

- 1st. So much as relates to rail roads, a system of improvement and a geological survey to the committee on internal improvements.
- 2ad. So much as relates to the university, common schools, and the lands funds appropriated to these objects, to a committee on education.
- 3rd. So much as relates to the finances, expenditures, loans and debt of the State Bank, with the accompanying documents in relation thereto, to the committee of ways and means.
- 4th. So much as relates to the penitentiary, the mode of punishment, and prison discipline, to the committee on criminal jurisprudence.
- 5th. So much as relates to the Capitol, the Governor's house, the streets, lots, public grounds, and improvements in the city of Jefferson, to the committee on the seat of Government.
- 6th. So much as relates to the sessions of the Supreme court and the judiciary department, to the committee on the judiciary.
- 7th. So much as relates to the public library.
- 8th. So much as relates to the amendments of the constitution, to select committee of five members.
- 9th. So much as relates to the boundary line of the State with the accompanying documents, to a select committee of five members.
- 10th. So much as relates to the internal trade with Mexico, to a select committee of five members.
- 11th. So much as relates to the salaries of judicial and other officers, to the committee of ways and means.
- 12th. So much as relates to the loss of the public records by the conflagration of the temporary capitol, and the means of supplying said loss, including the publication of the laws to the committee on the judiciary.
- 13th. So much as relates to the building now occupied by the General Assembly, to a select committee acting jointly with such committee as may be appointed by the Senate for that purpose.
- 14th. So much as relates to the organization of the Militia called into the service of the State, to the committee on the militia.
- 15th. So much as relates to the recent difficulties between the people called Mormons and a portion of the people of this State, to a select committee of seven members, to act jointly with such committee as may be appointed by the Senate, with instructions to enquire into the cause of said disturbances, and the conduct of the military operations in suppressing them, with power to send for persons and papers.

Mr. Thompson moved,

To amend the fifteenth resolution by striking out the words, "To act jointly with such committee as may be appointed by the Senate." Which motion was decided in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Geyer, it was

Resolved, That the Governor be requested to communicate to this House all the information in his possession in relation to the recent difficulties between the people called Mormons, and a portion of the people of this State, copies of all orders issued by the Executive calling into service volunteers and militia, and for the government thereof and for the conduct of the military operations, with copies of all correspondence in relation to said difficulties, and the military operations authorized by the Governor.

On motion of Mr. Geyer,

The following resolution was adopted:
