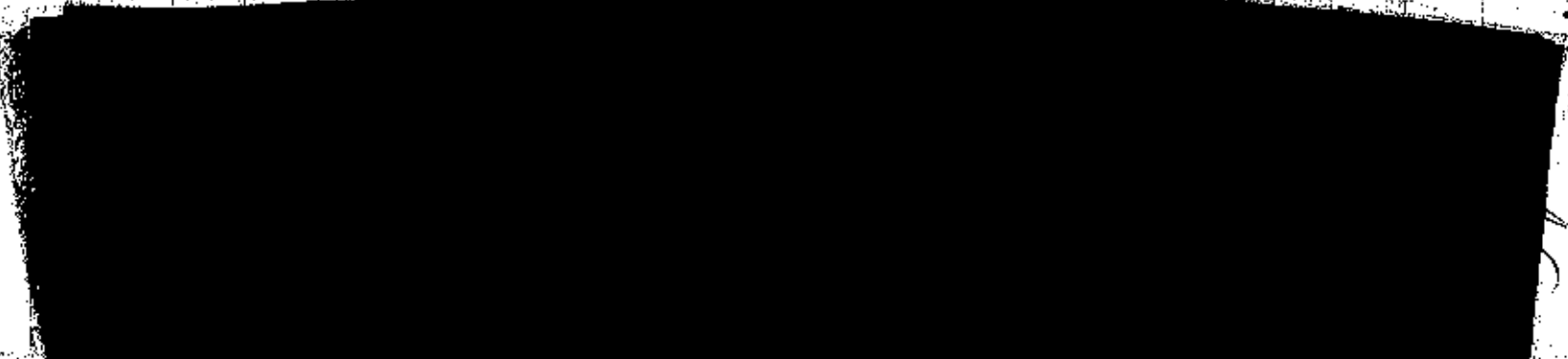



the charge, as we understand of Kidnapping  
negroes, & believing ourselves to be entirely  
innocent of the charge we very respectfully  
state the liberty of sending you this statement

us the very great favor of having our  
cases examined as soon as possible, so  
that for our families' sakes, as well as for  
our own we may be released from custody  
if we are guilty of no charge. To justify  
our detention, as we firmly believe ourselves  
to be

You are no doubt aware that while acting  
under your authority as Government Detective  
we captured Wm H Rogers, & delivered him to  
you - after we had captured him he offered  
us \$500 = in gold to let him go & afterwards offered  
us something like \$1,000.00 to let him go. both



of which offers we declined, choosing not to accept bribes, but to do our duty faithfully, as far as we understood it. We mention this to show that in this case as well as in the transactions for which we are now imprisoned, we simply tried to do what we believed to be right.

In reference to the Charge against us, permit us to say that we took two colored men to Justice Hiss's office one of them about the last of July, the other about the 1st of August, for the purpose of having them enlisted in the U. S. Army, both of whom expressed themselves to us as perfectly willing to do so — Justice Hiss had then passed & returned in.

We were not aware that in our agency in these transactions anything was wrong, we believed we were only doing what we were and are still doing, that is honorably trying to furnish the Army with men & help to fill the City's quota. We used no dishonorable or unjust means to induce these men to enlist, they did so as far as we were concerned of their own entire free will.

Permit us also to say that before we were committed to your custody, we were arrested & taken before Col Jeffries, & an investigation was then made of our cases, & we were



then honorably discharged. No evidence being  
against us of our doing anything wrong.  
We take the liberty of requesting that you  
will do us the very great favor of having  
our cases investigated as early as possible,  
for our detention here is not only a great  
inconvenience to us, but also a great loss  
to ourselves & to our families.

We respectfully beg leave to solicit your attention to our case. we were arrested at Norfolk, Va. on the 1<sup>st</sup> of April 1864, on suspicion of being deserters from the army. we ~~were~~ had been Employed on board of a Schooner called the Key West of New York which I left on the 30<sup>th</sup> of March and was looking after another berth when I was arrested and confined in Norfolk City Jail for five weeks and then sent to the Military Prison - Camp Hamilton. where we were kept until the 19<sup>th</sup> of August and then sent through the 18<sup>th</sup> Army Corps for identification. no one could identify or claim that we belonged to the army. for the simple reason that we do not. we assure you that we are perfectly innocent of the charges made against us. we were and are Citizens, and entirely disconnected with

the army. we have now been in this guard  
house, since the 2<sup>nd</sup> of august. making the  
time of our imprisonment in all five ~~three~~  
months and 18. days under the circumstances.

