Sir:

You will proceed to the residence of the Persons herein named and deal with them in accordance with the following instructions.

In all cases where the residences of Persons are ordered to be destroyed, you will observe the following previous to setting them on fire.

You will first search their houses & premises to see if they have any articles belonging to the U. S. Gov. or that are Contraband of War, which you will bring away in case any are found, also all or any of the following articles that may be found — belonging to the aforesaid Persons.

First

All horses, Hogs, Sheep, Cattle and any other animals or articles of whatever description that may be valuable to the U. S. Govt. especially those that are valuable to the Quartermaster, Commissary and Hospital Department.

Second

All stoves, and stove pipes of whatever description and all Kitchen Utensils, Quens ware, beds, bedding, Knives, forks &c. also all chairs, sofas, sociables, lounges and everything of the character of household furniture.

Third.

All windows, sash and glass, looking glasses, Carpets &c.

Fourth

Every article of household furniture, which you do not bring with you must be destroyed or burned with the house.

Fifth

All Barns, Stables, Snow Houses, or any other Houses of any description whatsoever or any building or article that could be possibly be of use, benefit or comfort to Rebels or Bushwackers their friends, or any Persons, aiding, abetting or sympathizing with Rebels, Bushwackers & which could be used for subsistence for man or beast will be destroyed or burned.

Sixth

All Animals, forage, or other articles of value brought in by you will be turned over to Lieut. J. W. Raymond A.D.C. M. on this Staff to be subject to the order of Major Genl. Meibrey to be disposed of as he may think proper — taking a receipt therefore from Lieut. Raymond.

Seventh

The Train accompanying will be subject to your orders, together with all the Persons connected with it, whether Soldiers or Citizens and you will cause any of them who may be guilty of committing depredations upon loyal Citizens or their property, to be arrested and you will not yourself or suffer those under your Command to commit any trespass or do any damage to Persons or property except those specified in this Order.

Eighth

The following Persons harbor Bushwackers  
you will cause everything that is valuable to the  
Gov. (as per instructions above given) to be taken  
and where in your judgement, it would not entail  
too much suffering to women and children will  
burn their houses.

Sir

During the temporary evacuation of  
this place lately by the U & G forces under the  
Maj Genl Comdg. The Guerrillas came onto town  
and robbed peaceful citizens of loyal character  
and behaved in a most shameful and cowardly  
manner more resembling savages than persons professing  
to be civilized. They were particularly severe upon the  
negroes who were left in the place and took  
particular pains to burn every negro cabin house  
and shanty in town.

Therefore as an example and  
a warning in future to that class of robbers and  
murderers and as a simple act of justice to a helpless  
and inoffensive class of people who are unable to  
help themselves, and the fruits of whose labor force,  
whole summer and fall have been swept away in  
a most wanton manner it is the intention of the  
Maj Genl Comdg. to make the relatives, friends  
their aiders abettors and advisors of those who  
committed the act repair the damage which their  
Bushwacking relatives and friends have committed.

---

You are therefore ordered to bring them  
up from the country a list of whom in-  
crepts annexed. (marked "A") And to compel  
them to build up every house room or occupied  
by Negroes that were destroyed. And place  
in as good if not better condition than they  
were before.

Also the list that is attached  
marked ("B") will be required to furnish  
subsistence and anything that may be  
necessary for the comfort of their friends  
in the list of those marked ("C")  
while completing their job.

Any other details not mentioned  
within shall may be necessary to complete  
the work are left to your discretion.  
And a guide will be furnished you  
upon application, to point out the  
residences of the persons who are in either  
of the lists.

I reside Bedford Co Tenn: I am acquainted with W. C. Kidd of Coffee Co Tenn: I arrested said Kidd on or about the 17<sup>th</sup> inst at Shelbyville Tenn: He ~~Kidd~~ was in company with one Ferguson. As cars in to town with Ferguson: I arrested Ferguson by order of Genl Milroy: Said Ferguson denied his name said it was Jenkins. "That he could prove his name was Jenkins by said Kidd who came in town, Shelbyville, with him". I called Kidd up to where Ferguson & self were standing and asked him "what is that mans name" alluding to Ferguson. Kidd answered "Jenkins": Believing that it was Ferguson I arrested them both under the impression that they were trying to deceive me: They both afterward admitted that they had lied that their object was to try and make me believe that Fergusons name was Jenkins in order that he Ferguson might not be arrested: Said Ferguson is accused of stealing from the Govt while in ~~the~~ employe was arrested once previous but made his escape since which time he has been doing the authorities.

I sent said Kidd & Ferguson to Prov Marshall at Tullahoma. Kidd I arrested & found under arrest as being accessory to said Ferguson. Ferguson made his escape again while in transit.

Dear Sir -

Your favor of the 30<sup>th</sup> ult. enclosing papers in case of United States vs Gen. H. Moore was received this morning, after a careful examination of them, I must concur in opinion on with Maj. Eaton, that "no offense is sufficiently proven to warrant a conviction", although I have no doubt he is a bad man, I have no additional evidence against him, consequently I do not desire to take any action in the matter.

Extract of Special order No. 333, paragraph 4, Office of the Pro. Mar. Genl. Dept. of the Mo. dated Decr. 30<sup>th</sup> 1864, directing that "the following named prisoners at Gratiot St. Mil. Prison, now under indictment in Montgomery Co. Mo. will be turned over to the S<sup>h</sup> of said County, on his requisition, viz. William H. Annally, Thomas Miller, James H. Kogge, Harton Mansfield, and Samuel H. Jennings"

was received also. Upon examination of the charges and specifications against them, I find they are charged with robbery on several occasions, besides disloyalty &c. The indictment as you will discover, was drawn under and in accordance with Sec. 32, of Art. 3, of an Act concerning Crimes and their punishment, (Page 577 Rev. Stat. Mo. 1855) and only charges on specific offense, that of larceny in a dwelling house—

I could not indict them for robbery, as the man had fled, and left the door open, and they entered, consequently there was no breaking, an essential ingredient in the crime in the crime of robbery. They took the money in the presence of Mr. Edward Cullom's wife, (of Montgomery Co) which I am told she will testify to. I suggest therefore, that you add the charge to the ones already made, and try them by Cours. martial, as I have no doubt that they can be readily convicted, with <sup>the</sup> assistance I shall be able to render you by giving you the names of witnesses, and for the further reason that the Court does not sit <sup>in</sup> Montgomery County until the

3

4<sup>th</sup> Monday in May next, and there is no jail in the County, sufficient to keep a prisoner, and if there were, they would perhaps be released by their confederates, before that time. If however you ~~will~~ prefer not, or cannot try them by Court martial, I should be pleased to have you retain them in prison until the sitting of the Court, at which time the Sheriff will make a requisition for them, but if they cannot be retained please inform me, and I shall instruct the Sheriff to take charge of them and place them in jail in St. Louis.

