Now comes your  
petitioner Geo M. Gill, who begs leave to  
make the following statement of facts,  
believing that you will see the justness  
of his request, & if it can be complied with  
without detriment to the Government, you will  
not hesitate in granting it.

When the war broke out Mr D C  
Daight of Boston & myself were owners  
of certain property in and about Fort Pickens,  
one part of which is a Cotton Shed and  
Steam Press situate on the west side of  
Tennessee Street immediately south of Vance.  
Said Cotton Shed having a front of about four  
hundred (400) feet on Tennessee Street, & running  
back to the Mississippi River, said River  
being the western boundary of said property.  
When the Federal Authorities built Fort  
Pickens, they took possession of this property  
in the summer of 1862 and used it as a  
Quartermaster Depot, extending the Fortifications  
to the East & North of the property, so as to  
include it within the Fort. A Battery  
of six guns was planted on the north  
directly North of the property & remained  
there until recently. This Battery being

at the extreme or northern end of the Fort  
Neither Mr Swight or myself ever took  
any steps towards recovering this property  
while it was a part & parcel of the Fort,  
feeling that the interest of the Government was  
for the time being paramount to that of private  
individuals, but now the war being over & the  
Fort having been so contracted as to leave this  
property outside of its present lines, we respectfully  
ask that it may be restored to us. The property  
is used now as an Ordnance Depot, but we  
learn from the officer in charge (Capt Price)  
that the arms & munitions are being rapidly  
transferred to other points. Directly in front  
& to the north the Breastworks remain apparent  
ly as a protection simply to this Depot  
while the works below & extending to the  
present Fort have been dismantled & torn  
down. Admitting the Government retains  
one Ordnance Depot at Memphis, we respectfully  
submit if some other place could not be found  
which would answer the purpose equally as well  
if not better than this property.

The property costs  
us considerably more than one hundred thou-  
sand dollars before the war, & inasmuch  
as we have not derived one cent of income  
from it for the last four years desire now  
to repair it in order that we may go on  
with our business as Cotton factors this fall.  
The Cotton Press is certainly of no use in  
the world to the authorities & never has been  
used by them, The Engine was taken away  
& is used in Fort Pickens we learn  
that the property is used as a

used by them, the engine was taken away  
& is used in Fort Pickens. We learn  
for the purpose of supplying water. Owing to the  
change made & the delay it will require two  
or three months labor before we can place  
it in a condition fitted for our business -  
therefore we beg that you will give the  
matter your earliest attention.

As to our loyalty I would respectfully re-  
-sented that my partner Mr. Dwight is a  
Bostonian & resides in that City, & is one  
of a family that has obtained a very creditable  
reputation as supporters of the Government. as  
to myself I can refer you to many well  
known Gentlemen of this City. Suffice it to  
say, I have never had anything to do directly  
or indirectly with the rebellion & have  
never had my loyalty questioned.



General

I have the honor, in obedience to instructions <sup>to report</sup> that I proceeded yesterday to Elon, 1<sup>st</sup> Magisterial Dist. Amherst County, and upon investigation ascertained, that a meeting of a number of citizens was held in the church at Elon on the 31<sup>st</sup> day of May 1865, for the purpose of fixing wages, establishing rules and regulations for the government of freedmen and passing resolutions (a copy of which is herewith forwarded) expressive of the sense of the meeting.

The following is a list of citizens attending the meeting and who have taken the oath of allegiance, by whom, and the date it was administered, number of acres of tillable land owned by each, with the number of blacks on plantation of each. James F. Rendleton was Chairman and William B. Robinsons secretary of this meeting.

We the undersigned loyal citizens of this County would respectfully beg leave to represent to you the condition & ask your assistance in behalf of our County.

We are living here in the vicinity of an extensive range of mountains that makes a splendid lurking place & affords protection to rebel guerrillas who are poisoning & ruining our Country. A considerable number of them is already known to have taken refuge in these mountains & it is confidently believed from hostile demonstrations made by them that if they are not hunted down they will during the present season depopulate this County of its loyal citizens.

We trust therefore of the danger that threatens us we would respectfully solicit you to send a body of soldiers to our assistance. We have learned that the Fifth Regt. Co. infantry would be willing to come to our County if they can be spared from other duty will you not send them, or if not the whole Regt. as many as can be spared.

There has been a body of Cavalry located  
for some time at our County seat  
but they appear to feel no interest  
in our County & consequently demand  
it no protection.

There have already been three mur-  
ders committed here since the suc-  
cession of this army. Murders of  
the most atrocious character & we  
feel sure from present demonstration  
that if there is not something done  
to prevent it they will be repeated.

Hoping that our request will  
meet with a favorable consideration  
& with the utmost confidence in your  
ability & intentions to do right, we

I Coleman Cox, now confined in Second Street Prison Louisville Ky, have just heard read a letter dated at "Bowling Green Ky June 27<sup>th</sup> 1863," signed by one "A A Shile," - with whom I am not acquainted - and addressed to "Col. M. A. Coyle" - in which it is stated that "Watts & Barkley" were employed to attend to the business of James Jones, my Brother, Burnell J. Cox and myself, and that I paid them ~~\$10~~  $\$10 \frac{00}{100}$ , which they received to "release" me, and that Jones and my Brother made up  $\$250 \frac{00}{100}$ . That Jones and my Brother have been released and that they Barkley & Watts say they cannot do anything for me for less than  $\$500 \frac{00}{100}$ , and that it is "attempted or suggested, that my



Mother (Mrs Sarah Cox) sell her land and appropriate it for my release."

The said letter has been read in my hearing twice, and I fully understand its contents. —

Mrs Barkley and Watts moreover of them, ever agreed to procure the release of either Mr James Jones my Brother or myself but the distinct agreement between us and them was, that they would act as our Counsel and use all legal and honorable means as such, and if it could not be shown that we were not guilty by affidavits to defend us when tried by Military Commission. —

We each agreed to pay Mrs Barkley & Watts, the sum of two

hundred dollars for which we executed  
our notes. - My Brother and myself  
have paid them Eighty Eight Dollars  
on our notes. - Mr Jones had  
paid them up to the time of  
his leaving the Prison the sum  
of fifty dollars. - Neither

We have the honor to state in reply to the letter of H. H. Skiles of Bowling Green Ky. addressed to you under date of June 27<sup>th</sup> 1865, and which you referred to us this evening, that every statement contained in said letter, where or there is the slightest imputation, charging either unprofessional or dishonorable conduct against us, is false in toto. It is true that we were employed to act as <sup>counsel</sup> for Mr. James Jones, Perrill J., and Coleman Cox, and to defend them either by ex parte affidavits, or before the Military Commission, but only so far as the sheer 'development of facts' would require. We never agreed unconditionally to procure their release, or that of any other person. Each of the above named individuals agreed to pay us for our services the sum of of two hundred dollars for which they executed their notes. Mr. Jones paid us fifty dollars upon his note, the Coxes each paid us one hundred dollars, but we afterwards paid to each of them twenty dollars, making the sum of their payments eighty eight dollars each. We have never either individually or as a firm, asked them or any of them to advance us any more money, nor have since the release of Jones, and Perrill J. Cox or before that time after the making of their notes, ever mentioned the sum of five hundred dollars, or any other sum to Coleman Cox or any other person as being required before we could

do anything for him; nor have we ever suggested to Coleman Cox, or any other person that Mrs Sarah Cox should dispose of her farm, or any part of same to pay our fees; nor have we ever used any expression directly or indirectly, by which any person could conclude that we desired anything of the kind. Every paragraph in said letters so far as they point to any action on our part, except the mere employment of us as attorneys, by Mr. Jones and the two Coxes is untrue, and the fact that we do not know A. H. Skiles, and that we never heard of him before induces us to hazard the expression that they are either very recklessly, or intentionally false.

We have learned since receiving the letter above referred to that Skiles is a lawyer, or professes to be one, at Bowling Green Ky, and that he has had some Military practice, and was at Louisville some time ago connected with a matter that had some bearing upon Mr. Jones' case, and we have no doubt that he has purposed to write the letter in question; and has made use of the scurrilous expressions in the letter in reference to us, with a view to giving plausibility to his request that Coleman Cox be released under the "orcent" (or cent) order, without the "interference" (interference) of "Attorneys" (Attorneys) whose fees can only be paid by "braking up the old lady". We know nothing however of the motives of Skiles, nor do we care what they were, but we do know that the writing of the letter referred to, was uncalled for, and ungentlemanly, inasmuch as it is an endeavor to cast upon us a

dishonorable imputation founded upon  
falsehood. We have this day addressed a copy  
of this letter to Skiles. Enclosed herewith be  
pleased to find a statement in regard to  
the affair by Coleman Cox.

This class of cases are  
common throughout this Dist.  
and will require a Genl order  
covering the entire ground, in or-  
der to correct it. Many of the  
Planters are disposed to act  
generously toward their former  
slaves, but there are a num-  
ber of selfish and impru-  
dent men, who will send

off the helpless, and it cannot be prevented. The Negroes come with the complaint that they have been driven away, and the Planters meet it with the counter complaint that they will not work. It is impossible to investigate these cases. In order to obviate all difficulty, I would allow the former owners to send away as many as they desire, collect them in Poor Houses in the Counties, and levy a tax on the property to support them; this will show them more speedily than any other <sup>plan</sup> who will have to support the "paupers."

I am afraid there will be much destitution and suffering during the coming winter unless some immediate steps be taken to prevent it, and I can see no other way than at once to establish poor houses, at the expense of the counties. (over)

I am satisfied that unless the United States forces occupy the country, until some state laws are enacted for the protection of the freedmen, that they cannot obtain justice, and there will be a collision of the races.

Every thing is quiet but it entirely occasioned by the presence of the military forces.

It is a relief, (as in this instance) for the planters, to get rid of the black people, and unless some law or order, is promulgated, to regulate the labor and compel families to get together in order that the husband & father may be made responsible for the support of his family, I can see nothing but confusion.

Some provision must also be made for the wives and children of able-bodied men who left during the war, and who are now engaged in distant parts of the state, or have left it altogether.

North Royal Street, in the City of Alexandria, Va. are held and firmly bound to the United States of America, in the sum of one thousand dollars, lawful money of the United States of America, for which payment well and truly to be made, we bind ourselves, our heirs, executors, administrators and assigns, jointly and severally firmly by these presents.

Sealed with our seals, at the City of Alexandria, Va, this day of June in the year 1865.

Whereas by a Notice, bearing date, "Headquarters Military Governor, Alexandria, Va. June 14<sup>th</sup> 1864" issued by command of J. P. Slough, Military Governor, permission is granted to the above named Philipp L. Schrifftgiesser in common with other loyal and respectable citizens, to sell and dispose of Malt Liquors to civilians, under such regulations as may be from time to time established, and whereas, Military Orders are now in existence, prohibiting the sale or gift of Malt or Spirituous Liquors to any person whatsoever, and whereas it is the intent and meaning of said first named order, that nothing therein contained shall be so construed as to effect such prohibition, except so far as it relates to the sale of Malt Liquors to civilians.

Therefore the condition of the above obligation is such that if the above named Philipp L. Schrifftgiesser shall well and faithfully obey the provisions of said order, and the rules established for the regulations of such traffic. Then the above obligation to be null and void, otherwise to remain in full force and effect.

only as a conquered people - never to become citizens.  
I am also credibly informed by citizens -  
neighbors of his - that he makes a money statement  
when he departs "The estate consisted exclusively  
of slaves" as it not long ago owned a large and  
rich plantation - which he (D. Break) purchased  
for a trifling sum and still retains possession  
of.

I send forward the enclosed note and this report  
only as matters of record. I have not spoken to  
him - or others - about him - and shall not molest  
him - unless instructed so to do. For I think he  
is injuring himself - more than the Government - in  
this community.

It gives me pleasure to apply to you in behalf of the Prot. Episcopal Church of Va., for possession of Grace Church, now used by the Government as a hospital for colored troops.

We wish to occupy the Church for religious worship, and to use all the form of service contained in the Episcopal Prayer Book.

The Church was organized in 1857, for the use of the poor in that quarter of the town. The congregation has no means to repair it.

As I have no doubt you will cheerfully comply with our request, permit me to ask of you to recommend the payment of rent, sufficient to put it in thorough order, as it will



require a considerable outlay of  
money to re-install it.

The building was new when  
occupied by the troops.

Respectfully returned - In compliance with within a Squadron of 13. U.S. Cav. Capt. Walters was sent to Barkers Cross roads. They brought in between one and two hundred arms, principally Carabines, found on the Marshal Farm. The party guilty of concealing them could not be found.

It is reported that the colored men in question had their horses taken away by one party, and their Pistols by another. The Pistols were regained, and are in possession of Provost Marshal at this place. The horses were taken to Oleans and could not be found.

It is claimed that the colored men were arrested and disarmed by the inhabitants on account of misbehavior.

and for the purpose of sending  
them to Winchester for trial  
before a magistrate. They were,  
however, released with their  
possession, which were afterwards  
retrieved. Capt. Statch did not  
deem it best to bring in  
the parties who arrested and  
disarmed the colored men &

I have the honor to submit the following Report.

In pursuance with enclosed Instructions I arrived at Barbers Cross Roads on the 16<sup>th</sup> June. From thence I marched to Lawyer James Marshall's farm and discovered a quantity of Stores concealed in the woods. <sup>(See Serial 10022007)</sup> Mr. John C. Hackley, the overseer on the place, makes the following Statement regarding them.

That they were bought up through Leiston C<sup>o</sup> by Mr. Nottingham, a wholesale agent, who lives 6 miles beyond the Marshall estate. They were hauled by Benj. Triplett of Marbleham to their place of concealment, and Mr. Hackley was asked to haul them to Southampton, but refused.

Mr. Marshall only visits the place occasionally, and

was not at home.

The following are the facts in case of Negroes  
mentioned in Proclamations

That they remained Sat. night June 3<sup>d</sup> at Larver's Marshall's  
Negro cabins. - Sunday morning they started for Markham. Sunday  
night they returned to the Marshall place. On their way they stopped  
at Waters Store at the Cross Roads and while drinking were arrested  
by a party of young men from Markham.

They were taken back to the town and within a few minutes  
were released with their horses, and without their Pistols. - The  
Negroes remained at Larver's Marshall's Sunday night & Monday.  
Their horses were stolen Monday night from the Marshall place  
by a party of 3 men who took supper in the Negro cabins.  
They called each other by name, and the Negroes in the place  
gave their names as follows.

— George Tompkinson (probably Robert Tompkinson)  
(son of Levy Tompkinson near Riley's farm.)

— Riley a paroled Soldier, living at Tolly Taynes near the  
Marshall place.

A man they called Markes I could not find who he was. —  
I learned that the horses were then taken to Orleans. — None of  
those men could be found. I reported their names to the Officer  
at Wesleyville.

I examined Mr. George Strother (about 60 years of age) whose statement  
as below was substantiated by that of several citizens.

That Cravers mother lives at his house and he (Craver)  
was formerly one of his negroes, and always bore a quarrelsome  
character. — That on Sunday he has been drinking and was  
so incontinent that he ordered him off his premises.

Shortly after the negroes left a party of young men armed  
with pistols, those named in the Proclamations except Stribling  
& Figgins, pursued them for the purpose of arresting & sending  
them to a magistrate at Winchester, but after their arrival  
at Markham, by the advice of the elder Mr. Strother they  
were released. — Their pistols were delivered up to me & are in  
custody of Prov. Mars. at Fairfax C. H. — The young men  
could not be found. — I am satisfied that the negroes misbehaved  
at Markham. —

Enclosed I send a Statement from Abner Strother.

The murder of the 2 Guins near Alv, of Regt of the  
13<sup>th</sup> N.Y. Vols. Co. - and a Storekeeper at Wagonville - were all commit-  
ted by a Gang of 4 men: Nick Carter - Bill Lake - De Batts  
& Charles Mc Dorough. The latter was shot dead by the  
advance Guard under E. Grant at the entrance to Middleburgh.  
Carter & Lake were pursued but we were unable to catch them.

The citizens complain bitterly of this gang of desperate characters.

All is quiet otherwise except the Horse thieves. A number  
of U.S. Horses were taken by me after passing Thoroughfare Gap  
to replace those which were lame & unable to travel - also  
Saddles etc, which were turned over to Troop Marsh.

A large number of U.S. Hrs. Equipments are in the possession  
of citizens & Troop Soldiers



At 7 O'clock on the evening of the 31<sup>st</sup> ultimo, in  
compliance with the above mentioned instructions I  
(with two new men under my command) embarked on board a  
steamer at 6<sup>th</sup> St. Wharf, and proceeded down the Potomac  
ac to Bluff Pt. at which place I landed with my com-  
mand (dismounted) about 4 O'clock on the morning of  
the 1<sup>st</sup> Inst. and arrested Austin Butcher the man char-  
ged with complicity in the murder of Maria A. Cook  
and also the following named witnesses viz: Uncle  
Spencer, Mathew, Aunt Maria, "Gudman Butcher" negro  
living on the plantation at that place about 3 O'clock  
P.M. I returned with the prisoners and placed them  
on board the Steamer. There being no wharf at Bluff  
Pt. I was compelled to secure the services of a small  
Flat Boat at Mattows Creek at a cost of \$5.00, which  
amount was paid by the Captain of the Steamer, for the

purpose of landing the horses. About 8 P.M. all the horses were landed. I then proceeded to West Mountain Court House a distance of (18) eighteen miles from <sup>where</sup> the Steamway, arriving there about 9 O'clock the same evening.

About 6 O'clock next morning (Jan 1<sup>st</sup>) I left the C.H. & proceeded to the house of one Jesse Louie, which is about (10) ten miles from the C.H. for the purpose of arresting said Louie, the man charged with being the leader of a Band of Guerrillas or Robbers, on arriving at the house of said Louie I was informed that he had gone to a place called the "High" and that he would not return for two or three days. After about two hours marching I arrived at the High and at which place I succeeded in finding him. I immediately placed him in arrest and returned with him to the Steamway, thus laying off (off) 3 P.M. arriving there at 1 O'clock P.M. Jan 3<sup>rd</sup>.

Having complied with my instructions, I endeavored to re-embark with my command, but finding it impossible to get the horses on board the steamer I decided to proceed over land to Bell's Plain landing at which place I directed the captain of the Steamer to meet me. Near King George's C.H. and on my route to Bell's Plain, I stopped at the house of Mr. John

King Henry Mr. Carusio who had accompanied me  
from Washington. Discovered a horse which he claim-  
ed to be the property of Warren S. Watson (the murdered  
man) after assuring myself that <sup>the</sup> property was Warren  
S. Watsons. I allowed Mr. Carusio to take the horse  
and return it to Mrs. E. P. Carusio, the daughter of  
the murdered man. Watson. I arrived at Belle  
Plaw Landing about 1 O'clock P.M. Jan 4<sup>th</sup> &  
immediately embarked and proceeded up the  
Potomac, arriving in Washington D.C. about 5 O'clock

reported the case to Capt. W. F.  
Chamberlain, who gave me  
protection, on the 19<sup>th</sup> August  
1864. which has been respected  
by all the Military till on  
Yesterday some of Maj. Barnes  
men, who are now stationed  
at Morristown, told I went  
down, and tried to get it

back, but they would not  
give it up, I wrote to Capt  
Chamberlain on the subject  
to day, the Mule was badly  
broke down, and yet has a  
very bad hoof. I appeal to  
you to know if the loyal men  
of E. Tennessee are to have  
no stoves left to make bread,

I have lost greatly in acci-

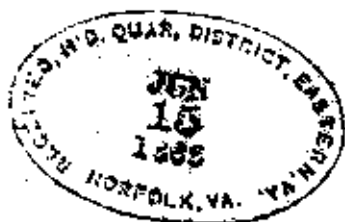

Pool & Leo, he desired me to turn over the money to him, or at least, the sum of \$350. Mr. Butler had also notified me that the money should be turned over to C. C. Pool & Leo, consisting of C. C. Pool and H. Shebell. At this interview Mr. Pool acknowledged Mr. Walker to be his council, but said he had other counsel, and soon returned with a bond drawn up by Judge Webster

I held the office of "Produce Loan Agent" of the so called Confederate States, for the State of Florida, by appointment of C Gillemming, late Secretary of the Treasury of the so called Confederate States. I was appointed to this office without any application from myself & without any knowledge, until the reception of my Commission by mail. That being within the conscript age, I accepted said office only to escape bearing arms against the United States.

I am now and have ever been opposed to the Secession of the Southern States from the Union, and did what I could to prevent said act in Florida. The Secession act not being referred back to the people for their approval or disapproval, I had no opportunity of voting against a measure which I abhorred.

I have been permitted to take the Oath of Allegiance to the United States & I hereby promise to take the prescribed Amnesty Oath, and to conform willingly & cheerfully to the Constitution & Laws, as a true & loyal Citizen of the United States.

The undersigned was a captain of artillery in the service of the pretended Confederate States until the Spring of 1864 when he resigned. Testimony of Daniel A. Howard, a witness produced sworn and examined in the above entitled case. Says: That on the fourteenth day of June 1863 he accompanied Mrs. Kendall across the St. Johns River, to the Residence of her husband (the above defendant). Upon their arrival they passed through the yard and proceeded to the garden. Upon approaching the garden they found the above Defendant at the gate, with a drawn knife in his hands, he ordered them to stay back and not to enter the garden, that he would cut out her heart or that of any body else that attempted to enter the garden. Mr. Scott who was present said to him that he ought <sup>not</sup> to use such language, but that he ought to go to the provost Marshal if he wished to keep people out of the premises, he the Defendant replied to Mr. Scott that he did not care for the provost Marshal or anyone else, that he would use his own judgment about keeping people out of his premises & that he did not allow thieves and blood suckers to come upon his premises,

Notwithstanding his threats Mrs Hudsonall  
entered the garden, and collected such  
vegetables she desired, though ~~retrospected~~  
~~and go into the garden at that time.~~

Soon after entering the garden  
at Mrs Hudsonalls request witnesses went  
to look after the colored persons who were  
digging potatoes, on his way he met with  
the Defendant who said he did not want  
Mrs Hudsonall to come there again. That she  
was a damned old niggerly bitch, that  
he had planted the potatoes and vegetables  
and that anyone that come there and  
took them as he did was no better  
than thieves and bloodsuckers.

When we were about  
leaving the defendant one of our party  
said to the defendant that if he  
wished to keep Mrs Hudsonall away  
from the premises he ought to go over  
to town and get authority from the  
General to do so, he replied, that he



The petition of Manuel Hernandez a citizen of Pensacola respectfully shows that he has taken the Oath of Amnesty as required by the Presidents Proclamation of the eighth of December 1863 and has ever since kept the same inviolate.

That sometime before the Federal Army took possession of Pensacola in 1862 your petitioner withdrew with a large and helpless family, to a place of greater security about twenty four miles from Pensacola, leaving in the care of his father Manuel Hernandez and of his brother Joseph Hernandez, a Steam Saw Mill in said city.

That in the later part of December 1862, the Military Commander of the United States forces in Pensacola required the said Agents of your petitioner to turn over to him the Machinery of said Saw Mill stipulating with said Agents, the payment of Fifty Dollars per month for the

same.

That said Mill was immediately put in operation under the authority of Capt Porter Quarter-Master of the Post, and continued to run until March 1863, when the Army evacuated Pensacola, and withdrew to the Barrancas taking the Mill along with them: and your petitioner understands that the same has been used ever since for Government purposes.