Pickett's Division, the only force in front of Guil. Butler's lines—The Confederates are concentrating every available man about Petersburg, under command of Lee.

Lee's Head Quarters at Davis Hill, one mile from Petersburg.

The city suffers very much from the Federal fire.

No women and children in the city, except those who are so poor as to be unable to get away, and they seek shelter in the lower rooms of the buildings.

The majority that have left go directly to

Richmond.

Early's command expected daily to join  
Lee.

It is generally supposed in Richmond and Petersburg that the rebels will make every effort to drive the federal force from the possession of the Weldon Road, and risk all in the coming struggle; but they - Mr and Mrs Sweeney - think that Lee will act entirely on the defensive, considering that the loss of men, even in case of success, will be greater than the gain of the Rail Road.

Dear Sir, I have seen  
to day for the first time since  
you summoned me to your Head  
Quarters, the letter of recommend-  
ation which I gave Mr. Myratt.  
That letter states simply  
this, viz. that I had known him  
for 12 or 15 years and I was con-  
fident that such trust as you  
might repose in him in grant-  
ing his request would not be  
abused by him and that I believed  
he was loyal — I could not say  
that he really was, nor did I.

You learned that he was a  
murderer as you stated to me  
and was indignant with me for  
recommending him. I am aware  
General, and was aware as soon as  
you mentioned the subject, of  
the source of your information.

The crime of Mr. Myratt was  
placed in the most obnoxious  
light before you chiefly for my

benefit. I am perfectly indif-  
ferent to the indirect as well as  
to the direct attacks upon my  
character and motives by any one.  
If it be possible for me to <sup>be</sup> ~~be~~  
indifferent to attacks upon me  
from one source more than  
another, I am so to those coming  
from J. M. Torrey.  
It was natural however that  
Mr. T. should speak strongly against  
the character of Mr. Myratt from another  
or motive than that of bringing my  
recommendation into discredit; that  
other motive was this; Mr. Webb whom  
Myratt killed was father to Mr. Torrey's  
wife; that Mr. Myratt killed Mr.  
Webb ~~was~~ is most true; that he is a  
murderer is not yet proved; he was  
admitted to bail and was shot thro' the  
face by the brother of Mr. Webb on  
his first meeting him after his release,  
his life was despaired of for several  
days; he was confined to his room for  
weeks. I am no apologist for Mr.  
Myratt nor for Mr. Webb. I do not  
condemn them either. I hold a man  
innocent till he is proved guilty; I do

more than this; if the Law cannot punish - why should I? - I try to forgive. I do this for several reasons - one of which is that I often find men who have violated Law in one particular that are exemplary in obedience to Law in every other; <sup>another reason is</sup> ~~and~~ I say to my own soul may I not need forgiveness myself. The letter of recommendation that I gave to Mr. Myratt expressed my honest sentiments; I was loath to give it to him however because I was so sure you would not grant him any such favor as he asked for unless either myself or some other should endorse his loyalty; as I could not do it I did not wish to trouble you about it. You may remember that I wrote to you in favor of Mrs. Estes who desired Exemption from search at the Pickets and though I agreed to become responsible for her that she would not violate any law and tho' I assured you that she would keep her oath sacredly - yet because I could not endorse her loyalty, you declined to grant her the favor she asked for; you may judge of my surprise



General when I learned that on my  
recommendation of Myratt and my  
simply saying I believed he was loyal  
that you had concluded to grant him  
a favor involving such important  
consequences - a favor that I judged  
could only be given to those whose  
loyalty was above suspicion

The favor I wished to do Mr. Myratt  
and which I am glad I had an op-  
portunity to do, was not to secure  
for him Government privileges for  
I told him that as I could not endorse  
his loyalty, my recommendations would  
do him no good in the line he desired  
- but it was this, viz. - to show him  
that I was not one of those who  
condemned him for the act which had  
made his life so unhappy

