untill the 2<sup>nd</sup> of Aug when I was sent here, without  
ever hearing my sentence from the court, & having  
good reasons to believe that the Court did not find  
me guilty, I wish (Respectfully) to know if my charges  
& Evidence against me was transmitted to you or  
not, & if not to ask the favour at your hands  
to get them & examine them for me, believing  
that if I had them in your hands I would have  
a fair and impartial Decision in the case

I know not whether I have been sent here  
as a prisoner of war or as a citizen

I have never been in arms against the Government  
never had anything to do with raising companies or  
such like, & am only an humble private citizen.

I should be much pleased to hear from you  
upon the Subject at your earliest convenience

I am a Citizen of Boone County Mo.

D. B. Cunningham, Boone Co. Age 45.

I was arrested May 21<sup>st</sup> and have been in prison since. Was about two miles from home when arrested in company <sup>with</sup> Geo. E. H. Miller. Had been down to the river 2 or 3 miles to invite said Miller to my house. He had been as far as Arkansas, as a delegate to the general Conference which was to meet in New Orleans. So he told me, Miller had lived with me a year, and was an intimate friend. I did not know that Miller was with any armed body, or engaged in any unlawful business.

I was near in arms. About one year ago, I got them up some 30 or 40 blankets for the rebels, for which I was arrested, and ~~sent~~ <sup>sent</sup> to Jefferson City <sup>an hour,</sup> I was immediately displeas'd on the acct of allegiance. I have kept it I believe, secretly. -

I had a fair trial before a military Commission at Jeff. City.



I was charged with the act of going as guide  
to guerrillas, which I disapproved  
to the satisfaction of the Commission.  
I believe. - I don't know of any  
other charges. There could be no  
other charges, and the forgery was  
utterly unproved. - I solemnly de-  
clare that since I took the oath of  
allegiance I have been and faith-  
fully to fulfill its obligations, and  
am not conscious of having at  
any time committed any viola-  
tion of it. -

I believe the Commission found  
me not guilty and I don't know  
why I am a prisoner. The  
Judge President of the Commission  
told me that week after that  
he was surprised I had not  
been released.



General;

I learn from Louis papers of a recent date, and from other sources of information of so reliable a character that I am constrained to credit them, that Major Blackwell, Capt Woodsmall and Lieut Edwards, Confederate officers, left wounded at Cape Girardeau, had upon their Convalescence, been confined in the military prison at Alton Ill.

I desire to call your attention to the fact that on the 11<sup>th</sup> of May 1863, Col J. O. Shelby, acting under my instructions, addressed a communication to Brig Genl Geo McNeil, which was forwarded under flag of truce borne by Capt Adams, demanding the release of the said officers, in accordance with an agreement entered into between Maj (then Brig) Genl Blunt U. S. A, and Maj Genl Hindman to S. A; and at the same time forwarding into your lines Capt Bartlett, Spencer and Michael, U. S. officers, prisoners in my hands. Though Genl McNeil and

Davidson repudiated the agreement entered into between Genl. Blunt and Hindman, it was in substance agreed between Capt Adams, my representative, and Lieut Kramer, the representative of King Genl. McNeil, that the above named Confederate officers, together with Lieut Farrell, should be paroled upon their recovery, and sent into the Confederate lines, and that the above named Federal officers, together with Major McCounell before paroled, should remain within your lines, until properly exchanged. This will more fully appear from accompanying copies of official documents.

In accordance with this agreement, Lt. Farrell, who alone was able to travel, returned with Capt Adams; and Capts Bartlett, Spencer and Michael remained within your lines, now if it be true that Major Blackwell, Capt Woodsmale and Lieut Edwards, have in violation of this arrangement been confined as prisoners, it is so base and palpable a breach of good faith and express written agreement, that I deem it only necessary, to call your attention to the facts of the case to insure their immediate release, and return to within the Confederate lines, to await their proper

in change.

You are doubtless personally cognizant of the terms of the Compact between Maj Genl Hindman and Maj (then Brig) Genl Skelton, by which it was substantially agreed, that all officers and men who should fall into the hands of the opposing party by reason of their wounds, should be released without parole, and that all hospital stores, ambulances, &c captured should be returned. To this arrangement Maj (then Brig) Genl Kenon and myself were witnesses.

Without desiring to be considered the Champion of the agreement in question, you will allow me to say that in all instances I have strictly complied with its terms. In proof of this, witness my late expedition into Missouri. At Patterson I left between twenty and thirty Federal <sup>soldiers</sup> ~~officers~~ and a hospital unparoled. Whilst returning from Cape Girardeau the Brig Major of one of your regiments fell into my hands, wounded, and was <sup>immediately</sup> sent beyond my lines unparoled. On the part of the U. S. government, I repeat to say, the policy has been the reverse. My wounded both officers and men, have, in open violation of all agreement, not only not been sent into the Confederate lines unparoled,

but have without exception been retained  
in custody and confined in miserable  
and deadly prisons. Without pretending  
to discuss the sagacity or propriety of  
the compact above referred to, I cannot but  
consider that either party was bound in honor  
to comply with its conditions, the one at least  
official notice had been given to the offer-  
ing party that they should hold themselves  
released from its further obligations. How I  
have complied with it, my expedition into  
Missouri will show. How the officers of  
the U. S. government have complied with it,  
the facts herein recited, and the necessity for  
this flag of truce will be evidence.

In reply I would say I am warmly addressed as comd'g Gen in S. C. Mo, Brig Genl Davidson, comd'g St Louis, Dist of Mo, being the commandant of all forces in South East Mo. Your communication will be telegraphed to him, and I will act as directed by him: meanwhile without <sup>reference to</sup> agreement between Generals Marmaduke and Blair, of which I have no knowledge: if you are disposed to discharge these gentlemen on their parole of honor, as stated by your I will see that the terms are complied with, and consider you to do me as a favor, which I will endeavor to reciprocate. Only one of the prisoners demanded is fit to be ransomed.

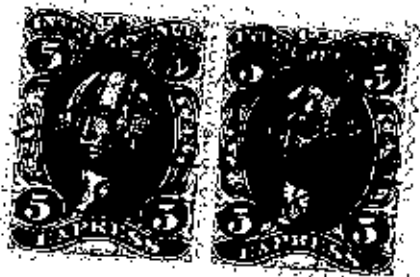

I have the honor to enclose herewith the proceedings in four more cases tried before the military Commission. I am very desirous to receive the result of your examination of the cases already tried. My utter inexperience in the performance of the duties of a Judge Advocate leads me to fear that there may be some essential errors in my reports, which being pointed out, might lead to an avoidance of like ones in future. There are two prisoners here against whom charges are preferred, and who are awaiting trial ~~in whose case~~ <sup>in whose case</sup> no witnesses appear on the papers except Maj. Leffingwell of the 1<sup>st</sup> Iowa Cavalry. Capt. Danks of the 1<sup>st</sup> Iowa Cav. who has been here as a witness before the Commission, informs me that Maj. Leffingwell has no testimony to give in either case that will convict the parties. I am fully convinced, from the evidence I am able to find, here relative to their cases, that they are men who last fall and Winter were in Prier's Army, but were on their return home to remain in peace. They were both arrested at this house, unnamed. Their names are

John Ferrel and John Perrie and I incline  
herewith the charges and specifications in their  
cases, respectfully asking instructions for their  
disposal. I am informed by the Provost  
Marshal that both the prisoners named are  
desirous to subscribe to the oath and give bond  
for future loyal conduct, earnestly desiring to  
become peaceable citizens. Their antecedent  
services to the rebellion are reported good.

Ans.

I do not know know, and never have known of any such persons.

Ques.

Have you not sent letters to your son in rebel army? if not to them have you not written to other parties?

Ans.

I never have in any way, I have written to my son Chas. Wesley, when he was a prisoner of war, at Alton Illinois - and all my letters were sent unsealed through the nice authorities hands - then -

Ques.

Do you know a family by name of Bamberger, and what acquaintance have you with them?

Ans.

I have heard of the family, but only know Mrs Bamberger, I have dispensed charity to her, knowing her only as a poor woman in need.

and in this way have assisted her. She came to me stating that she was in such destitute circumstances and I have assisted her as I did a great many at the time.

Ques.

Had any one of the Bamberger family, done anything for you or your family, if so, how did favor you?