Thanking you kindly for your country in this matter, and hoping that we shall be able to cooperate with each other in our respective spheres, for the restoration of law and order in our country until the old banner—now the emblem of freedom, shall wave triumphantly over every inch of its soil.

Burch forcibly arrested and carried the said Burch into the State of Missouri with many threats of personal violence, and took from the said Burch a horse and bridle which have not been returned.

The Citizens of said County have been informed that an effort will be made

Therefore to avoid all trouble which might foolishly arise from this case, and also to quiet the fears of the Citizens of said County, I will be obliged if you will issue such orders to your Commanding Officer at St Genevieve as will prevent any attempt by any one to release the said Ruby or which may involve the State in trouble over the matter. 

CHARGE:

*"Aiding and encouraging outlaws and guerrillas."*

SPECIFICATION: "In this, that she, Mrs. Wealthy Robertson, did, at her house in Johnson County, State of Missouri, on or about the 1st day of June, A. D. 1864, and at divers other times, harbor, conceal, feed and encourage a number of persons, whose names are unknown, outlaws, guerrillas and rebel enemies of the United States, she, the said Wealthy Robertson, knowing them to be such, and failing and neglecting to report the said outlaws and guerrillas to the military authorities of the United States. This in the State of Missouri, A. D. 1864."

To which charge and specification the prisoner pleaded as follows:

To the specification, "Not Guilty."

To the charge, "Not Guilty."

FINDING:

The Commission, having maturely considered the evidence adduced, finds the prisoner as follows:

Of the specification, "Not Guilty."

SPECIFICATION: "In this, that he, Charles F. Cory, citizen, did, on the 18th day of March, 1862, take and subscribe an oath of allegiance to the Government of the United States, before an officer duly authorized and empowered to administer the same, at the city of St. Louis, Mo., by the terms of which said oath, he, the said Charles F. Cory, bound and obligated himself to support, protect and defend the Constitution and Government of the United States, and bear true faith, loyalty and allegiance thereto, and afterward, about the month of March, 1864, at St. Louis, Mo., he violated his oath, in this, that he knowingly and willfully received from J. Wesley Rowe, a rebel enemy of the United States, a package of letters from rebel enemies of the United States, beyond the lines of the military forces of the United States, directed to rebel sympathizers within the city of St. Louis, said Cory knowing the character of said letters and of said Rowe; and in this, that he neglected to report said Rowe to the military authorities of the United States, in accordance with his oath, and attempted and proposed to convey said letters to their destination."

CHARGE SECOND:

*"Violation of the Laws of War."*

SPECIFICATION: "In this, that he, Charles F. Cory, citizen, did, at St. Louis, Mo., on or about the 15th day of March, 1864, knowingly and voluntarily receive from a known rebel enemy, and undertake and attempt to deliver as directed, knowing their character and purpose, a large number of letters from rebel enemies of the United States to persons in the State of Missouri, which letters had been wrongfully and secretly conveyed from within the rebel lines, through and within the lines of the United States forces, and were calculated and intended to aid and encourage rebels and rebel sympathizers, and to give aid and comfort to the existing rebellion."

To all of which charges and specifications the prisoner pleaded "Not Guilty."

FINDING:

The Commission, having maturely considered the evidence adduced, finds the prisoner as follows:

Of the specification, first charge, "Not Guilty."

Of the first charge, "Not Guilty."

Of the specification, second charge, "Not Guilty."

Of the second charge, "Not Guilty."

And the Commission does therefore "acquit" him, CHARLES F. CORY.

Finding and acquittal confirmed. In consequence of the known complicity of the prisoner with the rebels, he will be released only on condition that he reside, during the war, north and east of Springfield, Illinois, not to pass south or west of those limits on penalty of imprisonment, giving his parole and bond of five thousand dollars, with good security, for his compliance with these conditions. The Provost Marshal General is charged with the execution of this order.

III.....Before the Military Commission, which convened at Rolla, Mo., pursuant to Special Orders, number 2, current series, from Head Quarters, District of Rolla, Missouri, and of which Captain REUBEN BAKER, of the Seventeenth Regiment of Cavalry Illinois Volunteers, is President, was arraigned and tried:

VALENTINE THOMPSON SUMMERS, a citizen of Washington County, Missouri, on the following charges and specifications:

CHARGE FIRST:

"Being a robber."

SPECIFICATION FIRST: "In this, that he, Valentine Thompson Summers, a citizen of Washington County, State of Missouri, did, of his own wrong, enter into an organization, associate and combine with a number of men whose names are unknown, robbers and horse thieves, for the purpose of plundering peaceable citizens of the State of Missouri. This in Washington county, and Crawford county, Missouri, on or about the 15th day of July, A. D. 1863, and during the summer of the same year."

SPECIFICATION SECOND: "In this, that he, Valentine Thompson Summers, a citizen of Washington County, State of Missouri, did, of his own wrong, enter into an organization, associate and combine with Samuel Stewart and Charles Bostwick, and numbers of others, whose names are unknown, robbers and horse thieves, for the purpose of plundering peaceable citizens of the State of Missouri, on or about the 11th day of July, A. D. 1864."

CHARGE SECOND:

"Receiving stolen property knowing the same to have been stolen."

SPECIFICATION: "In this, that he, Valentine Thompson Summers, a citizen of Washington County, Missouri did receive from some person or persons, whose names are unknown, and convert to his own use one horse, the property of Samuel B. Grant, of Washington County, knowing the same to have been stolen. This in Washington County, Missouri, on or about the 10th day of July, A. D. 1864."

To all of which charges and specifications the prisoner pleaded "Not Guilty."

FINDING :

The Commission, having maturely considered the evidence adduced; finds the prisoner as follows :

- Of the first specification; first charge, "Not Guilty."
- Of the second specification, first charge, "Guilty, except the words, 'and a number of others whose names are unknown.'"
- Of the first charge, "Guilty."
- Of the specification, second charge, "Guilty, except the words, 'from some person or persons whose names are unknown.'"
- Of the second charge, "Guilty."

SENTENCE :

And the Commission does therefore sentence him, VALENTINE THOMPSON SUMMERS, "to be imprisoned in the Missouri State Penitentiary for the term of five years."

Finding and sentence confirmed. In consideration of the youth of the prisoner, the severity of the wounds received by him when captured, his long imprisonment before trial, and his good conduct while in custody, the sentence is remitted, and he will be released under the direction of the Provost Marshal General.

SPECIFICATION : "In this, that the said Samuel Hoover, a citizen of Dade county, Mo., being a citizen of the United States, and owing allegiance thereto, did use the following disloyal expression, to wit: 'I am a rebel, and expect to be one until death; I was a rebel at the be-

ginning of this war, and I have not changed a particle; I am a rebel yet, or words to that effect, thereby meaning that he was an enemy to the United States Government, and a friend of, and sympathizer with, the enemies thereof. This at a public assembly, in presence and hearing of divers persons, at Dade county, Mo., on or about the 14th of August, 1864."

To which charge and specification the prisoner pleaded as follows:

Armstrong Beattie, citizen, and banker, of St. Joseph  
Mo.; was appointed by James C. Broadhead, Br. (Major Genl.)  
of the Department of Mo. Col. of the 6<sup>th</sup> Sub.  
Dist. of North Mo.

That after said appointment said Beattie entered upon  
the duties of said Post No. Mo. with head quarters at  
St. Joseph Mo.

On the 11<sup>th</sup> day of Nov. 1863, said Beattie caused  
to be brought before him certain witnesses among  
whom was Mary Briggs widow of Robert Briggs  
deceased. Who identified Henry M. Cyle as being  
one of the men who killed her husband. Other  
witnesses were produced who implicated Cyle  
the Kouscharocks, Clemmons and Bare as having  
a hand in the attempt to burn the house of one  
Calvert. Also evidence implicating Clemmons  
and Bare as having a hand in the killing of one

Sec. Officers of Andrew Co. Mo. Upon their evidence  
Beattie, Pro. Mar. Sent Henry Cagle, Micajah Vanhook,  
Thos. Vanhook, Jesse Clemmens and David Bear to  
jail.

That afterwards Henry M. Cagle was tried by Milit  
Commission, upon the charges for which he was  
incarcerated by Pro. Mar. Beattie, found guilty of  
Murder and condemned, by said Commission,  
to suffer death. The finding was subsequently disa-  
proved of by the Department Commander, and  
the prisoner released.

Afterwards, to wit in January 1865. Said Henry  
M. Cagle, Micajah Vanhook, Thos. Vanhook  
Jesse Clemmens and David Bear, commenced  
a prosecution against said Beattie, in the Circuit  
Court of Buchanan Co. Mo. for false imprisonment.  
Alleging, among other things, that Beattie was not  
an act Pro. Mar. and therefore, was a trespasser in causing  
the arrest and imprisonment of the plaintiffs.

Defendant Beattie filed his petition in the Circuit  
court of Buchanan Co. Mo. asking to have said cases  
transferred to the U.S. Circuit Court at St. Louis.

Acting in his petition that said Beattie, was protected  
in ~~from~~ prosecution in the State Courts by virtue of a  
certain act of Congress transferring such cases to the  
United States Courts. The plaintiffs filed demurrers  
to said petition, and as cause of demurrer urged  
that Beattie did not show in his petition

that he was legally commissioned Capt. Pro. Mar.  
and without such showing the petition was  
defective. The court sustained the demurrer of the  
petiffs and refused to send the cases up.

The defendants then filed a <sup>transcript</sup> ~~transcript~~ of the  
cases in the United States Court at St. Louis and  
<sup>made</sup> default in the circuit court of Buchanan Co. The  
petiff Ogle thereupon took default, the court  
entered an interlocutory judgment and finally  
assessed the damages in the case at—

The other cases, I believe have not been disposed of.  
I understand that the circuit court of the U.S. at  
St. Louis took cognizance of the cases, upon the trans-  
cripts filed in said court by the aft. Beattie, and  
rendered judgment in his favor.

I also inclose and send to you for reference, a  
statement of the defendants attys. Bissett & Williams,  
also the statement of Mfgt. Parker & Long attys for  
petiffs, that you may see upon what ground the  
attys predicate their prosecution & defence.

I therefore, Gent, respectfully submit this report  
to you, believing that it embraces the main points  
in the cases.

We, the undersigned, would most respectfully request permission, to retain possession of our property upon President's Island which your late order (turning over the possession of said Island to the Contraband Department) will dispossess us of; for the following reasons, viz;

1<sup>st</sup> - We are unable to see, that the exigencies of the service demand that the said Contraband Department should take possession of our timber, and force our men to cut it into merchantable wood, for the purpose of supplying Steam-Boats on the River and Citizens with the same, or that doing the above will advance the cause of the Government, or assist in putting down the rebellion.

2<sup>nd</sup> - We would state that our Wood-yard on the Island, is located three miles below the said Contraband Camp, with a solid

body of heavy timber intervening between us, which would require three years to clear, and that there is not an acre of improved land between the two points.

3rd - We would state that the Colored men in our employ, were never members of a Contraband Camp, but have been employed by us for nearly two years. Previous to our taking them to the Island (last February) they were engaged cutting wood for us, on the U. S. Military Rail Road, under our contract with Genl J. P. Webster to supply said Road with wood, and they have supported themselves and families during the whole time.

4th - Our men complain (having been compelled to work for the Contraband Department, since the 1<sup>st</sup> inst, or be ejected from their cabins) that while they have not advanced the price for cutting wood, they have that of provisions, from 20 to 30 per cent, charging from 35 to 40 cents per pound for Bacon, which we furnished at 30 cents, and 8 1/2 cents per pound for Flour, furnished by us, at 6 cents, and everything else in proportion.

5th - We would further state, that we took



our men to the Island with the full knowledge and consent of the General commanding the Department, and the Superintendent of Contrabands, and that Maj Genl Washburne kindly furnished us with arms, and gave permission to purchase ammunition to defend ourselves. That we have been a protection, instead of an injury to the Contraband Camp, having been attacked three times, whilst they have remained unmolested.

We have invested our money in property on the Island, in good faith, and are not aware that our operations there, can be construed in <sup>any</sup> way, as detrimental to the Federal Government.

The Island contains about Fourteen Thousand Acres, One Thousand of which are under cultivation, the balance is covered with heavy timber. The improvements being near the centre of the Island, which is about six miles long. With a medium stage of water Steamboats can land at nearly any point around the Island, at very low water there are but two places where large boats can land, at the bar near the Contraband Camp, or at the lower end of the Island.

Dear Sir

You desire me to state my opinion with regard to the loyalty and general character of Levi Everatt, and also with regard to his connection with a case of an assault upon Corporal J. H. Shaw for which he is now under arrest. With regard to his loyalty I can say nothing. What part he took in the matter referred to I do not know except from report.

As to his general character I know nothing against it. He has so far as I know, and I have known him from a boy, been very peaceable and quiet. Very sober and steady and never seeming disposed to engage in or encourage quarreling

or fighting in any way.

The case referred to was certainly a very ugly one, and no body doubts but some one ought to suffer, yet in view of Mr. Everatts general peaceable character I should regret to see him suffer for what I know was instigated by others.

His brother being principal in the assault, and he not seeing the beginning, I am satisfied Mr Everatt acted from the impulse of the moment and from motives of sympathy for his brother. Taking this view of his action in the matter I could but desire his release.

These are my views of the matter and if worth anything to you, you are at liberty to use them.

