Resolved by the Senate the House of Representatives concurring therein that the two Houses of the General Assembly will meet in the Hall of the House of Representatives, on to-morrow the 5th inst. at 3 o'clock P. M. for the purpose of electing a State Treasurer and also a commissioner for the permanent seat of Government.

Mr. Geyer moved that the message of the Governor and accompanying documents just received be referred to the joint committee raised to enquire into the causes of the disturbances between a portion of the citizens of this State, and a people called Mormons,

Which was rejected.

On motion of Mr. Redman ordered that such parts of the documents accompanying the Governor's message, as the House may order, be read.

And the House having spent some time in the reading of said documents.

On motion of Mr. Coalter,

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 6th, 1833.

The House met pursuant to adjournment.

On motion of Penn a call of the House was ordered, when the following members answered to the call.

Absent sick Mr. Caldwell.

A quorum not appearing a second call was ordered, when a quorum appearing.

On motion of Mr. Biggs, a further call of the House was dispensed with.

On motion of Mr. Penn,

The reading of the Governor's message in relation to the Mormon difficulties, as copied upon the Journal was dispensed with.

Mr. Thompson presented a petition from sundry citizens, west of and attached to Clinton county, proper, for a new county between the former State boundary and Missouri river,

The reading of which was on motion of Thompson dispensed with, and the same was ordered to lie on the table until Monday next.

Mr. Emmons from the committee on Education to whom was referred the bill to incorporate the Bonne Femme Academy in Boon county,

Which was read, and on motion of Mr. Emmons ordered that the bill together with the amendment be engrossed and read a third time to-morrow.

Mr. Burckhardt from the committee on Justices of the peace,

Reported a bill to amend an act entitled an act to establish Justices courts, and the proceedings therein,

Which was read a first time, and ordered to a second reading.

Mr. Hall pursuant to notice, leave being given,

Introduced a bill entitled an act for the relief of Robert P. Clark,

Which was read a first time, and ordered to a second reading.

Mr. Young of Lafayette gave notice,

That on to-morrow he would ask leave to introduce a bill to provide for the election of a public Printer, and fix his compensation.

Mr. Morris gave notice, that on to-morrow he would ask leave to introduce a bill to establish a State University.

The House resumed the reading of the documents accompanying the the Governor's message in relation to the Mormon difficulties.

Mr. Young of Callaway reported that he had received fifty copies of the Governor's message communicated to the present General Assembly.

A message from the Senate by Mr. Williams:

Mr. Speaker,

I am instructed to inform the House of Representatives, that there have been introduced into the Senate bills of the following titles:

A bill to restrain intercourse with the Indians,

An act entitled an act to amend an act to incorporate the Curators of St. Charles College,

And they have passed a bill sent from the House of Representatives, a bill for the relief of Charles Seavers, which is herewith returned,

They have also passed the following bills:

An act supplemental to an act to provide for levying assessing and collecting the revenue.

A memorial to Congress respecting the sale of public lands,

And a bill to incorporate the Trustees of New London Academy,

Which are herewith submitted for the concurrence of the House,

The Senate have also elected George W. White Sergeant-at-arms for the Senate during the present session.

A message from the Senate by Mr. Williams:

Mr. Speaker,

I am instructed to inform the House that there has been presented in the Senate a petition of Maria Dodd praying the division of certain lands among the heirs of Stephen Dodd.

Also the following resolution:

Resolved, By the Senate and House of Representatives, of the State of Missouri, that the sum of seventy-eight dollars and fifty-five cents, be and the same is hereby appropriated for the pay of copying laws and Journals,

And they have passed an engrossed bill from the House of Representatives explanatory of an act entitled an act to organise Clark county, which is herewith returned without amendment.

On motion of Mr. Geyer,

The House dispensed with the further reading of the documents upon the subject of the Mormon difficulties.

The following resolutions, on motion of Mr. Geyer were adopted.

Resolved, That the communication of the Governor in relation to the difficulties with the Mormons, and accompanying documents, be referred to the joint committee charged with the investigation of said difficulties, with instructions to select such of the documents as in their opinion ought to be published with the communication, and that they report thereon to their respective Houses.

Resolved, That said message and documents be sent to the Senate, with a request that they concur in the reference and instructions proposed by the preceding resolution:

On motion of Mr. Huston,

The House adjourned.

EVENING SESSION.

The House met pursuant to adjournment.

On motion of Mr. Atchison, he asked and obtained leave to read a letter from Capt. Bogart to Gen. David R. Atchison, touching the character of said Atchison in relation to the difficulties with a portion of the people of this State and a people called Mormons.

Mr. Young of Callaway offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the committee on ways and means be instructed to enquire into the expediency of so amending the revenue laws as to require the Auditor of Public accounts as far as practicable to fix a standard value in each year, on such taxable property as possesses the same value throughout of the State and notify the different assessors of the State thereof, when

On motion of Mr. Young Callaway further operations for the present time is suspended.

Mr. Chiles of Jackson moved a reconsideration of the order suspending the further reading of the documents accompanying the Governor's message in relation to the Mormon difficulties,

Which was decided to be out of order,

On motion of Mr. Young of Callaway, the resolution upon the subject of requiring the Auditor of Public Accounts to fix a standard value of taxation upon property and was considered and agreed to.

Mr. Coalter offered the following resolution:

Resolved, If the Senate concur therein that the two Houses of the General Assembly proceed to the election of Treasurer of the State of Missouri, this evening at 4 o'clock and that they meet in the Hall of the House of Representatives, the seats on the right of the chair being set apart for their reception.

Mr. Jackson of Audrain moved to amend the foregoing resolution by adding, "and commissioner of the permanent seat of Government," which was agreed to.

When on motion of Mr. Coalter the rule requiring bills to be read on three several days being dispensed with,

The resolution as amended was adopted.

Mr. Penn pursuant to notice leave being given, introduced a bill entitled an act giving the county court authority to grant charters to individuals and companies,

Was read a first time, and ordered to a second reading.

Mr. Williams of C. Gir., pursuant to notice leave being given introduced a bill entitled an act to establish a State road from Jackson in Cape Girardeau county to Smith's Ferry on the Mississippi in said county,

Which was read a first time, and ordered to a second reading.

Mr. Chiles of Franklin, pursuant to notice leave being given introduced a bill entitled an act to establish a State road in Franklin county,

Which was read a first time, and ordered to a second reading.

Mr. Geyer gave notice that he would on to-morrow introduce a resolution to amend the fourth article of the rules by adding a standing committee of seven members on the State bank and to prescribe the duty of said committee and of the committee on roads and highways.

On motion of Mr. Jones Mr. Woodson was added to the committee on Internal Improvements,

A bill entitled an act to incorporate the Washington Fire company in St. Louis,

Was read first time,