Ans.

No one of the family ever did anything for me or my family in any way, and I assisted her for the only reason that she was a poor woman and in need.

Ques.

Have you never received letters through or by that family of Bamberger, either directly or indirectly, from a person or persons in rebel lines?

Ans.

Never in my life and don't know of any one who has - I have never known of but two letters from my son, or any one, to my family from rebel lines. The 1<sup>st</sup> letter was received by Mrs. Major Johnson in July 1862 - the ~~last~~ 2<sup>nd</sup> & last one received March 1864, also addressed to Mrs. Major C. Johnson my daughter.

The 1<sup>st</sup> one received July 1862 - was sent  
by my son from Jackson Miss, and  
Captain McMichael U. S. A. Then a  
prisoner at Jackson brought the letter  
to Memphis Tenn. & mailed it to  
St Louis to Mrs Johnson, Capt.  
McMichael was formerly on New Fremont  
Staff - and saw my son in Jackson  
Miss. when a prisoner in the  
rebel hands. The 2<sup>nd</sup> and last  
letter I ever received or know of hav-  
ing been received from my son, was  
in March 1864. This letter came by way  
of trace, through Col. P. Clayton of U. S. Army  
at Pine Bluff & sent by mail to P. O. St Louis  
Mo. I have written to my son Charles.  
When he was a prisoner at Atter, & received  
letters from him, all through the mail channels  
of 4<sup>th</sup> Army - I know of no mail carrier  
in this city or country, have had nothing  
to do with such people - I tried to prevent  
my son from going to rebel army, Lewis  
went to Louisville to go into business, there  
had letters of recommendation from busi-

in Memphis Tenn

My other son Charles, & Kretschmar

I address a few lines to you at this time, hoping that you will be so kind as to do me a favor, My Brother in law J. W. McWhorter is a prisoner at St Louis at this time I suppose.

I will give you a true statement of his case, He has been living in Howard & Chariton Co since this rebellion, A civil and loyal citizen and wished to remain there as such. But Price in his raid up into Mo conscripted <sup>him</sup> into the Rebel service, He was taken into Arkansas where he succeeded in making his escape from Price and he reported himself to the Federal authority at Vandenburg. He was sent to Fort Smith Military Prison, And again he was sent to Fort Leavenworth Kansas. And I suppose that he is now forwarded to St Louis, That he is a loyal & good citizen there is no doubt. I will now give you a statement of the character of Mr. Farnely as to loyalty, The McWhorter Farnely I mean. His father is Mr. McWhorter

Volunteered into the Federal  
Service in the Regt formed in  
North Mo at the commencement  
of the war. He volunteered in  
the 23<sup>rd</sup> Regt Mo Vol In, and was,  
with the Regt about 2 years, his  
health failed and he was honor-  
ably discharged. He has been a  
prominent union man from  
the commencement of Secession  
The Prisoner's Oldest Brother  
Marcelus McWhorter has been a  
prominent union man from the  
commencement of the present diffi-  
culty altho he has not entered  
into the volunteer service, he  
resides in W Va, he joined the  
union soldiers at Spencer  
Roan Co Va when the place was  
besieged by the Rebs & done battle  
for the defence of the place  
seven days at one time and five  
days at another time, he was  
County Clerk of Roan Co W Va at  
that time, he was afterwards  
elected Representative from that  
Co to the house of Delegates at  
Wheeling W Va, At the late  
election he was elected Auditor  
of State in W Va. He & McWhorter  
an other Br of the Prisoner entered  
the volunteer service early in the  
Rebellion. He was Capt in the 9<sup>th</sup> Regt

of W. Va. Infantry. He served  
his country as a good Soldier  
would for about 18 months when  
he was badly wounded in the  
thigh and disabled for a Soldier's  
duty. He resigned and was  
engaged in the Provost Martial's  
office at Charleston W. Va until  
recently, at the last election  
he was elected Representative from  
that section. The Prisoner's longest  
Br. Walter J. McWhorter, entered the  
Service early in the Rebellion. He

He served his three years out or

are quite numerous in W. Va. and

immediately liberating the Prisoner

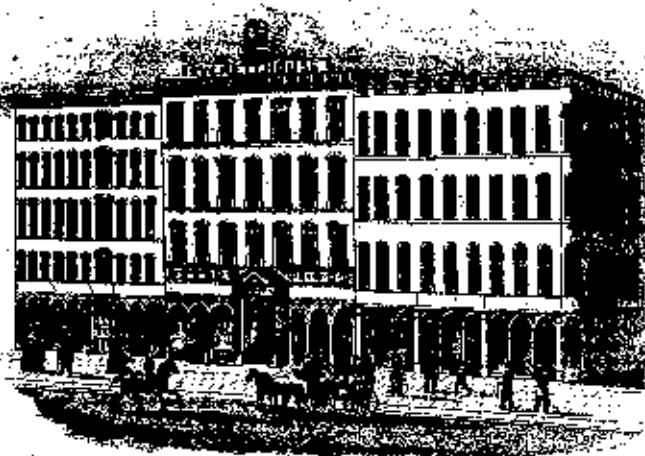

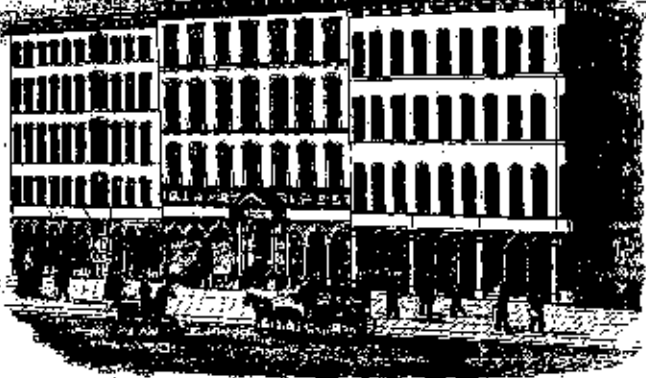

I was with my father Daniel Keithly in the 2nd Co. 1st Regt. Md. Inf. 1862

Daniel S. Keithly, 2 miles west of St. Peter's

years of age. I was taken prisoner  
on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of June near the Mount  
Zion battle ground. I was sworn  
into the service by Col. Lewis P.  
Ogden. Daniel Richmond,  
Robert Keithly, Henry Booth and  
John McKinley, all of whom live  
near St. Peter's in Saint Charles County  
Maryland were members of Capt.  
Caleb Johnson's Company and were

Dear Father Mother, Brother Sister &c  
I thought I would write you a letter but because we are in haste to get this off I shall only add a postscript. I am at the Grove with my brother and doing duty in the dispensary with him; I was very much surprised that you had not heard from me since last march my brother has written frequently

I have written two or three times since then when I went to Maryland and Pennsylvania with the army I wrote to you at Williamsport and also at a barn near Gettysburg and left it with one of my company who was wounded at the same time that I was. if you have not heard the particulars of my wound I will tell you. the battle commenced on the first and our battery was ordered into position on our left and the enemy right. we were shelled by the ~~guns~~ guns before we arrived at the place selected for us - but before we could get into position the enemy opened a most deadly fire on us from their 32 pounders but fortunately no one was hurt until the afternoon of the second day when they got range of us - and poured shells and canisters into us with effect. the first that I knew of the havoc that was going on was my Gallant Captain falling from his horse cheering us as he fell (by the way I must here add that I had no particular love for him) in a few minutes I was struck on the head by a fragment of shell - it penetrated my skull and for several days the surgeon who could pay but little attention to me - thought that I must die. but my energetic disposition kept me up - when the army fell back the surgeon told me that it was impossible for me to be moved and that I must be left with



you know. I resolved that if I died I would go  
back and I did so. The first day of our  
retreat I walked ten miles, and the doctor  
seeing that I was determined to escape from  
the Rebels had compassion upon me and  
made room in one of the forage Wagons for  
me and in that manner I arrived safely in  
Virginia. I have now recovered from my  
wound and am doing as well as I could expect  
I have been in the army nearly 3 years and I  
think it is time I was taking a little rest  
sometimes I become very disponding about home  
and think that I will never see any of you again  
but I try not to think so often. when I have  
another opportunity to send any thing I will  
write you a long letter and send you my  
photograph. I must now stop and let my

in a few days. A Captain Terrell, also, who raised a

one Marion Carson, who lives at Petersburg in this Co.  
This "Carson" is considered a bad man, has been away, and  
returned several times, is thought by many to be a spy.  
They say they have been released on oath, we know  
not how true this is. Now Sir I most earnestly and  
respectfully draw your attention to these facts, and  
hope something can be done to prevent these men  
from coming in our midst at this time. We feel  
it is wrong that these men are released, while the Rebels  
retain men of our army in close confinement, beside  
it has a bad influence as stated above, to see such men