Captain:

On assuming command at Statchez, I found a carriage, pair of horses &c. at Head Quarters, being public property. My predecessor desired to take them away for his own use. Not wishing to withhold any courtesy, nor to avail myself of my authority in matters concerning mere personal convenience, I consented, and he took them. The disposition since made of them has not been by me a subject of enquiry.

Finding a carriage on the premises, belonging to the late occupant, Major G. M. Davis of the rebel army, I made use of it. Capt. Pence A. C. W. kindly loaning me temporarily a pair of horses, then recently taken with others, branded and turned over to him for public use.

The taking of horses at that time was a necessity, the enemy being troublesome, more than half of my few cavalry dismounted, and no animals obtainable on requisition. In special cases, such as undoubted loyalty, poverty &c., horses were returned. my purpose being

to take first and chiefly from rebels and dangerous persons. One pair was taken from Mr. John Minor, who still stands as disloyal (refusing to take the oath). His wife claimed them - claimed them for Mrs. Gillespie, wife of a well known rebel, as she is also well understood to be, though Mrs. Minor understands her to have taken the oath. I was satisfied that the horses were rebel property, proper to be retained for Government service, especially as like property of many worthy and poor persons not rebels was freely taken at the same time, and their return refused.

Being an order upon the Quartermaster to return these same horses to Mrs. John Minor, I perform the duty which I owe to Genl. Davidson and to myself to thus make known the facts. He will recollect that I had his consent to bring them with me. This morning I returned them to the Quartermaster.

Nat Harris (Colored) upon being brought up states that he works on the grain-wharf in the gang of which Thomas Burke is foreman; that being desirous of going to Washington to spend the holidays, and understanding that he would not be able to get a pass for the purpose, on the Tuesday after Christmas he went with West to the mail dock, to see the negro Charles Anderson, who then and there agreed to take them both to Washington on the mail boat and pass them through for ten dollars a piece. Anderson, West, and himself were present at the interview. West tells this story in precisely the same way. Nat Harris says he afterwards concluded not to run the risk of going without a pass, and consequently did not go back to Anderson.

I learn from Col. Powers that Anderson's character is bad; that after he had left Gen. Grant's Head Quarters, it was discovered that he had been accustomed to gamble with the other servants and win all their money; that he had applied to be re-employed there and

was refused on account of his bad character. It does not  
seem to be anything against <sup>Wm</sup> Thomas, and ~~that~~ that  
he should be discharged. West perhaps has been punished  
enough, and I think it would be best for the service that he  
should be discharged immediately. It is recommended  
to hold Andersson a while as a punishment, and then  
put him out of the army with a warning not to return.

The charge is now, that one of the other men paid him 12 dollars to get him through to Washington on the steamer that day, and upon being found on the boat without a proper pass, Charles Anderson laid the fault to the thick colored gentleman.

The old man tells the story of paying the money to Anderson with great truthfulness, and the examination of the two together was greatly against Anderson. The old man says that if permitted, he can show that Anderson agreed with him and another barber, the day before, to pass them to Washington, for ten dollars a piece.

Let the old man be sent with a non-commissioned officer to investigate this, and then returned

to me.

of which I destroyed four the fifth one  
being in good condition. I took a long  
I also took four Negroes off Buck Allens  
farm one whose name is Peter Ellet  
and who claims these boats as his property  
says carrying deserters across but says he  
is in the habit of camping the James River early  
in the morning some two or three times a  
week for the purpose as he says of carrying  
produce to sell but judging from the  
way that the boats were hid up the creek



that he has been following some un-  
lawful business. Judging from appearance of  
the place it has been a highway for  
escaping deserters. I therefore arrested  
all the young Blackmen I could  
find on the place.

Bro W. Banner (old) States, that he left Richmond  
last Monday 16<sup>th</sup> inst: a week ago, & arrived  
last Monday at Clairmount on the James  
River, - that he came thro' the lines to  
live with his family at Clairmount, - that  
he has never been in any of the boats,  
or has seen any one carried across in them,  
that he heard people say that they carry  
Wankes deuters across, - that they said  
Gilbert Wodden carried them across.

Peter Elliott (old) Lives at Clairmount on  
the river, - the boat belongs to a man  
named Gilbert, - heard them say, that  
Gilbert Wodden carried men across, -  
never have seen him carry any one  
across, - any free papers at home.

John Charity - Lives at Mr. Allens place about  
2 miles from the river - born free -  
was at home when arrested, - I never  
heard any one say, that Gilbert Wodden

took any one across.

John Wodden. States that he came down to Clairmont last Friday a week ago, that he is free & lives close by Robin point, six or seven miles from Clairmont, that he went to Clairmont to work, that he stayed with a man named Phil Brown, an Allen farm, that there are 3 old men on the place, that he heard them say, - Gilbert Wodden carried deserters across, - that he is a cousin of Gilbert Wodden.

The statements of these men, with the exception of John Charity, - all point to a colored man by the name of Gilbert Wodden, as the owner of the boats & the one who carries men across the river, & altho they deny having seen him in the act, they seem satisfied that it is done & that he does it.

I would therefore respectfully recommend, that a party be sent to arrest Gilbert Wodden, accompanied by one of these men to identify him, - when some light may be thrown on the subject.

I have just received your letter, of the 6<sup>th</sup> instant, requesting me to carry into effect the sentence of the military Commission in the case of Andrew Humphrey. I herewith send you a copy of the Order promulgated and must respectfully ask your attention to the following points:

First, your letter doubts my authority to organize a Military Commission - Now, if my letter of instructions from the Secretary of War does not give me that power, the trial is void and the sentence cannot be legally carried into effect. If I had the right to convene the Court then by the Acts of Congress, Approved

July 2<sup>nd</sup> 1864, I am clothed with the full power, to pardon the convicted or mitigate his punishment -

Sec 2 read. "And be it further enacted that every officer authorized to Order a general Court Martial shall have power to pardon or mitigate any punishment ordered by such Court" &c - There is an exception, but it does not apply to the case of Humphreys - See S O 231 1864. It cannot be contended that the words "Court Martial" does not include Military Commissions as the rules governing each have been placed upon the same footing by repeated Orders. Nor can it be fairly contended that my letter of instructions, compels me, to lend a blind consent to the illegal or unjust sentences of the Courts that I may convene - Such a construction would be an anomaly, unknown to the works on

on martial law - Another reason,  
 why I feel sure that the construction  
 I place on my letters, is correct, is,  
 that they were given in view of  
 my arresting and bringing to trial,  
 the very men presented before the  
 Commission. - In my opinion,  
 there are two errors committed by  
 the Commission, on the trial of  
 Hemphreys, which would before  
 a civil Court, reverse his case -  
 Gov. Morton fully concurs in the  
 course taken by me, in Hemphreys  
 case. Other prominent Union  
 men petitioned me to release him  
 with a defective record, with the  
 light testimony, and with a strong  
 feeling in the public mind in  
 his favor, I deemed it prudent  
 and politic to release him. He  
 resides in Green County, an in-  
 -accessible part of the State, and  
 his re-arrest, would be attended

at this time, with considerable feeling -

Believing as I do, that my action has been entirely lawful, and for the good of the County, I most earnestly request, that you will not order his arrest, until the President shall have acted upon his case. The record being embraced with that of Bowles and others, has been sent to the President more than ten days since.