I have the honor to report that on the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of Sept. 1864 I made the following seizures of Liquors in the town of Bladensburg D.C. The following are the circumstances. Complaints have been made for a long time that soldiers were in the habit of procuring liquor in said town and becoming intoxicated, and as no clue to the parties selling the liquor had been obtained, I therefore placed my detectives on the track, who were successful in fixing the guilt upon the following named persons, Geo. Cullenstroth and Henry Knoch. The first had I should judge from about 80 to 100 Gallons of Whiskey and Wines in his possession, supposed to be valued at from 2 to 3 dollars per gallon. The latter had a smaller quantity, I should judge from what I saw he had from 2 to 3 gallons. The said Geo. Cullenstroth sold to the Sergt of my Guard, the day previous a quantity of Whiskey, and the said Henry Knoch furnished



free of expense to three more of the Guard a glass of  
whiskey each. After making a thorough examina-  
tion of the case, and finding the parties guilty, I  
then placed a guard over their premises, giving  
them instructions not to allow any articles to be removed,  
nor to permit any one to enter or leave the premises.  
The Guard will be retained until I receive further  
instructions.

About the 1<sup>st</sup> of March 1864 Washington Yates (colored) rented one hundred acres of lands from Mrs Thibault other portions of her land were rented by other parties, the enclosed copy of the article of agreement designates the particular lands, Certain machinery, houses &c was to be common to all the renters. He made an agreement to go into partnership with Yates (enclosed is a copy of agreement) furnishing the means and seeing to a great extent, that was used on the farm.

Thos Bass, (colored) rented a portion of the same farm, from Mrs Thibault. Bass had but little stock and no farming utensils. For mutual assistance, Yates and Bass worked together up to about the 9<sup>th</sup> of July 1864, when they separated their work. He (Bass) now claims 20 acres of the best cotton on land rented to us, He has proceeded to pick the cotton - has it now in his possession and maintains possession by threat and force, Without any action on our part. The Officers of Freedman's Home, ordered us to appear before them about the middle of August, to try the case, since which time we have made every exertion to have the case decided, but we believe the parties are all interested in the matter.

and wish Bass to get all the cotton  
in his possession, knowing that we cannot  
collect anything from Bass, in the absence  
of a last court. We would further represent  
there are not and never have been any  
articles or writings of agreement between  
Hates and Bass, and no intention on Hates  
part of ever being a partner of Bass,  
Bass has introduced the testimony of some  
negros in his employ, to show that a  
partnership existed, but this with a worth-  
less man's evidence, by the name of Quinn  
is all that has been shown on Bass' part,  
We feel that we have no resource in  
Bass and would respectfully ask that we

to take the evidence and decide, Bass

In an interview with you in relation to my interest in the Hotel in Portsmouth now used by the U.S. Government and known, as the "Balfour Hospital" you gave me directions to have the House appraised for rent. As you gave me no instructions to whom to apply for the purpose. I have suggested the Surgeons in charge in connection with the owners. I have an expression of opinion from both parties but Dr Dalton the Director, will act officially in the matter when ordered to do so by superior authority. He will therefore be governed by your order on the premises. The owners have suggested \$6,000 per year as a fair amount for rent which sum is about the same as previously received and which is less than ten (10) per cent upon the cost to the owners. A precedent for rent of a Government Hospital can be had by referring to the Hygiea Hotel at Old Point for which the Government paid the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Joseph Legar \$6,000 per year rent. Dr Dalton has given his opinion that the "Balfour" is a more valuable House than the "Hygiea" was for Hospital purposes. In fact his predecessors



have pronounced the "Balfour" the best Hospital Establishment  
in this State. The House has been up to the present time in  
the possession of the U.S. Govt about thirteen (13) months,  
from Augt 1<sup>st</sup> to Nov<sup>r</sup> 20<sup>th</sup> '62 and again from Feb<sup>r</sup> 19<sup>th</sup> '63  
to the present time.