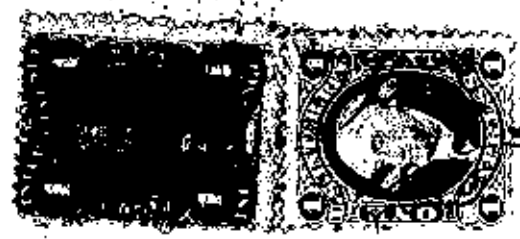

Sir:

We have just received through you an order purporting to come from Major Genl McClellan to accompany a detail of Confederate privates who are now prisoners in your hands to open magazines abandoned at this place which you suppose to contain explosive materials likely to endanger the lives of your own soldiers; before enquiring into the consequences of a refusal to perform this service we are informed that as to the officers it would involve a revocation of our limited parole and close confinement - as to the privates more serious consequences might ensue.

It has not taken us long to determine under these circumstances that our duty as officers require that we should share any danger real or imaginary to which our fellow soldiers in the ranks may be compelled to expose themselves. At the same time we claim the right to put ~~on~~ upon record our solemn protest against this unjust - ungenerous and inhuman abuse of the faith which these prisoners repaid in the honour of the U.S. Government when they surrendered their arms into the hands of her officers.

It is no part of our duty to discuss the question as to whether a retreating army has not the right to check the advances of its adversary by any destructive engine which it may be enabled to devise. It is sufficient to say that for the use of the means of

which you complain no individual now in your hands is in the remotest degree responsible. Having the question as to whether it is exactly consistent in a Government which professes to be the Champion of Universal Philanthropy, to insist upon a service which it believes involves the loss of human life for the sake of a few hundred dollars worth of shot and shell, we claim the right to say that this order involves the grossest possible breach of the tacit understanding under which every soldier surrenders his sword to a civilized foe. It is our misfortune to be in the power of your Government. Of its generosity we ask nothing. Of its sense of justice we have demanded that it should redeem the implied pledge under which we surrendered. That demand having been refused it only remains for us to comply with what under the circumstances are at once the mandates of duty and the dictates of necessity in sharing with our fellow captives the peril (if any) of this service; leaving it to our brethren in arms to remember in the future, this new interpretation of the laws of war and to enlightened men every where to visit with the penalties of their just indignation the power which so magnanimously enforces its decrees upon a few unarmed and defenceless men.

I live 3 miles from Berryville, Carroll Co. Ark., I have lived in that County nearly 24 years, I have been a member of the Lower House of the Arkansas State Legislature since the year 1854.

I am now an incumbent of the position and will be until Nov. of the present year, I was a member of the House when it passed a bill calling a Convention of the people to take into consideration the general question of the secession of the State from the Federal Union. I voted against the bill calling a convention and my motive was to prevent the State seceding. Since the State seceded I have acted with the secession party and continued to do so up to the time of my arrest. I now claim to be what is called a secessionist, though in the first instance I acted with the Union party. At last accounts I had two

2 sons in the Southern Army.

They were so badly scared, I could not understand what they said, until they got off about 20 or 25 yards, when they said we had been the cause of the damned Geds taking them; and to come back there and they would blow us to hell. That they did not intend to be troubled by a parcel of God damned rebels any more, we had had them taken once, and by God we never would again. They then went off in a trot.

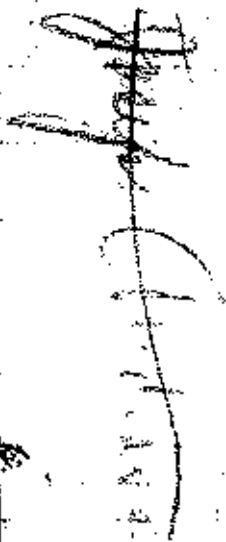

I most respectfully appeal to your clemency, - for an examination of my case and refer you to the following facts, - I held the position of secretary to the Board of Police of the City of Washington from its organization to its disbandment, and was by order of my holding same, created by the United States Authorities on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of October 1861, and continued in office by Mr. McHenry and Warren until the 21<sup>st</sup> of October 1862 when I was removed by order of the President of the United States, the substance of which was that "I would give no aid or comfort to the enemies of the Government in the United States." Thus Sir I have religiously observed your gift of an agent, and remain a peaceable truly "free" citizen, than standing in the shade, the enemies of the Government are not, but working to spread the decay, the other fabric of which I was ~~the~~ easily convinced was of a "rotten" nature, from the decay by the Commission for Warren of some time, was not a true examination by the President and people, an agent from another Christian to give information to the President, Mr. McHenry, Mr. Warren, I was a true and faithful agent of my employers, will I know them as farmers and the people, I am a true and faithful citizen of the City of Washington.

32 I respectfully refer you to the report in regard to my arrest, the contents of which I am not aware of. On Saturday the 18<sup>th</sup> day of October I left Baltimore (and which by the by was 4 days after the draft was made) to visit a friend in Charles Co. to which County I have been in the habit of going every fall for the past 5 years, to spend a couple of weeks, and was going home to Baltimore, crossing the Annapolis river from Charles to St. Mary's Co. to get the stage at Chaptico for Washington, to go from there by the Car. Home, at or about 12 o'clock in the morning, when I was taken up by the Gunboat Detachment. The two men I employed to bring me over on this side, and whom I would like see now, as to where my destination was, and where I might have taken me to, I am ever willing to swear upon the Holy Evangelist of Almighty God that I have never in word or deed violated my parole. Knowing you Sir (by reputation) as a gentleman who would not confirm a prisoner one moment after being released on his parole, I again respectfully appeal to your humanity as a Christian and a gentleman to give me an examination, which I know will restore me to my wife & child.

There is a young man now imprisoned at the old Capital Prison under the following circumstances: Some two weeks since while crossing the mouth of the Wicomico river from "Charles" to "St Marys" in Maryland he was captured by the Potomac Flotilla. He had the day before crossed the Potomac from Virginia to Maryland. He was sent by Capt McGaw of the Potomac Flotilla to this city and by the Provost Marshall sent to prison. The Provost Marshal has already issued an order for his release upon taking the oath of allegiance and giving bonds in the sum of \$1000 to keep it. He has no objection to giving the bonds but has to taking the oath, and I believe his objections are worthy of consideration. He has property in the South in the State of Alabama where he has been residing, and which if he were to take the oath required, would be confiscated there. He is a Native of the State of Maryland

and was on his way to his father's in  
that State under the following circumstances:  
His father is a very old man and  
quite infirm and alone, (save two  
little boys who are dependant on his care)  
and a widower, his father's <sup>wife</sup> being  
dead. It was his object to go and remain  
with him and assist him in his old  
age, and see his sister who is quite  
sick residing near there and married.  
He was not engaged in carrying good  
or unlawful correspondence and was  
in no way connected with the rebels  
beyond residing there. He has never <sup>been</sup>  
in the rebel army or Navy and was  
intending to remain with his father  
who, I know, actually needs him  
to attend to his affairs and assist  
him in his old age. He is willing to  
give any kind of security to warrant  
himself as a loyal citizen and report  
to you or any one you may desig-  
nate at such times and place  
as you may require, and I will  
cheerfully guarantee to be personally  
or pecuniarily responsible in his be-  
half for his conduct while discharged.  
I desire also to say that I take this

active part on account of my relation  
to some of his friends and a belief of  
the truth of all I here state. I do not  
believe the government would suffer by  
granting this request, and certainly  
would not ask it did I not believe

To the Provost Marshal of the Capitol Prison  
Sir!