Howatson & Co., in Fidelity Jersey les Illinois, about the middle of the street I was halted by Tom Wood, I ~~halted~~ walked on a few paces, he halted me again, when turning around I found a revolver in his hand pointed at me, I asked Tom what he wanted, upon which he replied "Stand there", I stood leaning against the counter, immediately after Robert Watson a citizen of Fidelity Ill<sup>o</sup> came walking into the store up to the Post Office case, and turning around apparently to go out, he was also halted by Tom Wood, Watson making a slight move Wood shot him, the ball taking effect, upon which Robert Watson sprang towards him and after a short tussel threw Wood, he calling for Simpson to assist when Wood & Watson loosening their holds, Wood again shot Watson, and as far as I can tell the ball took effect, Wood making his escape and Simpson and Watson still tussling, when Simpson surrendered and upon being told William Bond, a man came up and demanded his release.

Robert Watson died from the effects of the shot the same night. Wilson J. Whitfield

Personally appeared before me Quin C. Hawkins a citizen of Fidelity Jersey County Illinois, who being duly sworn, says, that on the seventh day of November 1864. William Simpson and Tom Moad entered my store in the town of Fidelity Illinois, each in, each hand a Revolver walked into the office, where I was sitting. Moad said "By God, <sup>damn</sup> a southern rebel, and Simpson is a deserter from the Union army, and by God will fight for who we please and Simpson can't be arrested in this town." then turning to Benjamin Christoph a citizen of Jersey County Illinois, told him to sit down, pointing his pistol toward him. Moad then turned around and came into the storeroom, Simpson following. Simpson walked toward Henry A. Folger a citizen of Fidelity Ills asking him if he had said, he would arrest him, Folger remarked, that he had not, then Simpson repeated the question two or three times in rather a boisterous tone. Folger still answering in the negative, when Moad turned around and said to Simpson, "Well that's enough, when a man says he hasn't done a thing, that's enough". Simpson then returned to the office, and wanted to know where Savage was and said that Savage had said he was going to arrest him, and also that he was a horse thief and said "Bye God, I'll kill

him, the first time I set my eyes on him". Then my  
brother James J. Hauskins walked into the office  
close following him with his revolver pointed to-  
wards him said "What's your crime". He told him  
and I remarked "that is my brother" when he walk-  
ed toward the front door of the storeroom and  
leaned against the counter. Then Wilson J. Whit-  
field a citizen of Fidelity Mo. came walking into  
the store, when about the centre of the room,  
Hose presented a revolver, and ordered him  
to halt, which he did and leaned against the  
back part of the counter in the store, and very  
soon afterwards Robert Watson a citizen of Fidi-  
lity Mo. came in and walked up to the Post  
Office case, and turned apparently to go out  
and as he turned around, Hose presented a  
revolver at him, and said "Halt, God damn you".  
Watson made a slight move and Hose fired at  
him, ball taking effect. - at the instance of being  
shot, Watson sprang forward caught Hose  
after a short tussle, threw him upon the floor  
as Hose fell he called for Simpson to assist  
him. Simpson having remained in the office, to  
guard me. Simpson ran to his assistance. Being  
sick I was carried out of the back door by friends.  
Watson died the same evening from the effect of  
the shot.

Secret as I think my punishment has been, I am ready to suffer the penalty for this.

If she is condemned to any punishment for this, I shall suffer a thousand times more in spirit than ~~than~~ she could in body, therefore I write these hasty lines to beg of you to excuse her and inflict upon me if you will - no one else had any thing whatever to do with it, and I declare to you that Mrs Menden and her daughter

not only disapproved it, but were  
independent about it. As you have

The statement of John A. Gardner, relative to the case of Peter R. Smith, shows that Smith

is now engaged in smuggling. - He lives some distance from Charleston Mo, and the roads being extremely bad, prevents his arrest at present. -

Wm C. Forrest, who was arrested with Mrs. T. Henderson, I think as per statement of Jas. T. Bolvin, should be released, as the evidence show him not to have been interested in the goods found in his possession or connected with their purchase. -

short and stiff, redigottee. 24 yrs. thick-set; florid complexion.  
Will Thompson - 22 yrs. long black hair; black eyes,  
dark complexion, about 5 ft. high and well proportioned.

Quirk, Sanford. 30 yrs. Dark hair and eyes; florid complexion; tall and thin. (6 ft. high). stoops slightly in shoulders, when walking. Suffered severely from secondary syphilis.

Lau Sargent. 45 yrs. Dark thin hair. balding on his forehead. 5 ft. 7 in. thin, with long sharp features and nose, black whiskers.

Robert Mintes. 40 yrs. 5 ft. 5 in. very stout; has brown hair, fair complexion. Grey eyes, face is pock-marked. With plain diagonal scars across his forehead.

George Deus. 22 yrs. 5 ft. 5 in. thin; dark (black) hair, eyes and complexion. Small man. On his arm has rebel flag pricked in with Tacks freely.

French. 45 yrs. 5 ft. 7 in. Light hair and complexion; red goatee; no mustache; is near sighted and generally wears glasses. Face inclined to florid.

Maj. Videngraff. 48 yrs. 5 ft. 7 in. Very stout and muscular. Hair thin and light. Bald on top of head. Blue eyes & complexion.

Alex. Latimore. 35 years or 40. Dark hair, eyes and complexion. 5 ft. 8 in. Stout and muscular. Has dark mustache. A proprietor of St. Charles Hotel in Bagdad.

Jack Collins. 50 yrs. 6 ft. Dark hair, long and inclined to grey. Uses glasses to read or write. Thin, spare man. Quick and noticeable in movements.

Wes. Mitchell. 30 yrs. 5 ft. 9 in. Red hair; florid complexion; grey eyes. Of Irish descent. Near sighted. Wears whiskers. Of full habit.

Wm. Mills: 27 yrs. 5 ft. 7 in of spare build. black hair, eyes and mustache. Of English descent. Stoops considerably in walking. cross-eyed.

John Alexander: 36 yrs. 5 ft. 9 in Red face, brown eyes, light hair. Thin and slight in build. Was a stage driver, by profession in Texas.

Nick Stevenson: 35 yrs. 5 ft. 8 in. Light hair and eyes. Face slightly pockmarked. Thick, full lips. Stout.

Dr. Milton: 40 yrs. 5 ft. 9 in Dark hair and eyes. Full, heavy mustache and long beard, reaching down his breast. Thin.