Wherefore your petitioner having received nothing ~~that the said mill may be restored & delivered to him for that~~ for the use of said Mill, prays that compensation ~~may~~ be made him according to the terms agreed on, and in accordance with said Proclamation of the President and your petitioner will ever pray &c

Joseph Hernandez being sworn and having read the foregoing petition, says the facts set forth in said petition are substantially true. That in December 1862 upon the requirement of an Engineer then in the employ of the Army, whose name this affiant does not remember, he delivered up the smaller Machinery of said Saw Mill under a verbal contract made by said Engineer to pay Fifty Dollars a month for

the use of said Mill. At first this affiant re-  
fused to deliver up said Machinery, but on being  
called before General Dow and told by him that  
the Engineer had authority in the matter, this  
affiant surrendered the Machinery to said Engineer.  
That the Mill was put in order and sawed  
large quantities of lumber, some of which remain-  
ed at the Mill after the evacuation of Pensacola, and  
was taken away in a Government Steamer a day or  
two after said evacuation. That at the evacuation,  
said Mill was taken away; and that no compensa-  
tion has been received for the use of the same.

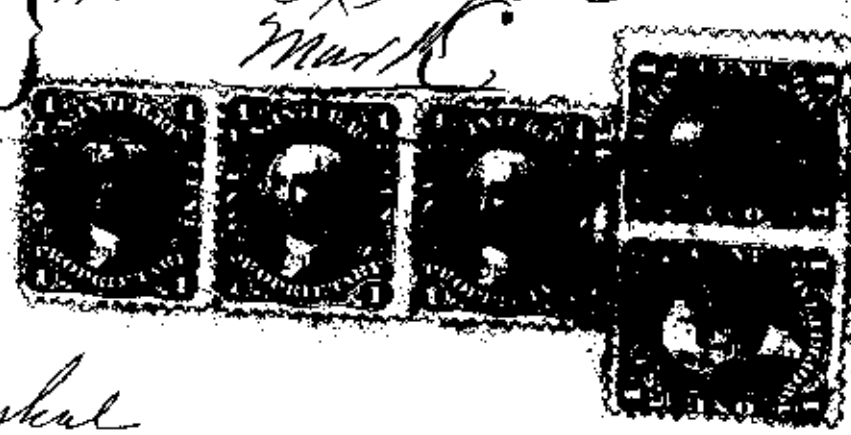

I would make the following report in reply to the matter referred to me for investigation.

The Lieut. Says he "found the children were starving for the want of the commonest necessaries of life." The families the Lieut refers to "where the children were lying" and have since died, were drawing rations. They did not draw the last two days because they did not send for them. The children did not die for the want of such subsistence as I issue to them in accordance with General Order No 30 dated Washington January 20<sup>th</sup> 1864 A. S. O. which order defines the ration of Refugees.

Mr. Water Agent American Union Commission offered to take the children of the two families spoken of (Mrs Libson & Mrs Moore) to the -

Hospital he has established and give the ladies employment in the Hospital, but they would not go. So if they blame any one it must be themselves. for they could have got their regular rations by going to the commissary or by going with Mr Waters could have got all the necessaries of life and even the delicacies and had their children well treated.

"As to deaths being produced for the want of food," I would say I believe some have died or death been caused for the want of suitable food for sick persons. But where am I to get this food? I cannot get it from the commissary.

The Suit says "It seems that the officer of Dub who has been issuing rations to these people has seen fit to stop them while to others who are able to earn a living rations are regular issued every two days."

In reply to this statement I will say it is untrue.

The police of the camp is not first rate but much improved from some time ago. It is impossible to keep the camp clean like soldiers

Lieut Suss "Salt - Pork & Beef coarse Corn Meal (yellow) is not proper food for sick women and children." I have to issue that or nothing.

I go out to the Camp every tenth day and take the names of all who cannot live without rations. Mrs Gibson and family (including Mrs Moore) was one whose name was taken on the tenth of the month for issue to as my Mess Book will show and list posted at the commissary but she did not come or send for them. I was there last evening and took all the names who in my opinion could not live without rations for the next ten days.

I would respectfully request that the guards on the Randolph Road be instructed to visit the Camp of Refugees about 3 times during the day and as often after night and arrest all soldiers in Camp without a pass. This will save men as the guards can as well do it as not.

The undersigned respectfully represent to you that they are residents of the City of Columbus Ohio, engaged in the business of Brewing Lager Beer and Ale, that they severally have very large amounts of Capital invested in said business, and that they have very large stocks of Ale and Beer on hand Manufactured and ready for sale, and that by the printed Order hereto attached, as construed by the Military Authorities at this point, they are substantially prohibited from disposing of said Stock to their customers.

If this order is to be continued for any length of time, the loss to us cannot be otherwise, than terribly severe, of this perhaps we ought not to complain, and we would not complain, if the public good, or the preservation of good

order in our community required it.

But we believe that we may be permitted, in entire harmony with the public good, and the preservation of public order, to continue our business in its usual and customary manner.

We are informed that in the Cities of Cleveland and Cincinnati, where large numbers of troops are being mustered out, no such restrictions are imposed, upon those similarly engaged in business with ourselves.

We are not engaged in the retail of beer and ale, and do not propose of course to make sale thereof to Soldiers, but only to the Citizens of Columbus and its vicinity.

In the course of our business, it has been our custom in wagons to deliver our beer and ale to our customers, through the City of Columbus, as the order aforesaid is construed thus we are now prohibited from doing.

We therefore respectfully ask such modification

of said order, as will permit us to continue our business, in its regular way, unless in your judgment the public good, and safety requires another course to be pursued.

Kaskville June 20<sup>th</sup> 1865

Major Genl Geo St. Thomas,  
I arrived in the City  
yesterday evening, from Franklin Tennessee;  
just before leaving, I learned from a Mr  
Carl that A. S. Norman, living formerly  
about seven or eight Miles South West of  
Franklin, was shot down in his field while  
at work, & after he felt one or two more shots  
were fired at him, he was killed dead.  
This horrid act was perpetrated by a Squad  
of five or six Men dressed in Federal uniforms  
Mr Carl told me he did not know any of  
the party but they told him to bring the man  
down, and further said something about  
rewards. Norman had acted as a guide  
for scouting parties from our Post, and I  
understand from rumors that the Guerrillas  
infesting Hickman and Wilkinson Counties  
had known that they would kill him.  
I have no doubt that he was killed by a  
party of these Murderers;

One day last week I learned that another  
Man by the name of Saml Baker who also  
had acted as a guide for scouting parties  
from our Post & who was living at his fathers

in Hickman County was now away from his  
home by a party of Eight Guerrillas and is now  
or was a day or two ago in the town of  
Columbia Tenn. He also was threatened to be killed.

Now Genl if you should want a guide  
for any troops, you may conclude to send into  
Hickman or Williamson I can most confidently  
recommend Baker as a worthy Brave and cautious  
young man, and a true friend of the Union.

In reference to my status & who I am I  
respectfully refer you to Genl Brantley, A. D. S.  
Ludley, Saml J. Carter, Col R. D. Bell, Judge  
M. M. Brien or Horace Harrison.

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
Statement of William C. Chancellor

My name is William C. Chancellor  
I reside in Franklin Howard Co  
Mo. I am 40 years of age. I have lived  
in Howard Co Mo for 10 years. I have a  
wife and four children. I own a farm  
of 150 acres. I own four horses & cows  
& was taken away from home about the  
12 or 13 of Oct 1864 by 9 or 10 armed men  
and who claimed to be Confederate  
soldiers. They took me to Arrow Rock, Mo  
They also took from my home Andrew &  
Blanchard. Joseph Chancellor my brother  
was with them having been taken some time  
since from my home. The Confederate soldiers  
had their men concealed when they came  
to my home. They took Blanchard &  
myself along making five captives. They  
gathered up some 8 or 10 more before  
they got to Arrow Rock. I think there  
was between 20 & 30 in all. Concealed when  
when we got to Arrow Rock. I had my own  
horse and my own revolver. I was assigned to  
Capt Cooper's Co Col Douglas R. Tyler's  
Brigade. Since I joined I was with the army  
in many fights until we crossed the Arkansas  
River. The first engagement was at Lexington  
and the next engagement was at Independence

The Command was broken up some &  
was again formed all over the Big Blue and  
was now back across the Big Blue. The  
Army was in motion many all the time  
and in a running fight many all the  
time until we crossed the Arkansas River  
I was taken the 12 or 13 of Oct. 1864 and did  
not leave until the 8<sup>th</sup> of Nov. 1864. The army  
was camped when we left. The same <sup>to</sup> go, <sup>to</sup> go,  
George C. Cox, Aramus & Blauden Baker,  
Joseph Chancellor, Thos J. Whittier, James  
Brown, James Maishel, Horace Mann, Taylor  
Kingsbury, John Watts, William B. Clark,  
Thomas Watts, James Hall, Newton, Lacey,  
Morris Brown, Newton Watts, Leonard  
Watts, Walter Watts, John Hudson, George  
Forsyth, all left with me, or on the same  
morning. I rode my own horse away from  
camp. The same one I rode from Home to  
my own Revolver, which I gave up at Fort  
Smith. Aramus & Blauden Baker, rode his  
own horse to Fort Smith. Joseph Chancellor  
my brother rode his own horse but had  
him stolen while in the Army & got another  
which he left at Fort Smith. We all got  
down in Horace Co Mo on Christmas day  
I enrolled in 1862 as a Loyed man I know  
now any duty in the militia. I belonged to

Capt Johnson Es. Called. Saw. Saw. Justice  
I did not enroll or pay Commutation Tax  
in 1863. I never drew any money or served in  
any army. I have always been a Southern  
Sympathizer and, now was called a Union  
man. I wish to be treated as a Conscript  
I know that if I am exchanged as a  
Prisoner of war I will be treated as a deserter  
and shot. I understand in pieces that  
they shot all deserters that they afterwards got  
back. The Commanding Officer at Fort  
Smith ordered me to report to the Provost  
Marshal at Springfield Mo. The Provost Marshal  
at Springfield ordered us to report to the  
Provost Marshal at Mexico Mo.

## Statement of Theodore H Ford

My name is Theodore H Ford I am 23  
years old a Blacksmith and reside in Franklin  
Howard Co Mo. I was conscripted on the  
11<sup>th</sup> day of October 1864 and sworn into the  
Confederate service by a Commissioned  
Officer. For three years or during the war  
and the next morning morning I was turned  
over to Col Douglas. I stayed in Franklin  
two days. My mother resides in Franklin  
and I was allowed to stay at home and  
down so until the 13<sup>th</sup> when Col Douglas  
started for Arrow Rock. I think there was  
about two thousands in all, about 100 of  
the party claiming to be conscripted. We  
all mounted. I took my own horse from  
home. I did not take any arms with me.  
Between Arrow Rock & Boonville we  
joined Price's main army and proceeded  
to Marshall & from there to Lexington.  
There had an engagement and left there &  
proceeded to Little Blue fighting from there  
to Independence. We were driven from  
Independence to Big Blue where we fought  
and were driven to Westport. We were driven from  
there across the Big Blue Southward and  
kept marching & fighting until we got to  
Manly, Mo. and there had a general battle

Major Andrew Cabel with about a 1000 men  
were captured. That night we crossed the  
Cape & were again routed the next day  
& stayed with the army until we crossed  
the Arkansas River and then decanted into  
some 25 or 30 others and reported by the  
Pass of different Officers to the Office.  
I was born & raised in Howard Co. Mo. I  
first enrolled in the fall of 1862 in Co.  
Edwards Co. of Paw Paw Militia. In 1863 I was  
assigned to any duty. I claim that I have  
always been a Loyal Man. I Enrolled in  
the Spring of 1863 and paid my Commutation  
tax & done no duty nor paid any Com-  
mutation tax in 1864. I refer to John G. Mc-  
Cauley, John House - Robt McFarver &  
his brother James - Henry McHenry. They  
are all known to be Loyal Men. I wish  
to be treated as a Conscript. and do not  
want to be exchanged as a prisoner of War.  
I did not see any chance of escaping until  
we got to Arkansas on the 8<sup>th</sup> of Nov. I did not  
try to escape until then. While I was at home

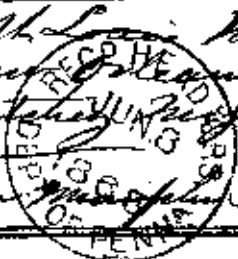

Sir

Allow me to submit to your consideration the following statement, with the request that you will give it consideration, and take such steps in the matter as you may deem best.

The night before the surrender of this city Mr. J. W. Davis who rented by the month a small brick tenement of mine situated on the north side of Canal between Second and Third streets, ran off, leaving an old colored man named Jacob Suerdy and Mary Ann his wife in possession, or charge of the lower portion of said premises. Soon thereafter an individual by the name of Morton Mc Nally, together with his daughter and her husband finding the upper portion of the premises unoccupied, moved in without my knowledge or consent, and have continued there since that time, paying no rent and persistently refusing to remove. About the 3<sup>d</sup> of May last I applied to Major Miller the Provost Marshall to have the tenants removed from the premises. He promised me it should be done, and as I understood gave them notice to that effect. I afterwards called on Major Miller who reassured me that they should be removed; but there they continue still.

Major Miller having heard about the time of my first application to him a Night Carousal going on in the upper part

= of the tenement occupied by Mrs Catherine Dumnoant  
and her sons at the corner of Canal and Second streets, which  
house also belonged to me, informed me that he should give  
the tenants of that house notice to remove. I requested that  
he would do so, as I wanted the tenants in the upper part re-  
=moved, he accordingly as I understood gave them notice to  
quit. A portion of said tenants consisting of B. Dumnoant  
and family have since left, leaving his mother and brother  
still occupying the upper portion of the premises, they refusing  
to remove therefrom. I would here state that Mrs Catherine  
Dumnoant rents the house by the month and has paid  
no rent since the first of April, that she is in my opinion  
far from being a desirable tenant, has no visible occupation  
and that her sole dependance if I am correctly informed  
is upon the subtenants to pay the rent, and she has ac-  
=cording to written agreement no right to sub let the premises  
nor any portion thereof. I would in conclusion state that  
in consequence of Major Millers action in the matter I  
took no steps towards giving the parties the customary leg-  
=al notice to remove, and therefore cannot at this time  
carry the cases before the Court of Conciliation, but <sup>would</sup> place  
the subject in your hands for adjudication

name was Harris that was killed. She  
says her name is Harris and his husband  
is in Iowa, it is possible I am mis taken  
in thinking she is Harris widow.

The talk is that the house has been a  
resort for Bushwackers since they came  
here although I can find no one who will  
or give any positive information. The woman  
Betty Bivins to Mrs Harris say that there  
has been but four men stop over night  
in the house since they have been here  
one man told me the neighbors were surp  
ris to have the moved from there.

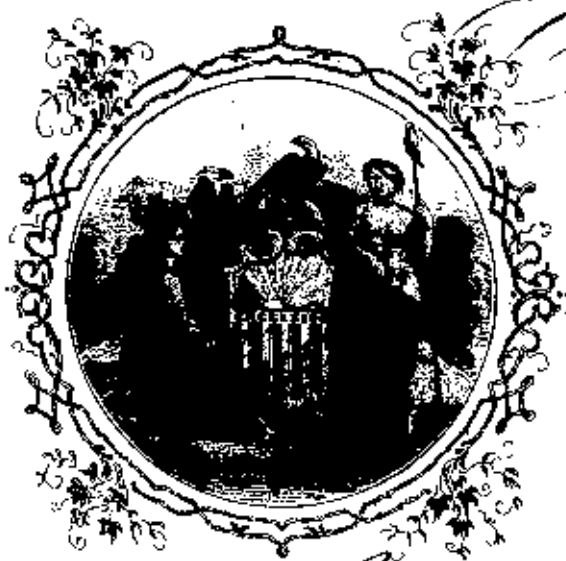

I am acquainted with W<sup>m</sup> West and  
have been all my life.—

I knew nothing about the  
case until called on to act as constable to

me that his mule had been taken on the

Reynolds told Dan Adams that he

## David Adams Sworn

David Adams (Colored) Examined.

I was the slave of Ben Adams. I left him in Apr 1865. And went to Theo. Wetty's & hired to him.

I had worked there about 4 weeks. Ben Adams then denounced my services.

After a while Ben Adams again asked me if I was not going to return. He then said that if I did not come home the boys would kill me, meaning his son's Tom and Inke. A Gilby. Ben also threatened me himself that he would shoot me.

On or about the 17<sup>th</sup> June 1865. Ben again threatened to shoot me. It was about 5 weeks since I took Bill West's mule to go to Boulder. to get out of the way of them.

Went about 3 miles. I then turned the mule loose & drove him back & returned to Mr Wetty's again myself and went to

Nov. 16. On or about the 17<sup>th</sup> Inst;  
Ben Adams swore he would come to kill  
me that night. Thom. Adams & John A. Gilby  
were there and had pistols which they cocked.

Thom Adams & Gilby both threatened that  
they would shoot me if I did not get  
away from there. I then went to Mr Meltry's  
was not present when Mr Meltry's house  
was burned.

Ben Adams was in the rebel  
army some time ago. Thom & Gilby  
have been out of the Rebel army some  
three months.

Adams. Dixon. Ben Adams  
Geo. Outtan & John Thompson are still  
working their negroes as slaves. Threatening  
them that if they leave the Guerrillas  
will kill them.

Thomas Adams & John C. Gibby  
robbed a man by the name of Conricle  
who was buying produce for the U.S.  
Gov. They took from him Sixty Dollars  
in Greenbacks & took off his Boots &  
his oxides & some passes. A man by  
the name of Bill Roy was with them  
and threatened to kill him.

I know that Thos. Adams  
& John Gibby were Guerrilleros then.

There was no camp of rebels near. The party consisted of 300 or 400.

I did not know that Dan Adams stole my mule. I got him two days after he was missing. He was found on the Bottoms grazing. He was not injured.

I live about 5 Miles from Hopkinsville, South, in Kentucky. I was at Mr Thomas in Tennessee when my mule was taken. I got my mule on the 4<sup>th</sup> of May and returned to Ky. On the 27<sup>th</sup> June I returned to Tenn & had Dan Adams arrested for stealing the mule.

Treasury to the credit of the United States, by Lieut R. N. Hargrave, 14<sup>th</sup> U. S. Infantry, being moneys collected by him from passengers of vessels from foreign countries not provided with passports, each passenger having paid ten dollars as a penalty for his violation of the President's order requiring passports from persons coming into the United States from foreign countries, in pursuance of instructions of the Hon. Secretary of War, to Brig. Genl. L. C. Scout Landry, U. S. Troops, New York City & Harbor, in similar cases.

This certificate was turned over to me April 5<sup>th</sup> 1865.

The names of said passengers will be found in the appended abstract named "A."

I have the honor to state further, that, on April 8<sup>th</sup> 1865, forty five dollars (\$45<sup>00</sup>) were turned over and on April 14<sup>th</sup> 1865, five dollars (\$5<sup>00</sup>) were turned over to me by Lieut James S. McVey, 3<sup>rd</sup> N. Y. City, 150<sup>th</sup> St. 14<sup>th</sup> being the amount collected by him of passengers of vessels from foreign countries, who were without passports or passport fees under the instructions of the Hon. Secretary of State.

This money, fifty dollars (\$50<sup>00</sup>) was deposited by me in the U. S.

Treasury, New York, to the credit of the United States, and is included in the accompanying certificate of deposit.

The names of the last mentioned passengers will be found in the appended abstract marked - 'B'.

Thomas Kinley (Coib) and Lady sworn says:  
I generally go out to Kent District  
Head Quarters (Gen. Dis.) every day with Ben and  
Iverson, 30. or (Cold) boy Frank Real for keep. on  
last Saturday on our return trip coming up to the  
house of Thomas Jarvis near Clouds Mills, the son  
of Mr Jarvis stopped us on the road and said that  
he wanted me to pay damages for passing with my  
wagons over the fields of his father, after a few words  
between us he mounted his horse and followed us up  
to the stone bridge to the magistrates Office and stopp  
ed us again, and tried to have me arrested. I told  
him there was no use in going to law about this -  
matter, that if I had done any damages to his fathers  
grounds I would pay for all damages done. he Jarvis  
said he wanted a warrant for me under all  
circumstances whatever, and if it cost Ten dollars  
it would cost me or the (Cold) boy, who ever was the  
owner of the wagon Fifty dollars, and he appeared  
to care nothing about settling the affair by a compe  
romise. -

Yesterday coming right opposite to Mr  
Jarvis house, the Mr Jarvis asked us to stop, he  
then asked the (Cold) boy what capings did you cut  
with my today the other day, the (Cold) boy what  
(over)

Capers. Mr. Jarvis and the Cold boy repeated these questions twice. Mr. Jarvis then got on the wheel of the wagon, and said to the Cold boy, God damn you, you know me, caught the Cold boy by the throat and jerked him half way over the side of the wagon, at the same time the horse started a little. (and he Mr. Jarvis) asked me to stop the horse till he could pull him out and kick the black heart out of him. I told him not to abuse the boy and caught hold of the boy myself, he let him go and at the same time his hand somewhere about the neck, the boy then drove the wagon about two hundred yards himself stopped and said, I believe that man hurt my leg, and asked me to feel the leg above the left knee, I done so and found a big bump raised there, asked him to lift up his leg, which he said he could not do. I then told him that I thought his leg was broke, lifted him to the back part of the wagon, and laid him down, drove into the City to his fathers house, sent for a doctor, who on examination said that the lower portion of the thigh was fractured, the Wagon is the property of this boys father, who hires me the wagon, and he can do as drives, and that is the reason. I suppose that Mr. Jarvis attacked the boy and not myself.

Dear Mother/boy, He was sent for yesterday and found the lower portion of the left thigh fractured. It will take from six to seven weeks for the sufferer by good attendance and care to be able to move about on crutches.

Mr. Jarvis says admits that the evidence given by Mr. Thomas Kinley and Miss is correct with the exception of the words "till he could pull him out and kick the black heart out of him" he further states that he has no witnesses in his defence and that he was very sorry this occurred, that he had no intention of breaking the boys leg, he was mad at the time, and not knowing what he was doing.

on cross examination of Mr. and Mrs. Kinley said that they are very positive in regard to Mr. Jarvis making use of those words "till he could pull him out and kick the black heart out of him"

Mr James

Owen Kirby an Officer in the County of Fairfax State of Va called  
at my office this day and handed me the enclosed act passed in the  
Legislature of Va. in 1860, and which act is in force at the present  
day.

Mr Kirby enters complaint that the said law is daily violated  
by colored & white parties and requested my opinion regarding  
the disposition to be made of colored parties violating the same, I  
told Mr Kirby that as the law made no distinction as regards color that  
it was his duty to arrest all parties, and if colored persons were arrested  
and a Magistrate of the County aforesaid would give them a fair  
and impartial trial admitting colored evidence to take the party  
arrested before such Magistrate, but if not to bring them before  
this Court, and I would proceed with the trial in such cases by  
said act.

Mr Kirby states that the Citizens of the above mentioned County have no

difficulty about the trespassing which is now complained of whilst  
the Mounted patrol was in existence. But since the discontinuing  
of said patrol that parties are daily in the habit of shooting and stealing  
hogs, sheep and driving off cattle of both colored and white citizens,  
and that it is impossible to stop such depredations unless the said  
law is enforced. My impression is that if the law be enforced, on a  
fine of those committing such depredations, it will effectually put  
a stop to such unlawful proceedings. He pledges me his word  
that the white man when caught shall suffer the full penalty  
of such law and in fact advises me of a party who have pledged  
themselves to lynch all such white persons connected with  
such thefts. I believe in giving him the permission to make  
the arrests that I am not doing the colored man any injustice,  
but on the contrary, rendering aid in advancing the moral  
standing of such citizens. As the case now stands, the white  
depredator is disposed to lay all the responsibility on such  
colored persons who reside in this vicinity and the adjoining  
County.