Excuse me for this intrusion upon you, my present situation compells me of addressing to you the following Note. On Monday last the 4th of Nov. I went out ducking on the Virginia Patomac shore in Prince William County with a young man. I shot a few ducks in the swamps close to the Patomac. To secure the game I took an old scow without oars and tried to head the boat on the shore. At the time a severe storm was raging which drifted us in to the Patomac. I was exposed to the mercy of <sup>the</sup> waves from morning 8 ockl. untill 2 ockl. P.M. and afterwards picket up by the United States Gunboat Freeborn near the Maryland shore. I was searched but there was <sup>nothing</sup> found on my person except five Dollars which is a clear and sufficient proof, that with such a small amount of money I did not try to run the Blockade. You therefore can see that there is no charge against me of keeping me in confinement, deprived of most all necessaries such as food &c. and have no means of procuring such. I have not violated any laws of War, nor have I ever taken up arms against the United States. I have kept a neutral position, and have not taken any interest whatever in this War. I am not a Citizen of the United States, nor the so called

Confederate States. I am still claiming the protection under  
the flag of my native Country, which Minister is residing  
in this City. Therefore Sir, I appeal to you in the name  
of justice, and a just God, in the Land of Liberty,  
to release me from this imprisonment, it almost breaks  
my heart to think that I have been taken in such  
innocent way, away from my wife and children, which  
have to depend on their father for a support.  
I have no doubt that my family <sup>inquire</sup> ~~lose~~ already the loss  
of their father and husband, they may think that  
I have found a water <sup>grave</sup> or of some other accident  
by which I have lost my life. I am now at your  
mercy, and it is in your power to relieve a distressed  
and grieving family from starvation and death,  
by returning to them their father and provider for  
their necessaries of life. I am willing to take the oath  
not to aid and abett the enemy, and that I will  
not take up arms against the United States,  
provided I am released from custody, and permitted  
to return to my family.

I have notice from Mangana from the Prefect of the County of Valencia informing the Prefect of said County, that an Express has been received from Don Ilino Gonzales of the County of Miguel asking assistance. This gentleman pursuing the Indians, says that they have run off nearly forty thousand head of sheep and about one thousand head of Cattle. They say that among them is my share and the share of several other partners. The herd of Don Jose Amigo de Cortisca which was in the Sierra Grande. I believe if we be active they will ~~not~~ be able to carry off their booty. Don Ilino says they come (that being the direction they have taken) to pass out at the point of the Sierra de la Gallina. They will have to come very slowly, watching their booty without fear of being overtaken and punished. The force of the Indians is large, and where Don Ilino was, he says are 200, and that they travel with the stock divided in many herds. Don Ilino did deem it prudent to attack them seeing the large force of the Indians from a distance and

having but few men with him. We would not risk a battle  
but sent for assistance to Mangana and Bosque Redonda  
and according to this information. Security men were dis-  
patched to his assistance. I believe if the assistance  
asked for be granted. They will carry off nothing. I  
am confident that you will do all in your power to help  
us. and the Justices of Lapoya. and La Joyita do all  
in their power to raise the people to oppose them. Here  
we are starting out also. and I am doing all in my  
power. with nothing more I remain

Ambrose Parks, being  
sworn, says:

That he is well acquaint-  
ed with Mr. Somers; and has never  
heard him make use of any disloyal  
language against the Government,  
or its citizens; or known him to be guilt-  
ty of any disloyal acts.

W. G. Shaw, being sworn, says:  
That he is acquainted with Mr. Somers;  
and has known him about three (3)  
years. About the 30th of December,  
last, (1862) witness met him (Somers)  
on the public square, in Dresden, Tenn.  
and heard him make some remarks  
about Union men. He (Somers) wished  
that they (referring to the Rebels) had  
taken every one of them; (the Union men)  
and every thing they had; and had  
burnt all their houses, and them on  
top of them. Witness also heard him  
say: "Where would all our negroes have  
been, if our friends [the Rebels] had  
not come to protect them? Damn them,  
[the Union men] they have got six (6)



of mine now." (2) Witness paid no attention as to whom Mr. Somers was talking with, at the time of the conversation here referred to; and he (Somers) appeared to be intoxicated at the time.

A. C. Brassfield, being sworn, says:  
That he is acquainted with Mr. Somers. Witness has no recollection of having him (Somers) use any disloyal language against the Government. He (witness) has never known Mr. Somers to give any aid or comfort to, or in any way assist, the enemies of the Government. Witness considers him a good and peaceable citizen, as far as he knows.

William Boswell, being sworn, says:  
That he is acquainted with Mr. Somers. Witness heard him say, that he did not believe a Union man should be allowed to own a negro, in that country. He heard him say further, that he did not believe a God-damned Union man should be allowed to own a negro in that country; for their object was to free them. When witness heard him use this language, there were other parties present. This conversation occurred at Dresden, Tenn. on the evening that Forrest's command left that place. —

Forrest's command remained at Dresden, (Tenn.) from Friday until Monday. Witness thinks, that this conversation occurred immediately after their raid on the Mobile and Ohio Railroad. He (Witness) does not know of any Confederate soldiers, having been at Mr. Somers' house, at that time. He does not know of Mr. Somers' having given aid or comfort to the enemy at ~~that time~~, any time. Witness does not know, that Mr. Somers has been active, in trying to disturb or injure Union men.

Leroy Collins, being sworn, says; That he has been acquainted with Mr. Somers about six (6) months; and knows him when he sees him. Witness met Mr. Somers on the street in Dresden, Tenn. immediately after Forrest left Dresden, in the month of December, to the best of his recollection. Witness spoke to Mr. Somers, and called him by ~~his~~ name, when he (Somers) said: "Every body knows me"; when witness answered: "Yes, Mr. Somers, you are a very noted man". Somers replied: "By God, I know you", and then turned from witness, and said, he wished they (referring to Forrest's men) had taken every damned Union man, and every

thing they had; and had burned their houses, and them on the top of them; and said further: "The God-damned rascals (referring to the Union men) have stole six (6) of my negroes now." This conversation occurred immediately after Forrest left Dresden. Witness does not know where the residence of Mr. Somers is. This conversation took place in the town of Dresden, Meakley Co. Tenn. Witness himself resides in Dresden. Witness does not know where the residence of Mr. Somers is. This conversation took place in the town of Dresden, Meakley County, Tennessee. Witness does not know of Mr. Somers' having given any aid or comfort to the enemy - only what has been related here by him. All this occurred since June 30th, 1862. Witness states further, that this is the first conversation he ever had with Mr. Somers - except speaking to him, when he met with him.

Evidence on the part of the Defendant

William Blacknall, being sworn,  
says:

That he is acquainted with Mr. Somers; and has been about

twenty (20) years. Somers has treated Union men, well, as far as he (witness) knows, in his (Somers) general dealings and conversation. Witness has never noticed any difference in his general conduct toward Union men or others, since the present Rebellion. Witness says that, as far as he knows, Mr. Somers is not regarded as a bad or dangerous man in his <sup>own</sup> neighborhood. And further, that a majority of the citizens of his (Somers) neighborhood are Union men. Witness has no idea, that the neighbors of Mr. Somers have any fears of him, on account of his disloyalty. Since Mr. Somers took the oath, witness says that he (Somers) has had nothing to say, in conversation with witness, in reference to the present Rebellion.

James Simmons, being sworn, says: That he has been acquainted with Mr. Somers ever since the year 1845. Witness has had several conversations with him (Somers) since he took the oath; and has never heard him use any disloyal language. Witness had a lot of whiskey about August last; and took six (6) barrels of it to the house of Mr. Somers, to keep it from being captured by the rebels.

Somers said, in a conversation with witness, about the last of December, (1862) that he (Somers) was himself a conservative man; and in favor of the constitution, and of carrying out the constitution. About that time, Somers had five (5) negroes to run away; and three (3) days afterwards, the whiskey referred to, was captured at Mr. Somers' house, as belonging to him (Somers) by our Federal troops. Witness believes Mr. Somers to be a good neighbor and peaceable citizen. He (witness) lives about four (4) miles from him. Witness states, that on the 30th of December, 1862, he (witness), and Mr. Somers, and others, were engaged in a general spree in the town of Doedden.

J. S. Vincent, being sworn, says:  
That he has known Mr. Somers about twenty-five (25) years. Witness says; that the general character of Mr. Somers, in his (Somers) neighborhood, since June, 1862, has been that of a loyal man. Witness knows that Mr. Somers subscribed something for the support of the Federal soldiers' wives and families, sometime last fall. Witness says, that he (witness)

has heard a conversation, among parties in Dresden, in reference to the disloyal language used by Mr. Somers. Witness was in Dresden on the 30th of December last; but did not hear Mr. Somers use any disloyal language on that day. Witness has not heard him (Somers) make use of any disloyal language, since June, 1862. He (Witness) does not know of his (Somers') having assisted the South in any way.

W. M. Hornbeak, being sworn, says:  
 That he has been acquainted with Mr. Somers for fifteen (15) or twenty (20) years. Witness has had frequent conversations with Mr. Somers; and has never heard him make use of any disloyal language. Witness says that his (Somers') general reputation as a citizen is good. Witness thinks that the Union men of the neighborhood have no fears of Mr. Somers' damaging them in any way.

Col. John A. Rodgers, being sworn, says:  
 That he knows Mr. Somers very well, living not far from him; and that he (Somers), since he has taken the oath, has been an unusually quiet man, to the best of his knowledge. Witness thinks that the Union men, a majority

of them, in his (Somers') neighborhood, have no fears of his (Somers') doing them any injury. Witness thinks that Mr. Somers, when intoxicated, says things that he would not put into execution, when either drunk or sober. Witness has known of ~~many~~ Mr. Somers' loaning Union men money.

I certify the foregoing to be a true copy of the testimony in the case of the United States against George Somers, charged with having violated his Oath of Allegiance to the Government of the United States, as taken down from the witnesses testifying in the

I have the honor to state for the information of the General Commanding that on the 31<sup>o</sup> ult. I issued to Jaramillo & Son, ten days rations, they were discharged by order of the Commanding officer on the 1<sup>o</sup> of Feby, he intimated to me at the same time that their discharge would take effect from the 31<sup>o</sup> ult.

It is customary in the Army to issue Rations, the day previous to which they are due, the reason for said proceeding is, that it is an utter impossibility to issue Rations on the day which they are due, in time for the troops to Cook Breakfast. — More Custom and usage are Equivalent to "Regulations"

The Commanding officer refuses to sign the Return for the issue above mentioned, now I would respectfully state in relation to Express Carriers, that it is customary to give them the necessary rations the day previous to their starting on Express, and I am not knowing that Jaramillo & Son would be discharged on the 31<sup>o</sup> not having the necessary information

until the morning of the 1<sup>st</sup> of Feby 1863.  
hence the Error in issuing to said parties,  
(if Error there be.)—

I do not write this Com-  
-munication, with any other motive, than that  
of having a sure basis established, <sup>which</sup> under  
I can safely discharge my duties.—

At the instance of Mr C L Stanchiff I state from personal  
recollection; my understanding of a matter of business between  
Charles Junot and Jno C Gunn.

I drew a paper at the instance of the parties, in which  
it was endeavored to recite the agreement of the  
parties, but parties were present assenting to its  
terms:

My understanding of the arrangement as now well  
- stated is that C. Junot had arrested a runaway  
negro boy, and had taken him before a Justice  
of the peace, and the Justice had ordered his  
commitment to the Jail of the County.

But the Jailor said the Jail was quite  
or completely full; and he would have to place  
the boy in a private pen in the City. But if  
Gunn would pay to him the New Orleans  
Law for taking up a Runaway, he would  
be would commit the boy to the keeping  
of Gunn; and assign to him his Fee, and  
Gunn could collect it after the war, and  
reimburse himself with the amount he  
then paid to Junot; the exact amount  
is not now recollected but it is stated  
in a paper in the possession of Gunn, it  
was I think either \$20.00 or \$30.00

Brig Genl Boyle - Sir - In justice to Mr Junot who  
is now confined in the Military Prison I will give  
a statement of the transaction for which he has been  
arrested. Sometime last fall, I think in Oct, Mr Junot  
arrested and brought before me a negro boy (according  
to an order issued by the Mayor, for all Policemen  
to bring before committing, all unmanly negroes, to the  
Chief of Police) for examination. The negro unhesita-  
-tingly told me that he belonged to Mr Jack Gunn  
of Clarksville Tenn, and that he was brought here  
by a Soldier & left with Dr Gunn. Before the  
interview was closed Dr Gunn appeared in the  
office and stated to me, that the boy belonged to him  
and that he had bought him of a Soldier or  
Sutler for the sum of fifteen dollars, when Junot  
asked Dr Gunn if he (Gunn) had not told him  
that he had paid two hundred dollars for the  
negro, Gunn said No, where upon Junot gave him the  
lie, when I interposed and told Mr Junot if he could  
commit the boy according to Law, to do so, He  
immediately went before Justice Clement & obtained  
a Writimus and presented the boy regularly to the  
Sailor, the Jail being full he was refused admittance.  
As I afterwards learned Gunn & Junot made an  
arrangement, which was reduced to writing by an  
Attorney to whom they applied, by which Gunn retained  
possession of the negro paying Junot the reward for  
taking up the negro & agreeing to hold him subject to

Yesterday, Henry Logan alias Funk was arrested on charge of being a spy in the service of the Confederate States, and from careful inquiry into the case I believe there is good cause for the suspicion, if however it cannot be substantiated it is better to remove so dangerous a character from this vicinity.

Logan, as he is generally known, says that he belonged to Ashby's than to Stuart's Rebel Cavalry, & was with them nearly 16 months, was with Stuart when he made his raid into Pennsylvania, but claims that he deserted in the South Mountain and did not go back South afterwards, he says that he took his horse to Baltimore. Here sold it, and then went to Chambersburg, was arrested, being recognised as with Stuart and confined sometime in jail from which he was released on taking an oath of allegiance, he has no papers to prove this, and altogether his story is improbable. He has been recognised as a Logan or Funk, being known by both names, by several very respectable gentlemen, among whom are Gen John

Stewart, and his son D. A. Stewart Esq, Agents of the Penn<sup>a</sup> R.R. W. Hammett, also a clerk of the same road identifies the man as a Logan from Waynesborough, Franklin County, Pa, and says that the brother or cousin, perhaps his brothers or cousins beside this man were reported to be in the rebel service. One of them is generally understood to have been a guide to Gen Stewart. Logan, on interrogating him on this point, says another man named Wilson was the guide. I am particular in giving you his story, and respectfully refer the case to you for further action. I have consulted with Capt H. B. Hoop, 6<sup>th</sup> Cavalry, Mustering Officer here, and he thinks from all the facts in this case that the man should be sent to you, to be sent to Gen Schenck at Baltimore if you deem it advisable to do so.

Lieut Gross, in charge of a squad of stragglers, will report to you with Logan in his charge, and perhaps can give further information in the case.

General,

I have to report that Ramon Puchero of whom you requested me to collect some notes is not at present in Tucson. He went to California some time ago for good, but is expected back before the end of this month.

A Mexican came to town today who reports that there are two thousand Apaches, including men women & children, at present at Fronteras, in Sonora. This appears like a tale for the morning, but there is some truth in it. He says they ask for peace, that Gen Resgueria has gone to meet them to impose terms & make a treaty.

It is pretty well ascertained that Resgueria went with a force of about 750 men & in the direction of Fronteras. The Apaches invariably go to Sonora for peace when hard pushed here & vice versa. Now would be the time to chastise those Semuclites on their return if the rumors be true. I shall endeavor to ascertain what there is in it.

General,

I have the honor to report that in accordance with your verbal instructions, previous to my leaving for Chihuahua to make, if practicable, arrangements to obtain intelligence of military movements of Texans towards New Mexico and Arizona, that I endeavored to carry out your order, in the following manner. - Feeling my way cautiously I commenced at El Paso to make inquiries regarding the status and political sentiments of Americans residing in Chihuahua. Mr Reuben W. Creel, a native of Kentucky - a merchant in Chihuahua was highly spoken of in El Paso by gentlemen entitled to confidence as a true loyal American, also Charles Hovey Esq, a native of Hamburg & a Naturalized American & Mr Henry Miller, but the latter gentleman was not in the country. - Dr David R. Duffendoufer of El Paso gave me a letter of introduction to Mr. Hovey which insured me a princely reception from this most hospitable gentleman and worthy American. On my arrival Mr. Creel called upon me and I was soon convinced he is a sound, enthusiastic loyal citizen unwavering in his devotion to the Union. He was the only active American resident who called during my stay in the city - a fair index to the political sentiments of the few others residing there. Mr. Creel assured

One that it was impracticable to obtain intelligence political or military - from Texas, through the medium of correspondence between merchants & business men residing in Texas and Chihuahua. The systems of repression and espionage being so complete in Texas, that no one dares allude in letters to the forbidden topics, all letters going through the mails are opened and death is the penalty for alluding to the condition of public affairs. I soon found no one will risk the lives of their correspondents living in Texas by writing on those subjects of intense interest to all. I therefore wrote a note (copy herewith) to each of the American Consuls at Monterey and Matamoros, having been satisfied of their loyalty - asking them to assist in obtaining & forwarding the desired information. I appointed Mr. Freel Confidential Agent of the Military authorities of the Dept. of New Mexico. He undertook very readily and cheerfully to make every effort to gain intelligence by correspondence with the Consuls, named above, and with merchants & others in whom he has confidence at Monterey, Matamoros &c. Mr. Freel addressed a note to each of the Consuls previous to my leaving. I have every confidence he will spare no effort to obtain and forward reliable information. He has lived about 10 years in Chihuahua, is highly respected by all, and will ascertain from other residents such intelligence as they may receive every mail in their private correspondence, on the subjects in question. I respectfully recommend that he be paid a

salary such as the Comd<sup>g</sup>. General may deem equitable. He asked for now and will serve his Country cheerfully gratis, but he has been unfortunate in business and has a large family to support, and "the laborer is worthy of his hire." Some respectable german gentlemen who sympathize with our cause, and other persons of distinguished position have promised and will aid Dr. Freck in gaining intelligence. These gentlemen receive correspondence from Monterrey & Matamoros every mail, and the condition of Texian affairs are pretty well known at those points for fugitives arrive there almost daily from Texas. The States of Coahuila & Nuevo Leon - particularly the latter - have large numbers of "Union" families who escaped residing in them. A conversation with people from Presidio del Norte who have been over to Texas to the Limpies Fort Davis, Puerco, & to a salt lake recently discovered about two days travel from the Puerco above the El Paso, & between the Missouri & San Antonio road. I was assured that no force of the enemy was in that neighborhood or suspected to be, a Mexican (St. Santiago Ramirez) of Del Norte offered to advise Mr. Charles Mays of any Texian troops coming this way. Ramirez is a very respectable man, and will act as guide to our troops if required as he knows all the trails, roads &c in that section of Country. During my stay in Chihuahua a Texian deserter arrived there, whom I brought with me. He was forced into the service as a conscript. He says

He was born in Rochester, his name James Hoffman.  
 further that he was placed on Extra-duty in the 2<sup>d</sup> Regt  
 United Copt. Merritt, Chief St. Master of the Dept. of Texa,  
 at San Antonio that being sent as Express messenger to  
 Fort Duncan Eagle pas, with letter for Capt. Donnellon  
 Comdr officer, he escaped to Mexico. He left San Antonio  
 on the 23<sup>d</sup> December and Escaped on the 28<sup>th</sup>. He states  
 that General Taylor was then in San Antonio and had  
 five to six thousand troops (the only force there) in and  
 around San Antonio; that it was said he had orders  
 to march upon New Mexico, but that he heard from  
 Capt. Donnellon at Fort Duncan that Taylor's orders  
 had subsequently been countermanded and that he was  
 ordered to march to the gulf (Corpus Christi Hoffman  
 man thinks) with his command. He represents sub-  
 sistence as very scarce and dear at San Antonio  
 Flour 20. per lb. Corn \$5.00 per bushel coffee \$3.60 \$4.  
 per lb. Beef abundant @ 5 cents per lb. Domestic  
 \$1.50 \$1.50 per yard - ragged boots \$20 per pair and  
 extremely scarce. He states that (nearly) all sub-  
 sistence for Texas troops has been drawn last year  
 from Mexico: this is so, as is well known in Chi-  
 huahua, and to such an extent have New Leon  
 and Coahuila been drained that Gov. Vidauri  
 has prohibited, under severe penalties, the exporta-  
 tion of any more breadstuffs &c from those states.  
 The export of shoes even is prohibited. Hoffman  
 gives the following as the Forts in Texas which he  
 knows are garrisoned, viz San Antonio & vicinity -

and part of Yaeger's Battalion of Cavalry.

Fort Clark two Companies - Further in this  
direction he is not aware of any troops, & heard  
nothing of such being near.

At Galveston there was a considerable force  
under Genl. Hibert he says, and further that it  
was reported that Genl. Magruder had arrived at  
Galveston - a "Contraband" who escaped from  
Fort Brown last July corroborates the above  
in many particulars. This negro was slave to  
Dr. Canale the Surgeon at Ft. Brown, and he  
states that desertions were very numerous from  
that place - a whole company having left at  
once, that three or four companies deserted dur-  
ing the last few months. Most of them were sent  
to New York, by Dr. Pierce American Consul at

Matamoros. This negro represents the officers as very dissipated and demoralized, and in great anxiety about an attack from Federal forces ascending the river, and that the most of the troops are Mexicans (Native Texans); that the inhabitants of Brownsville are looked upon by the Garrison as "Unionists". I shall bring the negro and Hoffman to you in order that you may interrogate them on these subjects. Lieut. Baldwin Hayes, C. knows some of Hoffman's relatives in Rochester as very respectable people and I believe his statement and those of the negro are worth of credence.

I delayed a few days in Chihuahua for further news from the Rio Grande, as I hoped some of the merchants would hear from their correspondents at Matamoros, Monterey about matters of moment as the week I arrived a gentleman received a note from a respectable correspondent stating that several federal officers were then (Dec. 22<sup>d</sup>.) in Matamoros making arrangements about supplies for a federal force expected, and further stated that there were 4000 federal troops at the Brazos Santiago. The last mail brought no news on this subject.

In regard to supplies and resources of Chihuahua and Durango for a military force moving on Texas from this quarter, and whether avenues and means of transportation are available to this end, I fear that we cannot rely with much certainty upon

either. The prohibition of exportation of breadstuffs  
to from Chihuahua. Never saw arise from the  
scarcity of those articles, as before stated on ac-  
count of the great demand for them in Texas. In  
Durango we can expect nothing. It is too poor  
and too distant. In Chihuahua there are  
about four Rancheros who own each about 2000  
head of steers or bullocks; two of those - Don Luis  
Serrano & Don Pedro Zuloaga will sell their  
cattle for \$20 a head on the ranches near Chihuahua.  
The same parties own about 50000 sheep which they  
ask \$2 to \$2 1/2 each for. The weather has been  
unfavorably dry for crops for the last three seasons,  
and cereals are scarcer and dearer than usual  
in consequence in the Southern part of the State.  
In the city of Chihuahua Flour unbolted costs now  
\$12 per carga. Usual price \$7. Beans, scarce, \$9 per  
fanega (of 100 lbs.) Wheat \$12 per carga of 200 lbs. Usual  
price \$2 to \$2 1/2 per fanega of 100 lbs. Wheat promises  
well this year & it is harvested in the beginning of May.  
Two trains loaded with grain & flour left Chihuahua  
for Monterey the week before I left so that but little  
dependance can be placed upon a large supply from  
that point at reasonable figures. The mercantile  
house of Gustavo <sup>de</sup> ~~de~~ <sup>Herrmann</sup> ~~de~~ offered to furnish such sup-  
plies as we require at market prices at any time, and  
they believe that large quantities of subsistence & grain  
are stored in Chihuahua. To ascertain the condition  
of the markets in Chihuahua is not easy for a stranger.

There is only one flour mill in Chihuahua city, and that will not grind over 300 lbs a day. The <sup>great</sup> grain growing districts in the State are as follows:

Wheat: San Jeronimo, San Miguel, Dolores, San Pablo, Santa Cruz, Santa Rosalia

Corn: Santa Isabel, where leagues & leagues are planted, but corn grows also in the wheat districts.

at Guadalupe and San Ignacio on the Rio Grande I am assured that about 7000 fanegas of grain can be found and at \$3 per fanega for corn. Meyer & Brother will furnish supplies, taking treasury notes at their market value in New York; they can be relied on as every thing required in the way of respectability, credit, and capital. There is much less grain grown for the last two or three years than usual in Chihuahua in the South, on account of the demand for cotton, which is raised extensively at Santa Rosalia and manufactured into Maanta at the factory of Dalamanta. Cotton grows from San Rosario to Parra in Chihuahua, and even at Presidio del Norte & along the Conchos river it is beginning to attract attention. It yields enormous profit to the farmer & manufacturer. At El Paso there is some considerable grain, and at Carrizal there is also probably 500 fanegas. In the valley of Carrizal 2000 fanegas could be grown annually. The soil infertile, extensive and abandoned of water for irrigation. Means of transportation can be had in Chihuahua very readily. There is a distance of 70

leagues between Chihuahua city and the Presidio del Norte, and freight cost, 12 cents. The road is good as the average in the state, and this will give an idea of the freight to any part of the state. There is a large tract of valuable fertile land at Presidio del Norte, and about 3000 acres at Leston's fort on the opposite side, all well irrigated. General Merino owns a large tract of land above Presidio del Norte extending 8 leagues from the Conchos to the Rio Grande. The valley of San Buenaventura about 100 miles S.W. of Chihuahua is extensive and fertile yields large crops of grain. There is a population of about 3000. The distance from Mesilla via El Paso and El Medano is 259.82 miles, as measured by my odometer; but I fear that the instrument was not in good order en route to Chihuahua & that this will fall short of the real distance: via Guadalupe & San Elizario returning the distance measured 302.40 miles.

I may here state in conclusion that the entire distance from El Paso to Chihuahua except the first 20 miles, or so, the country is capable of supporting immense herds of cattle. The grass is excellent. This valley extending from Samalaguera to Chihuahua is mostly owned by one Man-Don Martiney del Rio - a resident of the city of Mexico.

with the exception of a few head of stock owned at Carrizal & about 2000 head of cattle & sheep & the number of about 30000 owned by Ferraz & Miller there is not a hoof of stock on this great valley when formerly they were innumerable. The only settlements on the route are Laguna a small poor village of about 300 inhabitants, Encinavilla, a Hacienda, and El Sanyo a ranch where the Governor has a few peas, living and Sacramento containing 200 or thereabouts: from the latter place to Chihuahua there are 3 or 4 ranches.

Chihuahua is a neat, clean city of about 10000 inhabitants. Its police is excellent & good order & cleanliness are characteristic of it. Very little cultivation in its vicinity. The nearest San Jeronimo, to any extent - about 6 leagues distant -

Many secessionists from California have made their way in small parties to Texas through Chihuahua. Wilson the Captain of Showalter's party and 300 or more of his band with Ganey late of Jackson & about 100 more of the same brood were in Chihuahua when I arrived. Don Showalter, David Donfers, late Secy. of State of California & some 7 or 8 more passed 2 months previous. I was told at Guadalupe that between 50 and 60 Californians passed en route for Texas through that place on the 5th or 6th inst.

Sir,

I have the honor to report that I visited Freguel, having left here on the 6<sup>th</sup> and returned on the 11<sup>th</sup> inst. I found the above place to be a mining population of 27 Mexican families numbering about 250. They are chiefly employed by a Mexican, Francisco Padres, reducing silver ore from the Cabate mines, owned by Padres, James Skelstead and C. J. F. Saeger. They have seven arrastras of their own at work, and three more, altogether, 25 in use; the most of the balance reducing ore on shares for the above parties. There are 20 arrastras not in use at present. There is another mine at Cabate owned and worked by some Mexicans, in which Skelstead has an interest. The Padres mine yields 12 marks to the Bull (of gold) the other mines somewhat less. The Cabate mountain is supposed to contain many silver veins. There is another mine called La Mina Prieta four and a



half mile south of Tregual in the Baboquiviri range, which yields 12 ounces of silver to the "Bulto". It requires machinery to make it profitable and is not worked at present. Tregual is situated on a mesa on the bank of an arroyo with permanent water (in dry season found by digging wells) in abundance. It is about 1 mile from the Picoacho of Baboquiviri. There is a large valley to the west, say 8 to 10 miles wide and perhaps 100 miles long, covered with fine grass. Mezquite, Palo Verde, Palo Fierro, Hediondilla, Lagunas, Bismaga, Yuca &c. The grass is bare ~~the~~ within two miles of the Tregual. There is a rancharia of Papagos of perhaps 400 souls (at least bodies). They have 43 Cacales, about 300 horses, and an equal number of cattle, principally mulch cows.

The road is good the entire distance. There is no water on route except at San Xavier and Coyote Springs, at the latter place there is a small spring up a cañon 1900 yds from the road where is permanent, there is another about 600 yds off the road in the Sierra, but it is of little consequence being almost dry. There is good grass the entire distance. There is at present a Papago Rancharia at Coyote Springs of about 250 Indians, having about 150 horses, which is all that can be watered at the spring.

Freznal is a quiet industrious population. I desired to see the Local Judge Andrés Granillo, to instruct the people in his presence that his authority must be obeyed, but he was gone to Cababi, for several days. My animals & time would not permit me to go there, nor wait for his return. Padua and Skalstad were also absent. Major J. Cummings also accompanied me to arrest any objection he could

find, and to look for parties for which requisitions  
have been made by the Governor of Iowa, but we  
could find none, nor any that had been ordered arrested  
by Genl West, on previous occasions, we took no military  
escort, three citizens having accompanied us

I certify that the above is a true statement made before me.

1 George Henry has no account on the Books of  
this Institution, and no demand has ever been made  
by him for any balance he may be entitled to claim in  
right of Margaret Dunn, now, as it is said, the wife  
of said Henry, as to which fact the respondent has no  
knowledge, nor had he any information thereon until  
after the proceedings in this case were commenced,  
when, in reply to his note to D. W. Smith, Clerk of this  
Court, he was, for the first time, informed, that the  
said George Henry claimed to be the husband of Mar-  
garet Dunn, and was suing for the balance due her.

2 It appears from the Books of the Institution  
that one Margaret Dunn, who is personally unknown  
to the respondent, has a balance due her, on the 1<sup>st</sup> July  
instant, of One hundred and ten <sup>56</sup>/<sub>100</sub> Dollars, the  
amount due her at the commencement of these pro-  
ceedings having been increased by the sum of 1.62  
on the 1 July for interest accrued between the 1 Janu-  
ary last and 1 July, at the rate of 3 per cent,  
and now added to the principal carrying interest  
at that rate. This balance the Institution  
is prepared to pay on demand in Virginia Bank  
Notes to the Check of the Depositor or her husband  
upon the production and surrender of the Book of Deposit.

About three months since a person represen-  
ting herself to be Margaret Dunn (not stating  
that she had been married) called at the office  
and demanded the amount to her credit, in Gold, which,  
as she said, she had deposited, but, before leaving,  
offered to take U. S. Treasury Notes. This was  
refused.



refused as the Institution has no such Funds, and has always received debts due it, and paid demands upon it, in the Currency of the State, and could not, in justice to the other Depositors, pay in any other funds. At this time nearly all its discontinued paper is lying over, and its other investments unsaleable, and producing scarcely any dividend.

3 The Institution since 1861 has not been authorized to compel the payment of any debts due it in any other Currency, and for the last 12 months the Courts have been suspended, but notwithstanding, it has reduced the claims of its Depositors, since February, 1861, \$286,361<sup>37</sup>, leaving now due to Depositors \$250,184<sup>21</sup>.

Some months since one of the Depositors demanded payment in U.S. Currency, but it was decided by the then Provost Judge, Col. Sanders, with the full approval, as was stated, of Gen Viele, that a sound policy and justice to the other Depositors required a rejection of the demand, which was thereupon withdrawn. If this policy is to be changed, this Institution will, in justice to its other Depositors, be compelled to go into liquidation, thereby causing much inconvenience and suffering to an already overburdened Community. The confidence hitherto manifested towards it has enabled it, for Twenty Seven Years, to maintain itself under many trying vicissitudes, and to confer signal benefit upon this Community, and all it asks is forbearance and a continuance of that confidence which it has always sought to merit, and has

thus far enjoyed, to enable it to weather  
successfully its present trials.

A The Books of the Institution do  
not show that Margaret Quinn made a  
deposit in Gold, but at the time of her  
only deposit (in January, 1861) of One  
hundred dollars, Virginia Bank Notes  
were as current as Gold, and no profit  
was, or could be, made of the Gold.