Some of the owners of this property have invested  
all their means in the erection of this House in fact some  
are largely in arrears still upon it. I therefore respectfully  
suggest that you will give directions to the Surgeon in charge  
if the within suggested amount of \$6,000. is not satisfactory

is some mistake, the result of malice  
or trick, in procuring the order for our  
banishment, Genl Burbridge doubtless ~~did~~  
did what he thought was right, upon the  
lightly he had, But where a man?

liberty is at stake, it is hard that he should be tried and condemned, without ~~any~~ knowledge of his trial or of the testimony against him or of a chance of offering any rebutting evidence. This will strike your sense of Justice at once.

We know the order which sent us here directs us to be sent beyond the Federal Military lines there to remain during the war, the time however of your executing this order is of course left to your convenience & discretion, it is not fixed in the order itself.

Two of us are over seventy years of age and one of the two laboring under the effects of a recent severe wound. It is very unpleasant for us to lie here in prison, but we do hope and believe, that an order from Gen. Burbridge, to release us will reach this place, within the next ten days, and indeed in a much shorter time. This belief is founded upon a telegram from a reliable man, who had an interview with Gen. Burbridge on Wednesday the 21<sup>st</sup> Inst.

We were sent off from Louisville early on the morning of the 22<sup>nd</sup> Inst, and have not heard any thing about our case since that time. We understand that no letters have arrived here from Louisville of later date than the 21<sup>st</sup> Inst, and of course as there

As no telegraphic communication, we have no information since we left Louisville concerning our case, if a discharge has been made out as all the Military at Louisville thought would be, and it arrives here after we are sent off it may and probably will be months before we get it if ever.

We therefore in the cause of humanity ask that you will not send us off for some ten days at least, that we may be able to get <sup>answers to</sup> letters written at this place, and in the mean time we should like to give our parole of honor if consistent with your feeling of duty, and be permitted, the limits of the City, one of us seventy four years old and one seventy two and wounded and a third in feeble health, but if the latter request is not granted we will cheerfully submit to close confinement till our letters are answered or a discharge is received.

We ask leave to call your attention to the cases of Mrs H. J. Brown, Mrs E. J. Whitson, Mrs M. Padgett, Miss Sally Dennis and Master J. J. Clements detained in this city on their parole since the 18<sup>th</sup> of August last by the Provost Marshall General.

These parties all reside in the same neighborhood about 60 miles north<sup>+</sup> Memphis Tennessee and having made purchases of articles of wearing apparel &c in this city for the use of themselves and their families were returning home about the date last indicated when they were arrested and examined by the officers of the Provost Marshall's office - placed on their parole to remain in this city and report semi-weekly.

No charges so far as we can ascertain have been made against them, at least they have not been informed of any nor that they would be tried by commission or Court Martial. At the time of their arrest the trunk of each and the few effects in them were seized and are still detained by the same authority. The parties are now here without means and without necessary wearing apparel. We have

in their behalf made application to the office of the Provost Marshall to have their parole extended and to report by letter to answer and also to have their wearing apparel restored to them or turned over to the Civil Authorities for further proceeding.

So far as much as the seizure ~~of~~ the property was made by the military in a "non-insurrectionary" district (i.e. at the post of St. Louis) we understand there is a <sup>contradiction</sup> of opinions as to whether the Treasury Department can claim the goods from the military &c; while the Special Agent of the Treasury Department (B. R. Bonner Esq) is willing to receive the goods, he does not desire to demand them of the Military until the Authorities at Washington make some decisive order in such cases.

Under these circumstances the Ladies named are placed in a most disagreeable position. Anxious to defend any charges which may be brought against them, they have patiently awaited a trial at great expense and inconvenience to themselves - desirous of obtaining their wearing apparel they are willing to give bond required by the "non-intercourse" act or any bond to any person authorized to receive it for the forthcoming of the property or its value if it should be condemned by any Judiciary.

tribunal. These parties are reputed to be loyal to the United States Government and we ask in their behalf that their parole may be extended to their place of residence, <sup>or</sup> if required that they be put under bond with leave to return home and report whenever they may be notified that they are required for trial, - that their trunks and clothing may be restored to them upon execution of bond if deemed necessary or that said property may be ordered to be turned over to the Civil Authorities.