The above men are the leading parties. There are six (6) others, whose full names are unknown to informant. Remember them as Nick, Bill, Tom etc. The gang proposed to capture the Clinton, from Brazos. - to go separately to Havana and New York and attempt a surprise of the Evening Star, or Columbia, on their way to New Orleans. Also, a passenger in a disabled schooner, to lie in the track of the California steamer, be picked up and to surprise some one of them.

Understanding that an application has been made to prevent the sale of the property seized in the suit of Mrs Susan M. Price vs. John A. Somers, & that the decision of the application rests with you, I beg leave, as the Atty. for Mrs Price, to present a brief statement & to request, that should you deem it necessary, you will permit me to make a further explanation & statement in person.

Mushaway originally owned the property, but (as it is believed) the more readily to raise money, transferred it to Somers, <sup>his brother in law,</sup> who having obtained a loan on it from Mr. Price, the husband of the Plff. re-conveyed the property to Mushaway, he assuming payment of the loan. Price died & his widow administered his succession. The bulk of the property was by his will bequeathed to his

wife & consisted principally of the Mortgage bonds of the Opelousas Railroad Co. The Government having taken Military possession of that road, & the Company failing to pay interest on its bonds, Mrs Price was soon distressed for money. Under these circumstances I called upon Somers & in vain endeavored to collect the interest due on his note. I proposed then if he would pay the interest & \$500- of the principal that I would extend payment for a year. I received only promises & threats of Military interposition if I brought suit. Suit was brought and a judgment resisted by numerous technical defences. Mrs Price has been compelled to borrow money from friends to meet her necessary expenses & is now paying her board bills with money so obtained.

The debt is a just one, it is due to one who greatly needs the money and is owing by those whom it is believed, can raise

the amount, or could do so, if it were not for Mushaway's own maladministration of property entrusted to him as Tutor, which has not only impaired his credit, but as his Counsel asserts, cast a cloud upon the title of the property seized & reduced the security held by Mrs Price -

The facts I have thus briefly stated are susceptible of proof, and before you decide to stop the sale, I respectfully request, that you will appoint a time for hearing the statement & proofs of both parties -

Having no political connection  
with the Government of the  
Confederate States or any other  
Government our business in this

regulations of the orders published here on that subject we had several communications with Col: H Robinson who we believe laid our plans before General Hurlbut. no complaints were ever made to us and we were quietly awaiting results when on the 29<sup>th</sup> of December 1864. we were arrested by order of Major General Curley, and made to procure bonds in the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars each to report every morning to the P. M. General Col: Wood not to leave the City until such time

permission and aid proceeded to the City

we then reported to our General George Cappel Esq and to the State Marshal General "Ed A Robinson." The only known authority to report to our business in the City is purely of a Commercial character in accordance with your own orders on the subject of bringing produce to D.C. from outside the Confederate lines, we have had several communications with Col. A Robinson who knew our business, and who as we believe laid the same before Gen. Knott and we and our business and also with Prior to many loyal citizens of the City, to the United States Marshal, Col. Ralphe Esq and to the Dutch General George Cappel Esq.

Believing we have done no wrong, we ask to be relieved from our bonds, and to be at liberty with your permission, to return from whence we came.

To make this personal request feeling sure you are not yet in possession of the real facts of our case.

We, the undersigned on duty in the Bureau of General Superintendence in the office of the Provost Marshal General of the Department of the Missouri, do each of us hereby solemnly swear that we will bear true allegiance to the United States, and support and sustain the Constitution and laws thereof; that we will maintain the National Sovereignty paramount to that of all State, County or Confederate powers; that we will discourage, discountenance, and forever oppose secession, rebellion and the disintegration of the Federal Union, that we disclaim and denounce all faith and fellowship with the so called Confederate Armies, and pledge our honor, our property, and our lives to the sacred performance of this our solemn Oath of Allegiance to the Government of the United States of America, and that in the performance of our duties under the orders of the Provost Marshal General of the Department

of the Missouri, we will discharge those duties  
in strict accordance with this Oath, and  
will not in any manner, or at any time,  
directly or indirectly, divulge, or cause to be  
divulged, disclose or discover, or cause to be  
disclosed or discovered, such knowledge or  
information as we may obtain in the discharge  
of our duties, the making known of which

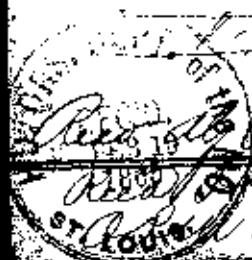

Charles M. Scott Pilot on Gunboat  
Choctaw being duly sworn says:

The Gunboat Choctaw lies opposite  
Bayou Sara:

On the evening of the 19<sup>th</sup> inst. I was  
ordered by Captain Cornwall of the Choctaw  
to take the cutter and crew and go  
up the River to a point some four miles  
above and lie in wait to intercept a  
ferryman whom, he had information,  
was crossing Rebel mails nightly in  
the vicinity of Col. Claiborne's residence:

I proceeded to the point indicated in  
tow of the tug "Hyacinth"; on arriving  
there I took up position as ordered the tug  
proceeding up the River as a blind;  
about a half an hour afterwards while  
lying under the East Bank, the sound  
of oars was heard on the opposite side  
of the River; soon after a boat approached  
which I started for, and which on dis-  
covering me started for the shore above  
me; as soon as it reached the willow the  
occupant plunged into the River this was  
about (30) Thirty feet from the shore:

I captured this man before he reached the  
shore. On searching him, I found a note  
without date signed by Col. Claiborne,  
and a letter dated the 15<sup>th</sup> of January:

He gave his name as ——— Ferry

On bringing him to the Choctaw he was identified as a noted Rebel mail carrier - said Terry states he was born in the State of New York and has taken the oath of Allegiance since the capture of New Orleans - On the morning of the 18<sup>th</sup> inst., Capt. Cornwall ordered the Executive Officer, Mr. M. B. Muncy, and myself, to take a squad of men and arrest Col. Claiborne - On arriving at his house we found he had gone down the River to opposite the Choctaw. We proceeded down the bank in order to intercept him till we met a person who informed us that Capt. Cornwall had already arrested Col. Claiborne, we then returned to the Choctaw.

On the 19<sup>th</sup> (to-day), Capt. Cornwall ordered me to take Col. Claiborne and deliver him to Gen. Ullmann at Morganza, which I have done.

On my way up I particularly examined the locality where I had arrested Terry and whence he started and without being positive to the exact spot am convinced it was from one half to three quarters of a mile below Col. Claiborne and in the immediate vicinity of Judge Cooley's house.