5 This Institution hopes that the policy  
adopted by the late Provost Judge will not  
now be changed. The prescribed limits  
of this answer will not allow a full presen-  
tation of all the reasons which could be  
urged why it should not be, although it  
is hoped it will not be necessary to say more.

Statement of Mrs Rebecca Brand.

I am the wife of Horace Brand, Colonel in the Southern Army. I believe he is with Genl Price. I live in Booneville Mo. - My husband has been in service from the commencement of the Rebellion, he was ill for eight months and is now recovering. He was home one year ago last January. - I have never been south to see him. - I received a letter from him three or four weeks ago. it was written at Richmond Va. and was mailed in Illinois and came through the P.O. - I answered that letter at the time of its receipt, I sent it by a gentleman unknown to myself, who was going south. - I do not know his name. - I came here from Booneville about the first of April, and am visiting my Aunt Mrs Johnson. - I have not been out of the City since that time. - I am a Southern lady in every particular, it is perfectly natural for me to sympathize with the cause, to which my husband is devoted, and I most certainly do so. - I would probably sympathize with the South even were my husband not with them, but I can not be positive. - I can not say that I wish ~~to~~ to see the Rebellion crushed. - but I would like to see the Government restored to its former standing. - I do not and can

not rejoice at the defeat of the Federal forces, where so much sorrow and sadness follows a defeat of either Army. I can not rejoice.

If writing to my husband, and receiving letters from him, constitutes disloyalty, then am I disloyal, but by no other act have I shown myself disloyal. My aunt's name is Mrs Lillie Johnson, her husband's name is J. J. Johnson, - one grown daughter Miss Harriet J. - one grown son Charles J. - and three younger children are all the family. They are all a thoroughly loyal family, - every thing was quiet there upon the day of the Camp Jackson celebration, no demonstration of any kind. The only reason of my coming here last month, was to make a visit, I was tired of staying at home. I would like very much indeed to go South to see my husband, if I would be allowed to return, although it is contrary to law, to write to any one in the ranks of the enemy during the existence of a war, yet I would not miss an opportunity to write to my husband, I have not, and would not write anything of a contraband nature, of course my objects in writing, would be the desire to hear from my husband, and to have him hear from me, on matters of family interest to us both, not from any desire to break laws, or disobey orders, with the exception of writing to my husband, I would in no instance do



any act contrary to military law, so far as I knew it. ~ But  
no penalty except death could deter me from writing, if the  
opportunity was offered. - This I say, from no spirit of boasting  
that I dare to oppose military law, but from the simple  
and natural desire to hear from my husband, and that he  
should hear from me. ~

The subscribers being informed of certain charges made against us by an overzealous person from an adjoining state, during a time of great excitement in our midst, would respectfully state, that the letter written to said individual under date of Apl 28, on which he based his most serious charge, was written by our bookkeeper (Mr Jordan (whose loyalty has never been questioned) and the objectionable paragraph was inserted simply as a jest, as he considered the danger of the rebels reaching our city very remote, and neither of us saw the letter or a copy of it in our letter book till after our arrest and release, and were entirely ignorant of its contents except so far as related to the business directions therein contained, in regard to the second charge of the same excited individual. (viz, that in reply to his question of "what would become of our large stock of oats & hay if the rebels should get to Wheeling" we replied "if they come here we are all right" we will state, that just previous to that time our Mr Frost had made a sale of every bushel of oats and every pound of hay in our warehouses to a Marietta firm for Capt Fitch A S O and got the pay for them; and we were simply holding the forage till Capt Downing could recieve it from Capt Fitch, and in consequence we were not the owners of it, and simply stated the truth when we said we were "all right" for if the forage had been <sup>or destroyed</sup> burned, the loss would not have been ours. This explanation is the simple truth and can be easily

proved by said Marietta firm, Capt Fitch or Capt Downing,  
The last charge "that he heard some body say that he came in to our  
store to buy clover seed and heard so much disloyalty in the course of  
a discussion that he left without buying", is entirely groundless, we  
remember this circumstance very distinctly, a certain party from  
Washtco Pa did come in to ask the price of clover seed, not to buy  
as he then & there informed us. and there was an argument in  
a perfectly friendly spirit on the merits of some <sup>minor</sup> matters in the  
conduct of the war, and not on the great question of the  
war itself. it was about such a discussion and disagreement  
on the policy of the administration as two republican papers  
published in adjoining states might have in their columns, without  
exciting the shadow of a doubt of their loyalty, and we again  
most distinctly assert that in all the foregoing matters here  
recited, the only disloyalty existed in the over excited brain  
of parties laboring under great alarm. We sincerely trust

receive two meals per day, our fare

at any meal a sufficient quantity  
to satisfy our hunger. The treatment  
of the prisoners is about the same.

Mr P. McDonald of Franklin Co. writes  
as follows and says,

About ten days ago I found four  
white men chopping wood on  
land that I had sold to Tall James  
under contract. He was to have  
possession of the land immediately  
on certain conditions, which were  
that he should pay his notes  
<sup>Had been in possession about two months</sup>  
when due. There was nothing  
said in the contract about cut-  
ting wood. I gave my hand to  
give a deed when his notes were  
paid. On seeing them men I told  
them that Mr James had no right  
to be cutting wood there. They said  
they didn't wish to do anything  
wrong but Mr James had put them  
there. They started with me to  
see Mr ~~James~~ - on the way we  
met James - he turned them back.  
I heard him say out an oath or  
something. I did not speak with  
him, and have not spoken with him  
for three years. I understand afterwards  
from Mr James that James was act-  
ing under him. I saw James, and  
told him I wanted my money for

for the land, and he made me some  
promises. -

I expressed myself to Mr James  
a little afraid of the contrabands  
- I didn't like to have them so  
near my house. They might come  
down and murder some of my family,  
under the control of such a man  
as James he being hostile to me,  
Mr James said he would take  
control of the negroes. I never re-  
lated said contrabands in any way,  
and the only objection to the employ-  
ment of the contrabands was that  
they were under Jones who was  
hostile to me, and I didn't know  
what he might instigate them to  
do. As for as any prejudice against  
the employment of contrabands, I  
would be glad to employ any  
myself. If I could get one, -  
I am a Southern man, but how  
to show support in the war.

Archer, a black man, age 47, - formerly a slave of R. H. Pitman, of S<sup>t</sup>-Charles County, about nine months ago gave information to the Home Guards, of disloyal meetings & secreted arms. Subsequently it was discovered that he had done so, & his life was in danger from those on whom he had informed, who openly threatened to shoot him. He then ran away, & came to S<sup>t</sup>-Louis, obtained military protection from Provost Marshal, Feb 27., & hired himself to W. G. Eliot.

On 27<sup>th</sup> March, his master sent John Pitman, (his brother), to arrest him. A most brutal attack was made on him by three men, armed with pistols, knives and bludgeons. They beat him unmercifully & took him off in a wagon. This occurred on Mr. Eliot's grounds, but in his absence from home.

By order of the Provost Marshal, the Captors were pursued, two of them were placed in prison, & Archer was restored to Mr. Eliot's service.

He now holds Military protection in these words, - "Head Qu. Dep: of the Missouri.

All persons are forbid interfering with said "Archer", who is a resident with & servant of Rev. Dr. Eliot of S<sup>t</sup>-Louis County.

Pitman is well known to be a disloyal man, & evidence to this effect (by Judge Barton Bates, & others) is now on file in the Provost Marshals office.

"Archer" now applies for Free papers, in such form that they can be recorded, on the ground,

in presence and hearing of myself  
and many other loyal men at the  
following occasion: Joseph Kables  
a Citizen & member of the Citizen  
Guards of St Louis challenged all  
Traitors, in my Parlor, using  
the words: "I can whip Three or four  
Secesh at once" to which remark  
Thomas H Noble replied: "You can't  
whip me and I am a Secesh."

About October 1861 or at the time of the  
Enrollment of Militia, his son William  
tried to avoid Enrollment, and after  
being notified to report, under penalty

of arrest, his father used the following language towards me: "We have no law, we have only Martial Law and that we dont acknowledge it has no jurisdiction" or words to that effect. He also admits that his son Thomas Noble is a soldier in the so called Confederate service (which he at the same moment denied) yet admitted that he is drawing for them Portraits and scenery.

The opinion of all his neighbors is, that he is a Rebel and Sympathizer with the rebel cause.