In arriving at the amount awarded the court was guided by the former verdict of the Military Authority at Alexandria who investigated the case at or near the date of committal of said Trespass - "That Thomas Javins pay a reasonable amount for Damages and all medical bills for attendance on the said Benjamin F. Deal, during his confinement" The act is clearly proven to have been committed by the said Thomas Javins, and it is also in proof that for four months Benjamin F. Deal could not perform his accustomed labor for support and his step Father, and his Mother had to neglect their duties to attend to him whilst confined to his bed.

I have not confined Thomas Javins, nor will I, until the approval of the finding in the case by proper authority.

Chap: 279. - of Acts of Assembly 1854-60 - page 489,  
An Act.

To prevent trespasses depredations &c, along the borders of the  
Potomac and other tidal waters, in the Counties of Fairfax  
and January 28<sup>th</sup> 1860.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Va. That if any person shall  
shoot, hunt, or range, fish or fowl in the lands, or in the water courses  
comprehended within the survey of any proprietor of lands in the Counties  
of Fairfax,

within five miles of navigable tide water, without licence in writing from  
the owner of said lands. He shall forfeit to the informer, three dollars for the  
first offence, Six Dollars for the second, and nine dollars for each succeeding  
offence, the forfeit in each instance to be double if the offence shall be  
in the night or on Sunday, and he shall likewise forfeit to the informer  
in each instance, his boat or other means of conveyance, his guns, dogs,  
and all his shooting, hunting, and fishing apparatus, and be liable in  
every instance for all costs and expenses incurred in apprehending  
him and prosecuting for the recovery of said forfeitures.

Such offenders may be arrested by any citizen or citizens of this  
Commonwealth, with or without a warrant, either on land or water  
or pursued to and taken in their vessels, or other means of conveyance,  
which may be held while the offenders are carried before a Justice  
of the peace, who shall proceed to try the case as any other coming,

before him, and give judgement according to the provisions of this act, and if the offender does not, on judgement being rendered commit him pay down and deliver up the forfeitures, costs, and expenses incurred under this act, he shall be committed to jail by the Justice rendering judgement, for one month or untill the same is paid and delivered up.

If in any person shall be convicted a third time of any of the offences aforesaid the Justice rendering judgement therefor, shall require him, over and above the forfeitures and penalties for failure of payment imposed by this act, to give recognizance with sufficient security for one hundred Dollars, to be of good behavior for a year, or if he fail to give such security, commit him to jail for two months, unless it be sooner given to the satisfaction of the Justice requiring said recognizance, such recognizance shall be forfeited if such person offend as aforesaid within the time limited in the recognizance.

This act to be in force from its passage.

A few days since the Military Authority has been appealed to for redress by the step father of the boy, Franklin Beal. Mr Javiers was arrested and tried by you, for a brutal assault upon the boy in which his leg was broken. His sentence was a severe one, viz: Incarceration until the boy was discharged, cured, payment of a reasonable sum for the boy's time and bills for medical attendance.

Since Mr Javiers incarceration, the father although spoken to, upon the subject, by yourself Mr Torree, the Superintendent

of Contrabands, and the General Commanding, insists upon a disposition, of the case by the civil authorities, in opposition to their advice, and contrary to his first expressed wish, that the Military should dispose of the subject.

This course upon the part of the father, is brought about doubtless, by the intermeddling of an Attorney by the name of George E. N. Day, of the City of Washington, who doubtless is influenced in his action more by the prospect of a fee, than a disposition to benefit the race of which he so frequently and loudly proclaimed himself a devoted friend.

As both the father and the man Day insist upon a different determination of the case, you will at once turn Mr. Jarvis over to the Civil Authorities of Fairfax County for their action, and furnish the father with a copy of this order.

To the Court at Alexandria Va.

Thomas Jarvis a  
Citizen of Va & resident of Fairfax County Va respectfully files this  
his objections to any action of the Court at Alexandria in the  
case of Franklin Deal against him.

The case is now pending before the Civil Courts of Va  
for their adjudication. It was referred to them, not by any action on  
his part, but was so referred through the instrumentality of those managing

on the part of Beal. Said Javins respectfully shows, that he was arrested in June last, by the Military Authorities for an assault on Beal and that a severe judgement was imposed upon him, in addition to incarceration he was mulcted in damages & costs, that whilst imprisoned, Beal & his representatives became dissatisfied with the action of the Military Authorities and in consequence thereof Brig Genl Slogh Comdy at Alexandria turned the case over on the 15<sup>th</sup> June 1865 to the Civil tribunals.

Said Javins herewith exhibits the order of Genl Slogh thus disposing of the case with his reasons therefor. The case is still pending before the Courts of the State, and said Javins has been recognized in heavy bonds for his appearance to answer judgement.

Said Javins respectfully insists that the case is now where it appropriately belongs by the Constitution & laws of the land to wit the Civil Courts, & inasmuch as Beal himself was instrumental in referring it to them, he objects to a withdrawal of it from their jurisdiction.

Ruling of the Court is that a suit for damages has not been commenced in the County and State of Va above mentioned, that no records from said County has been produced to substantiate said plea, that the Military authorities did investigate the case at the time specified, but that no specific amount was named to be paid by the defendant Thomas Javins to Beas F. Beal colored and that the case clearly comes under the jurisdiction of the Circuit Court established in Gen Orders No 103 dated Head



Cors Dept of Washington July 27<sup>th</sup> 1865 and with this  
decision the court proceeded on the trial of the case,  
The defendant then plead, Not Guilty.

Plea Not Guilty.

George R. Groupp, being duly sworn says, I was present  
when Benj F. Beal (old) got his leg broken. Mr Javins  
came out of his house and stopped Frank Beal on the road  
and asked him, what papers there were that he was cutting  
up with his son. He said this over two or three times, and then said  
to Frank damn you, you know me dont you. He then said  
let me take him out of the waggon, and kick his black heart out,  
Mr Kinley the man who employed Frank told Mr Javins to  
let Frank alone Mr Javins had hold of Frank at  
the time. Mr Kinley drove on after Mr Javins had let go  
Frank and when the horse had gone two or three steps, Frank  
complained that his leg hurt him, Mr Kinley then laid Frank  
in the back part of the waggon and drove on home, when Mr  
Javins had hold of Frank he was trying to pull him out of  
the waggon, Mr Kinley caught hold of Frank to keep Mr  
Javins from pulling Frank out of the waggon, at the same time  
telling Mr Javins to let go of Frank. I believe Mr Javins  
struck Frank, when he said let me take him out of the waggon  
and kick his black heart out of him, Mr Javins put his foot on the  
wheel and caught hold of Frank by the neck, when he was  
trying to pull him out. Mr Kinley holding Frank in, Mr Javins  
was pulling Frank hard when he had him by the collar, this

was on the main road, near Mr Javins house and about one mile from Clouds Mills. It was on Sunday ~~the morning~~ <sup>evening</sup> some time first part of last summer, Mr & Mrs Kinley were in the waggon, with Frank and myself, Mr Kinley was a pedlar at the time, Frank was driving the waggon for Mr Kinley. Mr Javins came up to the side of the waggon where Frank was sitting,

Grp. Examined.

I cant swear positively that Mr Javins struck Frank, but I saw him strike at him, the team was coming to Alexandria, Frank was sitting on the right hand side of the waggon, Mr Javins went on the same side of the waggon. I do not know which leg was broken, Frank said that his leg hurt him and the waggon was stopped. It was the left leg. Mr Kinley held Frank whilst Mr Javins tried to pull him out, the leg next to Mr Kinley was broken, Mr Javins asked Frank what Capers he was cutting up with his son. Frank said he had not cut any Capers with his son. Mr Javins had nothing in his hands that I saw, if Mr Javins had struck Frank at the time he struck at him he would have hit Frank in the face. I was sitting behind the boy, he were this side of Mr Javins house when he came to the waggon, and when we stopped to put Frank in the hind part of the waggon, we were this side of ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup> a big tree. this side of the branch. Mr Javins only had hold of Frank with one hand.

Benj F. Seal. being duly sworn, says. I am 19 years of

age, I was in the main road, in front of Mr Javins house  
on Sunday June 4<sup>th</sup> 1865, in the afternoon, coming towards  
Alexandria, Mr Thomas Kinley and wife and Leary R  
Crump was in the waggon, with me Mr Javins called me  
and I stopped the waggon, He put his foot on the wheel  
of the waggon, and asked me what capers, I had been cutting  
with his son Eddie, I asked him what Capers, He asked me  
three times the same question, He had a short pipe in his  
mouth, He then said God damn you dont you know me,  
grabbing me by the throat, and as he did, so struck me three  
times, The horses started and Javins said stop the waggon  
and let me get him out and kick his black heart out, Mr  
Kinley by this time had got him loose from me, Mr Kinley  
drove on and had got about fifty yards when as my leg  
pained me, I looked at it and saw that it was much swollen,  
I then said look at my leg, Mr & Mrs Kinley caught  
hold of me and placed me in the hind part of the waggon,  
I could not move my leg when I tried to set up straight  
on the seat, I turned to Mr Javins and said, Mr Javins  
I will try and make you pay for this, Mr Javins was about  
75 feet off when I said this, Mr Kinley told me my leg  
was broken, my leg is not entirely recovered, yet, It is  
shorter than the other one, I was under the care of Dr  
Gibson, and Adams. I was confined in bed for two months  
and then was on crutches over three weeks, My leg pains  
me now at times, so that I can hardly walk on it, I can  
bend my leg about half as far now, as I could before the  
fracture, I was in the employ of Mr Kinley at the time,

I had worked for him about one week, My wages was \$2<sup>00</sup> per day, My father charged \$6<sup>00</sup> per day for all and I got \$2<sup>00</sup> of the money, Mr Kinley supplied Head Ors with Articles, I do not remember the Corps, but it was lying above Clouds Mills and he supplied the same with Ice Vegetables, Ice Cream &c, It was over four Months before I was able to hire out, My Mother & Step Father attended me, whilst my leg was broken, My Father was employed on the Ferry Boat Mariner, at the time, and had to quit his place to wait on me.

Prof. Examined;

My left leg was broken, whilst Mr Jarvis was trying to pull me out of the waggon, Mr Jarvis had hold of my neck, and at the same time he struck me three times in the face, Mr Jarvis had one foot on the wheel, I had one horse only to the waggon, at times I had worked two horses, to it, the depth of the waggon bed was about 18 inches, I do not know what he meant by the question, "what papers thou were I had cut up with his boy" I knew his Boy. It was not over 50 yards from where the accident occurred to the place, when I was put back in the hind part of the waggon, It was my left leg which was broken, Mr Jarvis came on my right side, and Mr Kinley was on my left, side, Mr Kinley caught me arround the body,

Court met pursuant with adjournement and care resumed;

William Cole. (Colored) being duly sworn says,  
I know the plaintiff in this suit, He is my wifes son,  
He was brought to my house on the first Sunday in June  
1865. in a waggon, I took him in the house and laid him  
down and sent for Dr Gibson, After Dr Gibson arrived  
he set his the plaintiffs leg, and I nursed the plaintiff,  
the whole time he was sick until he was able to get up and  
wait on himself, and as near as I can recollect it was  
about three ~~weeks~~ months, I left my work for the purpose of  
attending to the plaintiff, I was getting \$75<sup>00</sup> per month  
and lost my situation by having to attend to him, The plain-  
tiffs Mother, also nursed him, His condition was bad,  
I had to get up night and day and attend to him, and  
had to buy him many little things, which I would not  
have had to furnish if the plaintiff had not been sick  
The plaintiff was getting three (3) dollars per day at the  
time his leg was broken, I hired another boy to take his  
place driving the team and paid him the same wages.

Cross Examined.

His brother drove in his place near a month when  
the man who hired the team drove himself, I could not  
let the boy go any longer, and the man said he would  
give me the six dollars \$6<sup>00</sup> per day for the team rather  
than give it up, I do not know how long Frank the plaintiff  
was confined to his bed, but it was three months or over, Question  
when did you visit Richmond last, answer, It was in  
August the third Monday 1865, It was Court day, the  
plaintiff had then been up about one week, He had not been

at work, but hobbling around on his crutches.

#### Direct Examination.

I hired a Boy to drive the waggon one Month, and then the man who hired my waggon drove untill the Army left, my waggon has been running since.

Doctor William Gibson, being duly sworn says. I am a resident of Alex Va. I am a Physician and have an Office at No 10 South Patrick St. I know the Plaintiff Benj F. Beale, I attended him about the 4<sup>th</sup> June 1865. His thigh bone was broken, the lower third of left thigh. The 7<sup>th</sup> week he was allowed to go on crutches. It was a simple oblique fracture, the patient suffered about as usual at such seasons of the year, long confinement on the back usually causes suffering. He had one bed sore and an excoriation of internal portion of thigh, caused by bandage, the plaintiff was out driving his waggon in three Months, I will not be positive but it was about that length of time, I think it likely he had some one with him, he was handling the lines, the fracture was caused by indirect violence. His limb is as good as in all cases of fractured thigh, a little shortening as is customary, and of course not as perfect as before, It will not in space of time, prevent him from engaging in the common pursuits of life, and the shortening may be obviated by the wearing of a thicker sole on the shoe of the foot of the fractured limb.

Dr Williams being called for the defendant was asked the following question, were you summoned to

Fairfax Co. Va in this case. I was not but simply requested to be present as the case would probably come up at the August Court, 1865. This question was objected to by the plaintiff, as being irrelevant and immaterial. The plea of the defendant having been overruled, and oral testimony is not evidence, the records of the courts not being produced,

Defence.

Elizabeth Juvinis, being duly sworn says.

I know the plaintiff in this case. Benj. F. Seal. Question was then asked the witness if she saw the boy previous to this occurrence and whether at that time he drove a Waggon through a Cornfield belonging to Wm Juvinis, and if the boy did not use insulting language on that occasion, objected to as immaterial not relevant and illegal. Objection sustained.

The question was then modified and put in the following language: State the last time you saw Benjamin F. Seal previous to said assault. Answer. The last time I saw him before the accident he drove through my fathers cornfield. What did you hear him say on that occasion. Answer. He said so much that I have forgotten what he said.

(This question was objected to by the plaintiff.)  
One thing he said was that he told my Brother to go to a bad place. He drove his waggon through the cornfield where no other person had gone. He drove around two pannels of fence

to get out through the garden, I saw him first, told my Mother and she told my Brother, My Brother told him he would know him next time, He replied "dry up" I do not remember anything further.

### Prop Questions.

I am fifteen years old, I am the daughter of Thomas Jarvis. Question, how long before the accident occurred did this take place, Answer, I do not know, He never drove through the cornfield but this one time, the next time he drove through Mr Richards field.

Thomas Jarvis, being duly sworn says. On Saturday afternoon I learned that the plaintiff in this case had insulted some of my family, On Sunday afternoon about 2 P. M. the 4<sup>th</sup> June 1865, the plaintiff was passing through Mr Richards lot, I went to him, and saw that he was in company with a white man and lady, I asked him politely to stop as I wanted to see him, I asked him what abusive language he gave my wife, He asked me whose wife, I asked of him then if he did not know me, He said yes, I asked him what he meant by insulting my wife, and how he came to drive through my cornfield, I think he said that all the other waggons went that way. — I was standing on a small piece of timber that stayed the bottom part of the waggon or on the fore wheel of the right side of the waggon, and on the side the plaintiff was sitting, I had hold of the front bow of the waggon with my right hand, and with my left had hold of the boys Coat Collar, I did not have hold of the collar over one minute, when the white man drove the waggon



away and as the waggon drove off, I had to get off. I saw  
the white man have hold of the Boy, I might have slapped  
him but did not hit him with my fist, nor did I say that  
I would take him out of the waggon and kick his black  
heart out, I never intended to hurt the boy. The waggon  
started I let go, and the waggon did not stop under two  
hundred or three hundred yards, I saw a little Boy or Girl  
get out of the waggon. I did not know the boy was hurt untill  
next morning, when I was arrested, at the Market House  
Alexandria Va. where I have a stall, I was tried by the  
Military authorities and released till 7. P. M. that day  
which was Monday, the 5<sup>th</sup> June 1865, I waited till the Provost  
Marshall came, and was released till next day, when I was  
ordered to appear again and was sent to Slave Pen by  
order of Gen. Slocum. I remained in the Pen untill the 15<sup>th</sup>  
June 1865, when I was released by the letter introduced  
in the first part of this trial, and was turned over to the  
Sheriff of Fairfax Co Va. The Sheriff said that he could not  
confine me unless a complaint was made, I went to W Lewis  
a justice of the peace, for the County, and told him what  
had happened, I told him that I would go home and  
return again next morning, and if he wanted me he knew  
where he could find me, that I was not going to run away.  
I came the next morning and stopped and told W  
Lewis son, that I was going to town, I was arrested  
that day by the Sheriff, who held me to \$1000<sup>00</sup> bail, I  
gave it, and went about my business, I appeared at  
Court, the case was postponed untill the 21<sup>st</sup> of November

1865. This part of the testimony <sup>(of Mr. Jarvis)</sup> was objected to by the plaintiff commencing from his arrest, as not pertinent to the issue, and also not the best evidence as to the facts as stated.

#### Questions by the Court,

This case was settled by the Milit, It was decided by Brig Gen J. P. Slough, then Mil Gov, which was imprisonment for three months and two dollars per day allowance, for the boy for 90 days.

I went in the Slave Pen on the 6<sup>th</sup> of June 1865 and remained until the 15<sup>th</sup> June 1865 when I was released and turned over to the Civil Authorities as stated, I have never paid anything in this case to the plaintiffs

#### Rebutting testimony.

Genl H. Lewis, being duly sworn says, I know the parties to this suit, Mr Jarvis son applied to me for a warrant to arrest, Benj. F. Beal, for driving through his corn, I advised a compromise and the parties who drove up in the waggon which had driven through the corn, seemed to be willing, to pay for any damages that might have been sustained, Young Jarvis left the matter with me and the party who drove through the corn was to have called the next day, to settle the affair, the parties never attended, this was on the same day that the waggon was driven through the corn, Question by the defendant, who made ~~you~~ the complaint against Mr Jarvis which caused you to order the arrest, Answer, Gen Slough turned the case over to the civil authorities, and with

the case all the papers relating to same, which I now presume are on file in the Clerk's Office of Fairfax County Va.

Carey R. Crump, being recalled said, I was with Benz F. Seal on Thursday June 1<sup>st</sup> 1865, I was in the waggon with Frank and he drove thru after some Govt Waggons, he went in the same track, Mr & Mrs Kinley were in the waggon with us, Frank was driving, I saw Mr Javins son, I did not see Mrs Javins until she put her head out of the window, I do not recollect what Frank and Mr Javins <sup>son</sup> said that day, but Frank did not say anything to Mrs Javins, Frank did not use any bad language, Mr Javins son said, he would have a warrant, Mr Kinley said you need not get a warrant, I will pay the damages.

There was a large mud hole in the main road and waggons could not well get over it, and they had to pass around in order to get out of mud hole, he had to pass through a portion of the corn field, about the space of thirty feet to get out of the mud.

#### Cross Examined,

The Mud hole was just opposite the corn and we could not get back without having to get in to the mud hole.

The case was then adjourned until Wednesday Oct 25<sup>th</sup> 1865, and Mr Thos Javins was notified to produce

the Records or certified copies of same, as to the  
Commencement of a Civil suit for damages by the  
party now complaining, or any one acting in his behalf,  
The adjournment was agreed to by all parties.

Office Court House

Alexandria Va Oct 25<sup>th</sup> 1865.

The Court met pursuant to adjournment case of Beal  
vs Javins was called, the defendant not appearing the  
Court therefore proceeded to dispose of the case on the evidence  
before it.

### Decision

From the evidence adduced the Court finds that the thigh  
of Benj F. Beal (Colored) was broken at the time and  
place specified, by Thomas Javins, and that the said Thos  
Javins of the County of Fairfax State of Va. must pay  
or cause to be paid to the said Benj. F. Beal (Colo) of  
the County of Alexandria State above mentioned, the sum  
of Five Hundred (500) Dollars for damages done on  
the person of said Benj. F. Beal and the said Thos Javins

Remained at his place when the troops came; has repeatedly given the Union Troops aid and assistance; has lived the last two years between two fires, and has been plundered by both sides. Old man, of 74 years, and wealthy, a bachelor, owns property in Connecticut, Georgia and S. Carolina.

Nightingale (owning the Dingamus Place on Cumberland Island - Loyal - opposed secession bitterly - Vigilance Com. of Fernandina in 1860 threatened to "deal" with him. Was an old line Whig and had always opposed the Southern Democracy. Had a family up in the country, and when our troops came he joined them. It is understood that the grown son was a secessionist.

Old man; lived quietly at his home near Cumberland Sound; was a loyal man; too old to be disturbed by the Rebels; his horses have been stolen by deserters or refugees and brought to Fernandina; he was spoken of two years ago by negroes, and refugees, as a Union man, his name being mentioned in the same category with some others living in his neighborhood.

John Pessent of St. Mary's - Store Keeper, old man, Unionist - once captured from a sick bed at Woodstock, by Col. but returned by Genl. of Dept. to his home.

David Bailey of Camden Co. Georgia - Bitter secessionist; violent persecutor of Unionists. Militia Commander in his County; But in the last year has been converted to Unionism.

Philip Dell of Fernandina, now near Newmanville, Florida - a personal friend of Mr. Gules - bitter secessionist and persecutor of Union men at Fernandina - is upheld by Mr. Gules's friends as a Unionist. He became convinced about a year ago, that the Southern cause was hopeless and

since then has been trying to recover himself, but being a man of influence did all in his power to corrupt the people. As a member of the Florida legislature and a man of wealth, was engaged in kidnapping nine negroes from a northern vessel lying in Cumberland Sound, but being pursued by state justice, judged it prudent to return the men and did so.

Sew. Linnegan - Speaks for himself.

Lewis Gardner - formerly City Marshall of Fernandina - a most ultra and sneaking man - pursuing poor men for their unionism - an efficient member of the vigilance committee hunting northern men and assisted in kidnapping negroes.

Capt. Jim Tucker, now living near Madison Fla. - was a bully - a

vigilant committee man - a most violent and rabid secess living at Fernandina in '61 - one of the most dishonorable and quarrelsome men in the county - bullied every timid man - talked bowie knife and pistol.

Stephen Bryan, now living near Newmansville, or rather about 12 miles north of Gainesville, near Phil Deles house & was and has been all through a consistent Union man.

Robert Campbell - a young lawyer - amounts to nothing - tried to be a union man - got frightened and became a very timid secess.

George Dusen formerly Mayor of Fernandina; a lawyer - a Union man throughout, but not active.

Lee Butler } Two young men - sons of a prominent So. Carolina  
Sampson Butler } politician - nephews of Geo. M. Call a lawyer of this  
town and a prominent secesh politician - violent  
partisans - but very young. Lee Butler was a Captain in  
the Rebel Army and is of responsible age - Sampson was  
a soldier in some of the Florida home Regts. - was only a boy

x James Mason - formerly Gen. Overseer under Capt Whiting in the  
U. S. Engineer Dept. - Persecuted the poorer class of  
men in <sup>the</sup> Fernandina and although a Massachusetts man  
was a most violent secessionist - the tool of the  
wealthier and more influential.

x Geo. Roux. of Fernandina - prominent in prayer meetings and  
political caucuses - violent secesh & persecutor - Amounts  
to 0.

x Lewis Roux. Brother of Geo. Weak - "good fellow" Amounts to nothing

In pursuance of orders received from Dist. Hd. Quarters, I have the honor to report that I have carefully investigated the enclosed cases, referred to me from Dist. Hd. Quarters, and that in the matter of William Lewis, I cannot in any way hear or learn of the shooting affair mentioned, although I have closely questioned the colored people living on, and near his plantation: and from the manner in which his hands are treated by him, according to their own statements, am of the opinion that it never happened.

As regards the other case mentioned, that of "King Kager" or properly "Kincaid" the facts are fully as aggravated as is stated in communication.

The investigation shows that the man "Kincaid" did beat a colored woman, by the name of Lydia, old and gray headed, in a cruel manner, first ordering her to lay on the ground, face downward, and then, after placing his foot upon her neck, beat her so that she has not as yet fully recovered from the effects.

The reason assigned was that over

The woman did not properly fulfill her "task" in the field.

A week or so subsequently, he also beat a small boy for the same reason, not performing the task assigned in the field, to his satisfaction:

From the statements made by colored people on his place, I am satisfied that he has in many instances, prior to the Garrisoning of this Post, treated his negroes in a cruel and brutal manner.

the cattle in to the corn field, thereby, out of  
pure wantonness, depriving him of the fruits of  
his labors. More over D. Braddock is still  
trying to keep him and other servants in bondage  
in direct opposition to laws of the land.

The object of this line is to obtain protection  
from the military authorities at this post.  
Trusting that it will be granted to this worthy

The dealers are all desirous to obey the spirit of the order; that is suppress trade so far as may be necessary to protect the soldiers, whether located or passing here from injury, and prevent them from obtaining any intoxicating beverage. At the same time they feel, that to be compelled to close trade entirely, when it cannot do injury to soldiers, is an unnecessary hardship. I feel sure that

if the order can be modified so as  
to close whenever troops are in the  
vicinity, and sell Beer & Ale, wine  
and Cider at times when they are  
not, to citizens; it will be strictly

These rebel sayings and doings bear an of little importance, except as connected with their purposes on your side of the Atlantic - On these they may throw some light and aid in their defeat.

The rebels in Europe talk very boastingly of the firm stand they are to make in Texas and say that many very many of the paroled soldiers from Lee and Johnston's armies are to join them there and make a final stand for Southern independence. But it is probable we have seen their last great military

struggle and hitherto their war will be mainly with  
the knife, poison and the torch - As my correspondent  
knows and has the confidence of some of the con-  
spirators in Canada. I think it would be wise to  
send him there to keep you informed of their movements  
as soon as he can be got away, Seddes could also  
render good service there if not already employed

The secret organization of which I have reported to you is progressing rapidly here and their destination is Vera Ha Havana. Within the last week many have left here for various parts to ships as above. I give this on the authority of G. Estás and so far as I understand it its their intention to operate in the above England States with all possible dispatch. So as to harass the government into conciliatory terms as to their future operations. Within the last 24 hours I have seen several hundred to join the secret expedition for Texas. They say there is no doubt as to the independence of that state from the fact that aid and all materials of war can be got through Mexican territory. and if any

dependence can be placed upon their stories  
the government is at work for it. Be this as it  
may it is evident there is something in the  
wind for they are all abroad here and everything  
is conducted in the most secret manner  
possible. Yesterday the rebel heads were in  
close conference without interruption from one  
to Sam O'Leary and to day some fine rebel  
despatch agents have left prematurely. I  
know that one has gone to Spain, one to  
Liverpool, the other three no one except  
themselves and Quilley knows where. Mr  
Quilley don't seem to like my refusal to  
go out to Texas and will probably keep  
to himself when his messengers have  
gone and their business. I shall follow  
them close at all points.

I have the honor to enclose herewith a letter of the 20<sup>th</sup> inst, addressed to me by Bushnell White Esq. a prominent lawyer of Cleveland, O. expressing his views of the cases of Cole and Robinson, as developed by evidence in court.

Circumstances had caused me to be familiar with much of this case before the receipt of this letter, and I am not at all surprised at the conviction of Cole's <sup>unmitigated</sup> ~~vicious~~ rascality and utter rottenness. I concur fully in the recommendation that he be speedily brought to trial.

I presume it will be recollected that up to this time charges have not been filed against Cole or Robinson, because it was intended to use them as witnesses against more important criminals, and this course I believe has been fully approved of.

There are five other cases here that ought to go before a General Court Martial, the charges in two of which have already been forwarded and the others are now being

prepared.

I request that the letter of Mr White  
be returned to me as in the pressure of

Dear Sir;

You are aware that I prosecuted on behalf of the United States in the Circuit Court of this District Merrick and Rogenthall for conspiracy to seize the U. S. St. Michigan & release the prisoners under your care on Johnson's Island - The trial ending on the 15<sup>th</sup> Inst. resulted in their acquittal.

I deem it my duty to send you the substance of a report made by me to the Attorney General in the matter, with the request that you forward the same to the Commanding Officer of this Department.

The proof was conclusive and Defendants admitted the fact that a conspiracy to seize the steamer Michigan and release the prisoners was formed by Jacob Thompson C. C. Cloy Jr. and others in Canada in the summer of 1864 & Charles H. Cole sent to Sandusky to carry out the plans.

That Cole leaving Canada, went to Philadelphia  
taking, at Buffalo, Anna Brown along with  
him as a mistress. In Phil<sup>a</sup> others were  
let into the plans, and on the 6<sup>th</sup> of August  
he left them for Sandusky, taking as a  
messenger boy, a young man of about  
20 years of age, of hardly average intellect,  
named John Robinson. On the 11<sup>th</sup> of August  
he arrived in Sandusky & commenced  
operations. Anna & Robinson were sent  
frequently to Toronto with moneys and letters  
to Jacob Thompson & brought back to Cole  
letters & money. Through W.W. Cleary of  
Toronto, Thompson furnished Cole from  
the first of August to the 15<sup>th</sup> of Sept. 1864  
about \$4000. The affair culminated  
on the 13 Sept. On that day, Cole and  
Robinson were arrested by yourself and  
Capt. Carter of the Michigan, and three  
hours later the Steamers Parsons and  
Island Queen were captured by the  
conspirators. The Queen scuttled, and the  
Parsons staved down across the mouth  
of Sandusky Harbor & receiving no

signals from the conspirator Thum (Cole was already arrested) she turned about and made for Detroit River - The indictment was found last October against Merrick and Royenthall on the evidence of Cole Robinson and Anna Brown - Before the grand jury, they, all, testified in an honest and truthful manner - Robinson and Anna testified upon the trial precisely as they did before the grand jury - Not so with Cole.

He purposely tried to appear as badly as possible - told different stories and contradicted himself repeatedly and purposely - The case was continued from last Jan. Term & Cole was here then - on his way back to Sandusky, he told people facts pertinent to the issue, and when inquired of by Dept. Counsel concerning these declarations denied having made them - He also made like declarations to prisoners on the Island

And to his guards, and then denied them  
on <sup>the</sup> stand. He declared, that he himself  
had no design of seizing the Michigan, that  
he was only shamming & trying to get money  
out of Thompson - when his whole evidence  
gave him the lie. He was evidently trying  
to save his own neck, and clear Merrick &  
Rozenthan. And he succeeded in the latter,  
& it will be for the military authorities to  
say whether he will be successful in the  
former.

He should be tried by a Court  
Martial for being a spy.

He has now no promise of favour from  
the government - the civil authorities.

Without using his evidence given in  
the civil courts - you can prove conclusively -

1<sup>st</sup>. That having been a Lieut in confederate service

he came into <sup>our</sup> lines at Memphis & gave his  
written parole and took the oath of allegiance

I have both papers -

2<sup>nd</sup>. That coming to Pennsylvania when he

was bound bro't up - he went thro'

New York City, to Niagara Falls Canada

and on his arrival there in July '64 at once entered into communications with the rebels.

3<sup>d</sup> That by arrangement he met Jacob Thompson C. C. Clegg Jr. W. W. Clegg and Prof. Holcombe at St Catharines and after consultation and by agreement went to Chicago to inspect Camp Douglas and arrange plans for its capture.

4<sup>th</sup> That on his return from Chicago Thompson sent him to Ohio to learn the whereabouts of the Michigan: and that she reported her to be at Sandusky.

5- That he went to Sandusky to seize her and release the prisoners - & went ~~there~~ in a private and clandestine manner.

6<sup>th</sup> That by presents & wine supplies he secured the fellowship of the officers of the Michigan & learned the routine of duty on board of her.

7<sup>th</sup> That he sent for Morpheim to Clegg there.

8<sup>th</sup> That at two different times, he took agents, naval rebel officers on



board of her, to examine her and form plans for her capture, she, at the time, lying near Johnson's Island & camp as a guard boat.

9<sup>th</sup> - That he never presents to Officers in the 128<sup>th</sup> Regt - guarding prisoners on the Island, and so secured the privilege of going over the Island, and so learned the routine of duty there.

10<sup>th</sup> - That information thus acquired was communicated to ~~Gen~~ Thompson at ~~Sandwich~~ Windsor Canada, and then by Thompson & Col an expedition was planned, which resulted on the 19<sup>th</sup> Sept: 1864 in the capture, as above stated, of the Parsons & Island Queen.

Resides all this, Col is a most wicked corrupt and depraved man. The Court, the jury and every man who heard him testify, claim him precisely as a spy.

Should a Court Martine be ordered, it should be done before the

Dear Sir,

About a week ago I had the honor to transmit to you a communication in regard to S. W. Goetzl vs J. P. Tweed to which I affixed duplicate writ of the Sheriff and an original letter to Genl. Granger, with his endorsed answer to the same.

I am respectfully awaiting your decision yet, and so are all our Civil Courts. - Since the Military intervention in my case, all our Courts have closed, and if you would permit my case to pursue its regular course, the law would resume its functions generally. -

The Courts might go on even under the control of Military Commissioners.

As it is now, we live in a state of anarchy, where there is no protection by law at all. -

The impression here is, that the President's restrictions had only its bearing on political matters, such as the convening of the Legislature, public elections, &c &c but not to a case of individual claims between one man and another. - However that must be left to your own judgment.

Genl. Granger's letter will be very important to me at some future time, therefore I beg leave to ask for its return. -

John T. Little of Chicago, was Superintendent or clerk at the Richmond House Chicago, for about a year. The proprietor of the Richmond House at the time was R. W. Hymers. Little was suspected by the military authorities of Chicago of being in sympathy with the Chicago conspirators, but not enough was found against him to warrant his arrest. The person who collected any evidence against Little was Morris Langhorne - once a rebel soldier, but who afterwards took the oath a witness in the case of the Chicago conspiracy and his statements are in the hands of Major Bingham, the Judge Advocate of the Court.

Little left for New York City in the month of January last and is engaged as a Land Agent at No. 11 Pine Street.

He has visited Chicago twice since, having a sick sister at the Richmond House.

He was last in Chicago some two weeks since. Morris Langhorne when in Chicago boarded at the Richmond House, and was in the confidence of the rebels, reporting all he learned to the military authorities. He is now living

at Maypsville, Kentucky. He would probably give any information he may have obtained from rebels or rebel sympathizers.

The Richmond House is now kept by Mr. Pierce, an old Chicago resident of undoubted loyalty. Nothing could be learned against Mr. Lyman who kept the House while Little was there, except that Little was allowed by him to do about as he pleased.

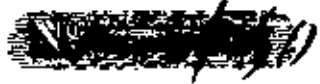

Before a Military Commission, convened at Nashville, Tennessee, in pursuance of Special Field Orders No. 54, Head-Quarters Department of the Cumberland, dated Nashville, Tennessee, March 1st, 1865, and of which Maj. COLMAN FORD, 100th U. S. Colored Infantry, is President, were arraigned and tried:

1. *William Roy*, citizen.

CHARGE: *Robbery.*

SPECIFICATION 1st: "In this, that said *William Roy*, a citizen of Tennessee, did, in company with two others, go to the premises of one Hugh Foy, citizen of Humphreys County, Tennessee, and did demand from him, and take by force from said premises, one mule, the property of said Hugh Foy, saying, as he did so, that he "knew Hugh Foy was a damned Union man, and that he would take the mule at any rate," or words to that effect. This in Humphreys County, Tennessee, on or about the 19th day of November, 1863."