We make this application directly to Head Quarters because of the illness of Col. Sanderson P. M. Gen. - where subordinates seem in doubt what to do in the premises.

I would respectfully suggest to the Genl Comd. the propriety and justice of sending them again outside of our lines, as from their conduct and conversation it is evident they have no sympathy with the cause of the Union.

Gen. Sir as I have just come from the enemies lines, and have had some knowledge of the sentiments of a considerable portion of the inhabitants of the country bordering on or near my home. I wish to make a short statement of the same to you, Moore, Montgomery, Randolph, Guilford, Forsyth, Davidson, Davie, Wilkes, Watauga and others are in a great measure loyal to the United States Government and would gladly take the oath, and many would join the Union Army if a sufficient force could be sent to hold any position in their midst. There are no forces in N. Carolina of any consequence, the men from 17 to 50 are called out and forced into the confederate service, or are lurking from place to place trying to keep out of <sup>the</sup> hands of the rebels. Our leaders would gladly make the impression that we are a unit for the South, but such is not the case, and now Gen. I have only made this short statement for the good of my suffering countrymen, than whom no truer Union men ever lived, if it lies in your power or if any thing can be done to deliver those loyal citizens, I hope it will soon be done.

Dear Sir,

Sometime in August 1862. the militia of this place were ordered to Monroe County to protect the enrolling officer of that County, & being scarce of transportation Mrs M. K. Draper of this place, furnished a team & driver.

While the team was in the service at Paris one of the horses was stolen out of the camp & never heard of afterwards.

A short time afterwards while the militia were scouting in Monroe Co.

under Command of Major Dodson of the 11<sup>th</sup> M. I. M., a bushwacker was captured riding a roan mare, which however, was nearly worn out & had evidently been ridden very hard and for some time. As she was evidently unserviceable she would have been abandoned. but was finally, at the request of Geo B. Draper, turned over to him in lieu of the horse of his Mother's which had been stolen although the mare was not able for service for several months and ~~was~~ is not, & never would be worth as much as the horse by \$50.<sup>00</sup>

The mare was turned over by Maj Dodson's verbal order on M. Draper's giving a receipt to the 2<sup>d</sup> M. of Dodson's Bat.

A short time since one Joseph Tallow, a rebel of Monroe or Ralls County, I am not positive which, came <sup>to</sup> this place & claimed the mare as one the rebels had taken from him, & he was referred to the Prov. Mar. in regard to the case.

He went to Hannibal & stated the case to Col Tyler, who ordered Winters & myself to appear before him & bring the mare, but at our request the case was referred to you.

Tallow has been under arrest at some former time but for what cause I do not know.

As Col Tyler had no particular necessity for either of us at Hannibal, & we cannot well leave home I will send you the mare by Capt. Pusey who is going to Troy on business & can give you any information you may require in the case.

Tallow brought an Ex Capt. of the rebel army to this place to prove his mare & I suppose he can prove his loyalty by some one equally as good.

on the 13<sup>th</sup> Inst. I left Navy Cove to go up East Bay for logs. Edwin Freeman was with me. we got up to East River on Tuesday night we then went to work logging on Friday (16<sup>th</sup>) following Mr Balkin came to the River where we were ~~at work~~ <sup>as we were</sup> just about to start on our return home, he said that he had 29 head of Cattle and asked me to help him swim them across East River and to help drive them down to Navy Cove. we got a man to take the boat back, and then helped drive the cattle to Navy Cove. Balkin said that he got the cattle between East and Yellow Rivers - just before reaching the Cove he, Balkin, left us in charge of the cattle - he going ahead he said that he was going to the Cove to find Capt Lyons as he had Orders for him. he said that he had been up to the gap in search of the Captain and that his horse gave out there, and that he saw the trail going out the gap but his horse was so used up that he could not follow after them. he said that

he expected to be arrested when he reported to the  
General for not finding the Captain and delivering  
the orders. Balkin first came to us on ~~Tuesday~~<sup>Wednesday</sup> morning  
to get some feed for himself and Horse. he said that he  
was going out on the Military Road to lay in wait for  
the Captain. he went and we see no more of him  
until he returned with the Cattle. he Balkin, has hired