I have the honor to report that I went to Annapolis to find out who the parties were that were buying the Paroled Soldiers Commutation. The soldiers do not receive their commutation until they arrive at Camp Parole which is about 3 miles from the City. I went to the camp and saw the soldiers receiving their checks and found that the only parties buying these checks are the Sellers at Camp Parole, Their names are Mess Crowley & Jones. I saw as many as fifty men standing to sell their checks to these men, and ~~with~~ in conversation with the soldiers, they told me

that Crowley and Jones took from twelve to fifteen dollars off of every check, before they would cash them for the soldiers, and they (the soldiers) can not get out of camp so long as Crowley can see a chance to buy their checks. There are no soldiers allowed in the city. Their checks run from \$50 to \$100. There is no business of the kind done in the city and the Sutters are the only parties engaged in it. The Soldiers complain very much about these men charging so very high for every thing they get.

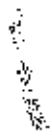
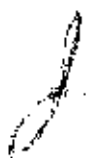

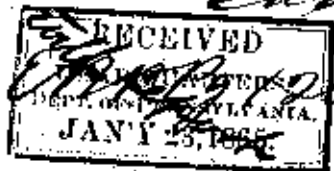

I only knew the man with the fur cap a few days - He told me to stick to him and he would see me all right. Have known M. Gregor over three - he was in Co. "A" 76<sup>th</sup> P. S. I was in Co. "D" 76<sup>th</sup> P. S. M. Gregor told me I should give his name and enlist with his discharge. I was to get \$400. for three years and I would not go. Did not know what they were to get. Was examined at Chambersburg but do not know why they did not put me in. Was a farmer when I enlisted - Am now 21 years old. M. Gregor told me what to say. M. Gregor was with me at Chambersburg. M. Gregor and the man with the fur cap on seemed to be very well acquainted.

I gave the discharge I had in the office to M. Gregor before I came in. The man with the fur cap on was to pay me.

you, to give his statement.

I have thought advisable to send them to you, and have the cases fully investigated and disposed.

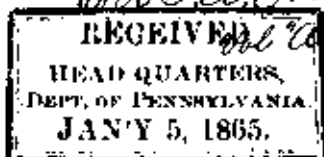

I have the honor to submit the following report in the cases of S. H. Kirleman and Henry Kirleman of Jackson Township Columbia County.

These cases were prepared for trial to-day. The witnesses arrived promptly but I am unable to proceed as only one member of the Commission is present. Genl Rowley has not reported and Capt Loyd is sick.

I have carefully examined the witnesses summoned by the Government and fail to obtain anything satisfactory against the accused.

I deem it inexpedient to enter upon the trial for the following reasons.

1<sup>st</sup> I believe they will be acquitted of all the charges and Specifications.

2<sup>nd</sup> I am informed by reliable men and by men who support the present Administration that the Kirlemans are not generally believed to be much implicated in the difficulties in Columbia County - that they are quiet and peaceable citizens and have never taken an active part in political movements.

3<sup>rd</sup> - The men have already been pretty severely punished and are willing and anxious to be set free upon a promise or oath of good behavior in the future.

4<sup>th</sup> Friends of the parties are very anxious for their release without trial and will esteem it great leniency on the part of the Government if the release is granted.

The friends of Hirslemans object ~~to~~ to trial on the ground that it will be very expensive and even if they are acquitted, weeks and perhaps months must elapse before the findings of the Commission are made public and the men released.

I am of the opinion that the interests of the Government will be best subserved by the release of the said Hirslemans upon the same Conditions required of the others who have been discharged without a trial.

I have hesitated to make this statement lest you should think me inclined to leniency with the Columbia County men. I assure you that such is not the case. If I could discover testimony sufficient to base any hope of conviction upon, I would be the last to abandon the Cases.

Under the Circumstances however I believe the best interests of the Government and military service require that the men be released.

In compliance with the order of the Brig. Genl. Commanding on the Report of my Chief Clerk relative to the absence of Miss Harrison from this Post, I have the honor to make the following Report.

I do not consider it necessary for me to make any statement in extenuation for Mr. Cochrane's actions, the Asst. Provost Marshal having himself requested that all statements made in said Report in relation to him be erased.

Upon investigation I find that Mr. Keason, my Storekeeper knew nothing in relation to the manner of Miss Harrison's procuring the Pass, nor was he in any way implicated in the affair. He met the young Lady at the Depot, as a personal favor to Mr. Stoddard. I do not think him at all blameable.

Mr. Stoddard acknowledges to me (as he has heretofore done to the Genl. Comd'g.) that he furnished the Pass on which Miss Harrison went to Baltimore, and says in extenuation for having done so, that he was ignorant of the fact

that it was necessary for parties applicant to take the oath of allegiance. He also says that he had not the most remote intention of doing anything prejudicial to the interests of the Government.

He expresses sincere regret at having given the Pass, and assures me that it was done without proper consideration and with no improper intention.

After a thorough investigation, I am led to believe that all Blank Passes procured from the office of the Provost Marshal were received by Mr. Cochran upon personal application, and I do not think Mr. Stoddard ever made an application to the Provost Marshal for Blank Passes, Capt. Vorey was in the habit of giving Blank Passes to Mr. Cochran and he acknowledges to have so represented to Capt. Crosby.

I shall await the instructions of the Brig. Genl Comdg, in relation to the matter, and will act in accordance with the same.

In compliance with your instructions, I have the honor to report the following in relation to the "facts connected with Miss Keissner's absence from this Post."

Miss Keissner left this Post on or about last Thursday upon a pass evidently furnished her by Mr. H. K. Stoddard, Property Clerk in the G. M. Dept. here. It appears to me that three of the Clerks in said Dept. were implicated in the affair. Mr. Gen. M. W. Hays Military Storekeeper, went to meet her upon her return to this place, and must have known where she had been & when she expected to return. Mr. Sen. C. Cochran Capt. Mayford's Chief Clerk, when she was brought to this Office in arrest, came here and in what I deemed a very insolent manner, demanded her release. He was exceedingly very indignant when

his request was denied. He had considerable conversation with her, and when she was released escorted her home. His conduct was such as to satisfy me, that he was cognizant of the whole affair, if not seriously implicated.

Miss Harrison at first denied having a pass in her possession, but subsequently admitted, that Mr. Stoddard furnished her with one, and that the Officer at the Dept took it away from her. This the Officer denies.

The pass had Capt. Crosby's signature undoubtedly, or some time since, a communication reached this Office, requesting that a few blank papers be sent to Capt. Mifflin's Office, for the use of the employees in said Office. This communication was signed "W. C. Hooper, Capt. &c. per Mr. Stoddard." The request was complied with. Three or four (perhaps half a dozen) blank papers with Capt. Crosby's signature were sent to Captain Mifflin's Office. This will explain how Mr. Stoddard came in possession of the paper. Miss Harrison never came here to get a pass herself, nor was there one procured at

this Office for her by another person, that I am aware of. The pass she used was probably some of those sent to Capt. Mayford's Office, filled out by some one connected with that Office. The passes signed by Capt. Condy and sent to Capt. Mayford were intended for the use and benefit of the employees in his Office only. There never have been any blank papers given to any one, except to Captain Mayford, since I have been connected with this Office.