**SPECIFICATION 2d:** "In this, that said *William Roy* did go to the house of one *Patrick Halpin*, a citizen of *Humphreys County, Tennessee*, and did forcibly take from said premises one mare, the property of said *Patrick Halpin*, saying that the reason he did so " was because the said *Halpin* had left his home, and that all his property should be confiscated for the *Southern Confederacy*," or words to that effect. This in *Humphreys County, Tennessee*, on or about the month of *July, 1862*, since which time the prisoner has been absent and not amenable to justice until the years *1864* and *1865*."

**SPECIFICATION 3d:** "In this, that said *William Roy*, did, in company with two others, go to the premises of one *Martin Hynes*, a citizen of *Humphreys County, Tennessee*, and did, by presenting a revolver to the breast of said *Martin Hynes*, forcibly take possession of and convey from said premises two fine horses, the same being the property of the said *Martin Hynes*. This in *Humphreys County, Tennessee*, on or about the month of *April, 1864*."

To which charges and specifications the accused pleaded, *Not Guilty*.

**FINDINGS:**

**SPECIFICATION:** "In this, that they, the said *John Hanley* and *Paul Larry*, in connection with other persons whose names are unknown, did conspire and consort together as public robbers, outlaws and armed enemies of the United States, for the purpose and with the intent to commit acts of hostility, murder and robbery against the peaceable and loyal citizens of the United States, and did, in pursuance of said purpose and intent, commit acts of murder and robbery, against such peaceable and loyal citizens, without belonging or being attached to any regularly organized armed force at war with the United States. This at *Smith County, Tennessee*, on or about the 10th day of *April, A. D. 1865*."

**CHARGE SECOND: Robbery.**

**SPECIFICATION:** "In this, that they, the said *John Hanley* and *Paul Larry*, in connection with another person whose name is unknown, did, on or about the 10th day of *April, A. D. 1865*, at the County of *Smith*, and State of *Tennessee*, forcibly and by violence, and against the will of one *G. M. Burton*, take from him, the said *G. M. Burton*, one mare, then in his possession, the personal property, goods and chattels of one *M. G. Cutrel*, of the value of two hundred dollars, (\$200,) and convert the same to their own use. This on or about the 10th day of *April, A. D. 1865*."

To which charges and specification the accused pleaded, *Not Guilty*.

**FINDINGS:**

SPECIFICATION: "In this, that the said *William Hawkins*, a citizen, employed in the Quartermaster's Department, U. S. Military Railroads, did, on the 25th day of May, 1865, steal from the mess-house, where he was employed, about eight (8) pounds of pork, and one peck of potatoes, valued at \$2.00, with intention to appropriate the same to his own benefit."

To which charge and specification the accused pleaded, *Not Guilty*.

## FINDINGS:

Of the specification to the charge, *Guilty*.

But the Commission attach no criminal intent to the act, and do therefore acquit him, the said *William Hawkins*.

II. The proceedings, findings and sentence in each of the foregoing cases of *Gustavus H. Goard*, alias *Gus. Goard*, *William Roy*, *John Hanley* and *Paul Larry*, citizens, are approved and confirmed. The Penitentiary at Nashville is designated as the place of imprisonment.

The sentence in the case of *Gustavus H. Goard*, alias *Gus. Goard*, is commuted to twenty years confinement at hard labor in the Penitentiary at Nashville, Tennessee, to which place the prisoner will be sent under guard with a copy of this order.

The proceedings, findings and acquittal in the case of *William Hawkins*, colored citizen, are approved and confirmed. *William Hawkins* will at once be released from custody.

Your Petitioner in justification of his actions

in her possession a large quantity of  
property, belonging to estate, a part of which

The said Strible has willfully and wrongfully misrepresented Your Petitioner to the Authorities and by his threats and Coasting creates no little annoyance.

To the end therefore your prayer, that he may be relieved from the embarrassment of the misrepresentation made by the said Strible and to be placed in such position to the matter as may be arrived at, from the premises.

And your Petitioner will ever pray &c.

Absalom Mc<sup>re</sup> Elmurray being called upon to give evidence makes the following statement:-

I am thirty eight years of age, reside in Charleston Miss. Co. Mo. and by occupation am a merchant. About the 1<sup>st</sup> of December 1863 as near as I can recollect I was at Ringo's Warehouse near Mc<sup>re</sup> Donald's store on the bank of the Meiss river in Meiss. Co. Mo. in company with Cassie Lee, John Taylor, Underwood Beckwith, Nathan Noyes, Dr. Trice, Abraham Levy - Cain Joseph Ringo and Paul Nally. There was a steamboat lying at the landing taking on corn which I supposed belonged to the Government. It reached the landing about sundown and went on board the boat and all went to the bar and took a drink. After that we ate supper on board the boat. After supper

Cruise Lee and myself walked up on the bank and met the Captain of the boat at the top of the bank which was here about as high as the hurricane roof of the boat. He talked with Tim about the news &c. and then Cruise Lee asked Tim if he could change a five dollar bill so as to take pay for his supper as he had forgotten to pay the clerk. The Capt. told Tim he had no change with him, and I handed Lee the change to pay for his supper and he handed it to the Captain. By this time Capt. Meadison, whom I supposed was in command of a company of colored soldiers who were guarding the boat and loading corn, came to where we were standing.

He commenced talking with the Capt. of the boat about something and at the same time I was talking with Cruise Lee. About this time John Taylor and some others came up the bank. Taylor had been drinking until he was intoxicated to some extent. When he came up Capt. Meadison asked him "what would he have". He said he had taken thirteen and a half (13½) drops too much. The Capt. said "none of your d-d insinuations" and raised his sword up over his shoulder and Taylor raised a cane



which was in his hand. Capt. Meadison then called for the sergeant and when the sergt. came the capt. ordered him to "take that man down" pointing to Taylor with his sword. The sergt. grabbed Taylor and threw him on his back and the capt. called another colored man and ordered him and the sergt. to take him (meaning Taylor) on board the boat. I stepped to Capt. Meadison and asked him to please not let the men hurt Taylor as he was drinking but was a good citizen when he was sober. The capt. said G-d-d-n him let him behave himself. I spoke again to the capt. and asked him to please let Taylor off this time as he is drunk. The capt. said "Know my business". I then turned away from him and some one else spoke to him. I don't know what was said but all the citizens were begging in Taylor's behalf. Capt. Meadison called out "bring up the arms" and the soldiers came running up the bank firing off their muskets as fast as they could. I run and jumped and jumped on my way and got away from there. I had no arms and took no part at all in the affray except to beg Capt. Meadison not to let the soldiers hurt Taylor. I did not see any of the citizens shoot and I did not know that any of them had

arms with them. I saw no one struck  
and did not know that any one was  
hurt until the next day when some of  
the men who were taken prisoners came  
back and told me that Capt. Meadison  
was shot.

Sometime in the fall of 1863 or Spring of  
1864 I was at Ringo's warehouse near Mc<sup>r</sup>-

Donald's store on the bank of the Meris. river

in Meris. Co. Mo. in company with Nathaniel

Mequick, Lewis Lee, John Taylor, Hosalom

Mc<sup>r</sup> Murray and quite a number of other  
men whose names I do not remember.

There was a stern wheel Steamboat lying  
at the landing taking on corn which was  
being loaded by negro soldiers, who were

commanded, as I understood, by a Capt.  
Meadison. About dark we went to supper

commanded as I understood, by a Capt. Meadison. About dark we went to supper on board the boat and when coming out the clerk remarked that the boat was furnished by the Government, from which I inferred that they had no means to give away, and I gave him a five dollar note to pay for our suppers and some others gave him some money too. He then took a cigar and started up the bank.

While we were going up the bank a negro with a bag of corn ran against John Taylor. Taylor seemed insulted and some words passed between them and Taylor turned round with a cane in his hand and said to the negro "I'll show you" but did not strike him.

The negro went on board the boat and Taylor and I went up the bank which was here about as high as the boat. When we got to the top of the bank we met Capt. Meadison who said to Taylor "What did you say sir?" Taylor remarked that he had about thirteen and a half (15 1/2) drops too much in him". Capt. Meadison remarked "none of your impudence (or insolence or something to that amount) and drew his sword, and Matthew Menrick and Absalom Mc<sup>r</sup> Murray stepped up to the Capt. begging him not to hit Taylor as he was a good citizen but was drinking. The Capt. remarked stand

back or I will run this sword through you".  
He then ordered the arms and called the  
sergt. and told him (the sergt.) to take that  
man (meaning Taylor: as I supposed) down.  
The sergt. took Taylor down and the firing  
then commenced, and I ran into a corn-  
field and hid. The boat soon put out  
and I went back to the landing and met  
Mr. Elmurray and Myrick. I heard some  
one say that one of the soldiers said Capt.  
Maddison was shot. This is all I know of  
the affair.

I have been made acquainted with the terms of the Amnesty Proclamation and do declare that I do not belong to any of the classes prohibited from its benefits.

Mo. in company with Abraham Levy, Aaron Cain, John Taylor, Dr. John Trice and others. There was a steamboat at the landing taking on corn for the Government, as I supposed, from the fact that some colored United States soldiers were there loading the corn. Some officer was then who seemed to <sup>have</sup> command of the soldiers. About dark we took supper on board the boat and afterwards I went up on the bank where I met the Capt. of the boat who asked me and some others if we had paid for our supper. I told him I had not, and he said I had better go aboard and pay the clerk for my supper. I asked him if paying him wouldn't do as well. He said it would and I asked

him to change a bill. He said he hadn't  
the change. I then borrowed the money  
from Mr. Mc<sup>r</sup> Emery and paid him.  
About the next thing I remember was John  
Taylor came up the bank quite intoxicated.  
I don't remember that I heard Taylor make  
any remark at all, and the officer who  
had command of the soldiers, whom I  
afterward learned was Capt. Maddison,  
asked Taylor what was the matter with him.  
I think Taylor replied that he had taken  
thirteen and a half (13½) drops too much. Capt.  
Maddison told him not to give him any of  
his impertinence. As well as I remember,  
Taylor asked the Capt. what he was going to do

his sword raised I think, and Taylor was  
retreating back from him. Some person stepped

I have the honor to transmit herewith a statement of the manner and circumstances of the seizure of the U. S. Naval stores which you ordered to be sent to your office, in an endorsement on a communication from me.

I have the honor to submit the following statement in regard to the seizure of certain U. S. Naval Stores to which your attention was called by a previous communication from me through the Dist. Pro. Marshals Office:-

On the 8<sup>th</sup> inst. I received information from a citizen of this County that the individuals whose names are subscribed to the accompanying statements had in their possession property which he believed belonged to the U. S. and he directed me where it could be found. The next day, accompanied by Lieut. Whitell of the Miss. Cav. Militia and a squad of men, I started to seize the property.

We first went to the residence of Ewan T. Lamb who resides in Miss. Cav. Mo. On stating the purpose for which we went he acknowledge he had some articles

of the nature referred to and produced them, but was inclined to keep concealed a portion of the property which we found on searching his premises.

Placing a guard over what we had found there we proceeded to island N<sup>o</sup> 2 in the Miss. river a distance of about eight miles from the residence of Mr. Tumb, and at the house of George Parsons took possession of more goods of the same nature and under the same circumstances. The property found here was in the possession of George Parsons and Marion Parsons. The latter was not present at the time of the seizure. George Parsons was present however and exhibited a great deal of reluctance in giving up the property a part of which he had concealed in the brush away from his house.

We next went to the house of James Carter and there we found more of the same kind of property in the possession of James Carter and B. P. Gray. These men were both present and gave up their property willingly. We then proceeded to island N<sup>o</sup> 3, to the residence of J<sup>ms</sup> Parsons who very willingly delivered up some of the same property which was in his possession, saying that when it was found, those who had it in their possession

divided it with the understanding that if  
the authorities called for it they would at  
once give it up. Owing to the fact that the articles  
found were in small and broken parcels I  
was not able to take a memorandum of the <sup>no</sup>  
or quantities taken from each one without much  
labor and a great loss of time. I therefore procured  
and receipted for teams to transport the property  
to my office at Charleston where I counted, and  
packed as well as I could, all I had seized.