Statement of Dr J. P. Smiley

Dr J. P. Smiley being duly sworn says. I stopped last night (Sept 19<sup>th</sup> 1864) at a Hotel kept by Elias Norton in Troy Mo. My room was directly opposite to one occupied by Milton L. Sanford who was wounded during the difficulty at the Democratic Meeting yesterday (Sept 19<sup>th</sup>). In conversation with another man in the room with him I heard him (Sanford) say "I knocked the soldier down and was pouncing him when I was shot through the thigh" those were the identical words he used. I have been <sup>well</sup> acquainted with Milton L. Sanford for 15 years, have lived within about four miles of him most of that time, and can swear positively that he was the person who made the remarks referred to, knowing his voice perfectly well.

Not for the sake of avoiding the Law (which Col Phillips is well convinced of now, nor for the sake of gain, did we bring on Drugs, but only for the purpose to fill orders ~~of our~~ of our Southwest Customers, without going outside to fill them without paying two prices.

In consideration of all the above we would respectfully ask you if other Houses can sell Liquors &c with impunity without a Legal Military right?

J. G. Tesch sells Liquors here "ad libitum", his dodge was at one time that it was not "he" but a Dr Atherton who sells the Liquors. We know this Dr Atherton well, he is not able to buy even one Bbl & still Dr A. gets in care of J. G. Tesch no Bbls at a time & Mr Joe Altman his headman stops every man he can see, to sell him Liquors, & it is

not likely that he would do so for  
Dr Atherton.

Last night a Bot of Whiskey came  
out of his house, to a Bar Keeper (this is only  
on Report) & one of the principal reasons I  
write to you is not out of malice to Mr Tsch,  
but that he, without going to the trouble  
& Expense of carrying on as extensive (or any)  
Drugstore at all, should be allowed to sell  
Liquors at all, when one who keeps a large  
Stock of Drugs than any House short of  
St Louis & who act strictly on military  
orders should be so restricted.

Provost Marshal Orgs is vigilant & no  
blame can be attached to him, but we  
have a better chance to see what is going  
on, than he has.

We know that Dr Atherton is no  
longer at Mr Tsch's & consequently, no Drugstore  
is kept there any longer - we know that he  
sells Liquors whenever he has a chance, -

We know that Mr Tsch at the last  
meeting of the City Council (of which I am  
a member) said himself (in appealing  
to the Council in behalf of Dr Atherton,  
that he was a "very poor man". If Dr  
Atherton is so very poor (which he undoubtedly  
is - how could he get a credit in







from what I know of Mrs Maury  
& from what I have learned since she  
was sent off do not believe she  
or her sister would or could have  
done anything wrong, knowingly  
believe them to be good women -  
Presume they are Sympathizers what  
is termed Southern Sympathizers  
do not think either capable of doing harm  
Just before Mrs Maury left  
she gave me power of Attorney  
to take charge of her interests here  
Immediately after she was sent away  
I applied in writing to Genl Paine

Nichmans Ky. To,

Brig Genl. E. A. Paine Com. Dist West Tenn

Dear Sir within the last month I have discovered that there has been a considerable amount of illegal trading between Commerce Mo. and Tenn. crossing at or near Nichm Ky. The parties in Mo. are 2 men by the name of Moore & 1 by the name Beckwith there given names I do not know they live not far from the head of No 6 island they bring ~~salt~~ salt & whiskey to the river where it is crossed in ships to the Ky side of the river they are assisted by Wm. Nelson who lives at the mouth of bayou d'her in Ky has a ship Peter Nelson in Nichman has a ship they have generally stored it with C. Ledwidge of Nichman some times it is hid in the woods and sold for 40 and 50 dollars per bbl. to persons that bring in cotton from Tenn. Mr. Moses Amburg a citizen of Nichman told me that when he came down the river a short time ago from St Louis to Cairo there was landed at Commerce Mo. about two thousand bbls salt and it is said to be the place it is obtained at. about the 18th of aug there 22 bails of cotton rolled in the river at Nichman belonging to Singey & Wilhelm and taken by them across the river to a wood yard at the foot of No. 6 island stored behind a wood pile from there the most of it had been taken away by wagons. Supposed to Commerce Mo. about a weeks ago. those engaged in smuggling were discovered at Nichman and I was told by a colored boy Albert who lives in Nichman that they had changed their crossing

to the foot of No. 8 island when it is brought  
to Wickham in wagons by John Ringwood &  
Shos Burgess both have wagons & Teams & have  
been proven to have been engaged in smuggling  
time and again those are the facts as far as I  
can learn. Mr James Hannore will be up from  
Columbus in a day or two & I think I can  
furnish a more perfect report as to days and  
dates. Your obedient servant.