Mays place about 7 o'clock P.M. and they ordered him (Lewis Mays) to go with them - told them I did not want to go but they made me. They took me to Leadis and put me with others in a church where they kept us until we were taken to Smithland where we were examined by the Surgeon.

They then told me to make "my marks" on a paper which I did. Don't know what the paper was.

Tom Wharton (Colored man) having been sworn says that he is about 29 years old and was last owned by George Wharton of Swigg Co. Ky. On Monday night week ago (Jan 9<sup>th</sup> 65) a Lieut. and some colored soldiers from the 13<sup>th</sup> U.S. C.A. were at George Wharton's place.

They met me as I was coming from a neighbors about nine o'clock at night and halted me and told me they wanted me to go to town with them but I told them I did not want to go. The Lieut. did not speak to me but the black soldiers did. They would not allow me

to go to my house to get my blankets but  
 took me to a church in Lucca where they  
 had heard Lucaris and there we were guarded  
 until we went to Smithland. After we got  
 to Smithland we were examined by a Doctor.  
 The Lieut ordered me to make my marks  
 to a paper which I did. I do not know  
 what the paper was. On Thurston my  
 master has always told me that when I  
 wanted to volunteer in the army I could go.

Joseph Abbott 1<sup>st</sup> Asst Surgeon 13 U.S. G. H. A. on  
 being sworn states that he examined the  
 above named man (James Thurston) and found  
 nothing to prevent his becoming a soldier.

James Thurston on being asked  
 by Lieut Hart 13 U.S. G. H. A. if he was willing  
 to go into the service said he was willing  
 if the Doctor said he was able.

I saw the men make their marks  
 to the enlistment papers. The enlistment  
 papers were not explained to the men  
 on my presence but I supposed they  
 all understood what they were signing.

James D. Fenner 1<sup>st</sup> Lt. U.S. G. H. A. being sworn  
 states that he was present during the  
 examination of James Thurston and he  
 (Pat Thurston) was asked if he was willing  
 to go into the service and he answered



that he was willing to go if the Doctor said he was able and the Surgeon upon examination stated that there was nothing to prevent his becoming a soldier and soon after he was asked or told to sign enlistment papers. The men all made their marks to the enlistment papers with apparent willingness or compulsion being used in any case.

There were no explanations made to the colored <sup>men</sup> in my hearing of what they were signing, but I think they all knew what they were signing. Do not know any thing in regard to the other three men.

Harvey Wilson (Colored) being sworn states that he is 36 years old and was last owned by A. Wilson of Swigg Co Ky.

A Lieut. and some colored soldiers came to my house week ago last Tuesday (Jan 10<sup>th</sup>) night and told me that wanted me to go to Leado with them. The colored soldiers put bayonets on their guns and made me go.

When I got to Smithland I was examined by a Doctor and the Lieut. made me make my marks to a paper against my will and I did not know what the paper was.

The undersigned would respectfully state, that whilst they were doing business in the Planters Tobacco Warehouse under the name of Campbell, Larnett & Co, about the last of March or the 1<sup>st</sup> of April 1864, the Warehouse was taken possession of, and occupied by Federal troops for several weeks, The day they came into the building, a large sorrel Mare mule belonging to the firm, which they used in their dray, became frightened & broke her halter, ran out of the house and made her escape outside of the pickets. The undersigned sent without delay a boy after her, but as the lines were closed, the pickets would not let the messenger pass to her, though she was in sight, grazing not more than 50 or a hundred paces off. That afternoon some of the soldiers caught her and brought her to the Quartermaster. The moment the mule was delivered to him, the undersigned claimed her as their property, and received the promise that she should be restored to them. This however has not been done. As the mule has not been branded, we would respectfully petition that you would issue an order for the delivery of the mule to us.

I have the honor to inform you that I have sent with the present Squad of Colored Recruits to be mustered into the service, the (3) Three Colored men claimed respectively by Whorton, Magee and Thompson.

I have no orders that they should not be mustered in and I do therefore respectfully forward the same, and do hereby notify you of the facts, if the General commanding has decided that they should not become U. S. Soldiers then it would be best to not have them mustered in, yet if the above should be the case then we may look for stormy times, for I have not the least doubt but what in that event the whole male population of Trigg County would be down here in a very short time. It is my impression that one Colored man will make as good a Soldier as another and I can not for the life of myself see why Mr. Whorton's should be an exception, or should not.

be allowed to become a U. S. Soldier &c.  
The firing up-on Capt. Cuykendalls men by  
Citizens of Trigg County (as I have no doubt but  
what it is true) will in some future day  
come to light and show who the Guilties  
were that done it.

It is strange that Mr. Whorton should  
hang around here and at your Head Quarters  
until he hears of Guerrilla having crept  
over the Cumberland River, hardly has  
he heard or learnt this when he leaves us  
and goes right up there where the Guerrillas  
are and from whose blood thirsty hands  
no loyal or straight forward Union man  
dare hope for mercy. I wonder if he can  
explain this satisfactory to the General.

All that I can say for Mr. Whorton is, that

The condition of this country is so infected with knavellas, who are mercileply hanging loyal men for what they have left them to subsist upon - as to render it absolutely imperative that we petition you to send and station a company at this place which with the cooperation of all good loyal men will be sufficient to relieve the country of all prowling bands, and effectually break up the thorough-fare in our vicinity for crossing the Tennessee & Cumberland Rivers.

At this place, we have resisted those depredations at night, but in the day we are so weak that it would be suicidal to contend against them. We successfully resisted them on the night of the 23<sup>rd</sup> inst, although we lost one of our best men - by our mistaking him for one

of the Guerrillas. We would have been visited  
 again last night under a threat that they would  
 hang <sup>everyone</sup> <sup>before</sup> <sup>us</sup> <sup>in</sup> <sup>the</sup> <sup>place</sup> <sup>for</sup> <sup>the</sup> <sup>resistance</sup> <sup>we</sup> <sup>offered</sup> <sup>the</sup> <sup>night</sup>  
 but for the timely success of Capt  
Fitch Commandant of the Squadron, who has

Arthur Auer is also considered not exactly sound, A. J. Hamilton is entirely disloyal, and has a son who is a bushwhacker, Rufus Shephard is also not loyal, and in fact none of the Shephards are considered loyal. Shephard is Hamilton's son in law. In conclusion I would remark, that, if you should wish to write to <sup>me</sup> at any time hereafter, address to St Louis Mo, as I am about <sup>to</sup> remove to that place.

I wish you to keep what I have written  
strictly secret. I would further say to you  
that as I have sold out my property up here  
and would like to get a situation in some  
one of the military departments as Clerk or  
something of the kind, perhaps it would not be  
an intrusion to ask your influence for one