we were both at home & I passed head Quarters on  
the evening Genl Paine was at our town on the 1<sup>st</sup> of  
August <sup>Sunday evening</sup> but no one ever told me he wished to see  
me or that he had any charge against me never had  
any trial no charges & no nothing of the charges against  
us at all On Monday about 1 o'clock Pm Capt  
after Genl Paine had left our town Capt J S Hugg the acting  
Prov Marshall asked me & my brother to sign a parole  
not to leave the Post without the permission of Genl Paine  
Comdy the Post I tolds<sup>d</sup> most assuredly I would & we both  
signed it I then asked him the object of it & he  
said he could not tell me he said that he did not  
know anything about it he said our names  
was only handed him to take our parole of  
honor not to leave the place & on that night  
after supper I found a guard placed  
at <sup>our</sup> my business House door he then on the  
next day proceeded to take an Inventory of the  
Stock therein & took <sup>with</sup> my Keys he then showed me

Genl Paine order to Genl Price in which it said we  
were to be taken on Monday the 8<sup>th</sup> day of Aug<sup>t</sup>  
and to be delivered into the Custody of Genl Mitchell  
at Cairo which I supposed all the time if charged  
with anything we would have some kind of trial  
or some charge would be found. ~~but~~ on Monday the  
8<sup>th</sup> Aug<sup>t</sup> we were taken under guard to Cairo & there  
kept under guard at Hotel & about 10 o'clock at night  
taken to the cars then placed under another guard  
on the Car & brought to this place. I never in my  
life had the pleasure of meeting or an acquaintance  
of Genl Paine have never been furnished any charge  
at all I have waited a long time supposing  
some kind friend would try and find out the  
charges but up the present I am entirely ignorant  
in the matter.

Now my dear friend our object is to ask of  
you to call upon Genl Paine & present the enclosed  
Copys of Letters from every District Prov Marshal  
that has ever been over us since our place has  
been a Military Post I never knew that I was  
ever suspected of any disloyal act at all.  
I am certain my conscience is clear I can say  
that I never have been nor accessory to any  
disloyal against the Govt in either word  
or act & I am satisfied that I am the object  
of some ones Malice <sup>I don't think</sup> that they cannot be  
found a respectable person to substantiate  
anything disloyal that I have done or said



I understood from a friend of mine since leaving home that he understood that one of the charges against me was that I voted for H.C. Burnett the Democratic Candidate against Judge Smith the old line Whig for US Congress in our district in 1861 and that it is now claimed that Burnett at that time was run on the secession ticket for the US Congress which if such was the case I never so understood it Mr Burnett was not at our place during the Campaign nor did I see him for a year previous to that Election nor have I seen him since that time nor did I so understand it to be a test vote I always voted the Democratic ticket & I also learn since my arrival that at perhaps at some of the precincts a Poll was opened for the North or South or for or against Secession no such test was ever put to me at the Election for it is publicly known that to by every man who has ever had anything to do or say to me on the subject but that I have opposed Secession from the beginning up to the present and no man now nor never could at anytime need my suffrage under any such a test vote at all I voted for S.F. Douglass for President had such have been my principles I would most certainly have voted for McKimidge but on the contrary I voted for Douglas hence the object in sending the copy of letter from Mr Stephens the Cashier of Merchants Bank at Charleston I have the original copies of these letters and they cannot be

doubted in any possession now they  
are genuine ones & I can produce them

I hope you will do myself & brother  
William Cook the favour to call upon  
Genl Paine or his successor and get  
him to overlook them carefully &  
see if he will not do myself & brother
